All proceeds go directly toward the \$5,100 required Habitat for Humanity participant donation for the 34 youth and adult participants already signed up to attend the trip in July. 
National Day of Prayer Breakfast to Be Held May 3; 8:30 @ First Baptist Church

"A priest, a rabbi, and imam walk into a prayer breakfast..." That may sound like the beginning of a joke but is actually what will occur at the Haddonfield Council of Churches National Day of Prayer Breakfast held at the First Baptist Church on May 3. The first Thursday of May has traditionally been the date our nation honors as a National Day of Prayer. This year's theme, "Freedom of Religion: What are the Issues?" will be held at the First Baptist Church in Haddonfield located on Kings Highway beginning at 8:30. A panel of speakers from the Christian, Jewish, and Muslim faiths will discuss the opportunities and obstacles to dialogue and the issue of honoring the First Amendment among their representative faiths. In a time when there is so much tension and hostility toward all three of these faith communities this breakfast fosters a spirit of communication among the three Abrahamic faiths.

Tickets are \$15 and available in the church office and can be purchased on Sundays and during the week in the church office. They can also be purchased at the Haddonfield Information Center near Kings Court. Pastor Zschech is purchasing tickets in order to reserve two tables (14 seats) for congregation members to attend, which can be paid back to the church even after the event. The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Our Savior is a faith community that worships Jesus as our Lord, proclaims and shares God's Word, welcomes all people, serves human needs, and nurtures personal and spiritual growth through fellowship all to the glory of God.



It's not just children who ask, "Why do we..." all the time. We adults ask it too.

"Why do we go to school?" So that you can get an education and be a blessing to society.

"Why do we pay taxes?" **So that** everyone is able to benefit from good roads, good schools, good police and military, and good health care.

"Why do we floss our teeth?" **So that** your teeth won't fall out when you get older!

Those two little words, "so that," are the bridge between our actions today impacting a future possible reality. There is no guarantee it will be so, but if we don't act in such ways it is less likely the desired outcome will occur.

When an infant or child is baptized the parents, sponsors, and the congregation all make promises with respect to their faith formation. Parents promise they will "live among God's faithful people," or in other words engage in relationships within the faith community. They promise to "bring them to hear God's word and share in His supper" – or more simply to regularly participate in the worship life of the congregation. They promise to teach them the basic tenets of our faith, "the Creed, Commandments, and Lord's Prayer." They promise to place in their hands the scriptures, and I hope even more so, read the stories of faith with them over the years and not just rely on Sunday school and VBS to fulfill that responsibility. Finally, parents promise to "nurture them in faith and prayer," or as I interpret it, model for their child what faithful discipleship looks like. And then the sponsors and we, the congregation, promise to also be models of faithful discipleship to the newly baptized over the course of their faith formation years.

Why do we do this? SO THAT the child may come to trust God, proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ in word and deed, serve the needs of others, and work for justice and peace. Just as we model for our children what citizenship, sportsmanship, neighborliness, and other qualities of living in society looks like, we are to model what living God's kingdom life looks like as well. And we don't just model it here at 204 Wayne Avenue in Haddonfield. We model it in every aspect of our lives.


We model it on the soccer field as their coach and from the sidelines as spectators and cheering fans.

We model it in the classroom as teachers and aides, and in the boardroom as either the supervisor or supervised.

We model it in our conversations at the cafeteria table, the dinner table, or the car tray table.

And we model it here at Our Savior as well. In singing the hymns with gusto we model what faithful discipleship and God's word to us sounds like. In sitting down with guests and members of all ages at the coffee table or Lord's Table we model what fellowship tastes like. In sharing the Peace with a handshake, hug, or embrace we model what forgiveness feels like. In volunteering to make a meal, donate food and/or pack and deliver pantry bags we model what compassion and loving our neighbor looks like.

We do these things, and so much more, SO THAT not only our children, but this faith community might be drawn closer to trust in God and love of neighbor. In this month of May as there are baptisms three out of four Sundays, I hope this will be a month of reflecting on how our actions of faithful discipleship impact the lives of others in their journey of faith formation and life of faith. I look forward to journeying with you in this life we live together as Christ's disciples.

. Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA

Nearly four years ago, the ELCA launched its first comprehensive campaign, Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA, with the goal of raising \$198 million in support of churchwide ministries across the United States and around the world. Now, as we enter the final year of this five-year effort, we look to the future of this church by highlighting the campaign's Leadership priority, including the ELCA Fund for Leaders and Youth and Young Adults. Through these ministries, we are accompanying youth and young adults in their faith journeys and supporting talented, gifted seminarians as they prepare to begin a life of rostered ministry.

With the \$4 million campaign goal for Youth and Young Adults, the ELCA will support new and growing youth leadership academies, camps, labs, and schools across the country; provide funding for leadership internships with Lutheran Services in America; and provide grants for collaborative and creative youth and young adult ministry initiatives.

How will this campaign affect LCOS youth and young adults? From June 27, 2018 to July 1, 2018, our Director of Youth and Family Ministry, Jaime Frazier, will accompany two youth from LCOS, Sophia Howard and Hailey Melcher, to the National Youth Gathering in Houston, Texas. Sponsored by the ELCA, the gathering will focus on the theme, "This Changes Everything" and hopes to help the youth become leaders in the church. The expected attendance is 30,000. Nadia Volz-Weber will address the crowd; the New Jersey Synod Bishop, Tracie Bartholomew, will meet with NJ youth; Houston will find service projects for 30,000 kids; representatives from seminaries will discuss their calling to ministry; and all participants will worship together and take communion.

Jaime, who grew up in LCOS, loved her Youth Group experiences here. After graduating from Immaculata University with a major in religion, she earned a master's degree from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, concentrating in Youth and Family Ministry. Jaime feels that "church is a welcoming place for youth, a second home" and wants to help them deepen their faith.

Pastor Zschech will be providing an opening and closing prayer for the Memorial Day Services at the Haddonfield War Memorial on May 28. The Memorial Service begins approximately 20 minutes after the parade arrives at the high school, usually about 10:40 AM.

A word to our servicemen from Pastor Donald F. Irvin - April 10, 1945 Dear friend,

Unlike last Easter, there weren't very many servicemen in church. Most of you are now scattered everywhere.

Letters reveal that George Palmer and Morrow Stough are with the Marines on Iwo Jima. From all reports it's a miracle that anyone on Iwo Jima is still alive. Charles Schettler is home after two years in the Navy. Royce Jacobsen is home for a month after two years in the middle of the air battles over the continent. He has a purple heart. Bill Bischoff has also been awarded the bronze cross. With all the push in Germany, Bill was still able to write to Ernie Schroeder about baseball.

Over here we're getting ready for V-E Day at the church with a service: one on the day that V-E Day is officially declared; another on the Sunday following. It seems that the celebration will be different this time from what is was in World War 1. Certainly it ought to be.

Certainly we'll need "Marching Oders for a New Day". Everything that you can do and that the church can do ought to be dedicated to a better world. Pierre van Passen writes that the New Day is "now". Well, it will be now when we can get people to think along the thought and the hope that we have in the Good Book.

Next Easter, if you are all home, we'll have to hold three services on Easter Day. I certainly will be glad to do it.

Our white pews were unsatisfactory. The contractor took them out the week before Easter. We hope to have all the new ones before you get back. Things still aren't right here even though more people are attending the services. For instance, no one has the heart for a father and son banquet like we used to have. The Judas tree beside the church is in full bloom, a month ahead of time. It used to bloom about the time we had that banquet. I always remember the gang standing outside waiting for the signal...
