“What Is Truth?” By Pastor Wayne Zschech

What is truth? It's a different question than, “What is the truth?” We seem to be asking the latter a lot these days. We watch news shows, read the newspaper, or listen to news radio all with the intent of finding out “the” truth of what is going on in the world. Yet, do we trust it as being 100% accurate and unbiased? We hear the cries of “fake news” from those who oppose the stories, but wouldn't fake news be false news or lies? How can news be fake or a lie if there are verifiable facts to back up the reporting? Personally I believe there is “tainted” news that is intended to sway my opinion and perspective toward one side or the other. But is that news or propaganda? So I still am left at the end of the day asking, “What is the truth?”

When Jesus was before Pontius Pilate he said in John's gospel when asked if he were a king, “My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jewish [leaders]. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here... You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice.” Pilate then asked Jesus that famous question. “What is truth?”

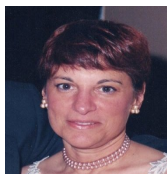
Isn't that why we gather for worship every week? To hear the truth of God's kingdom, God's reign and rule for life in this world? Jesus' kingdom is absolutely not from this world, a world that trusts and believes that “might makes right” rather than “take up your cross and follow me.” A world that believes golden rule is “the one with the most gold makes the rules” rather than “do unto others as you would have them do to you.” A world that is convinced we must “hate our enemies” rather than “love and pray” for them. We gather for worship to hear God's word of truth, sing our praises of that truth, and then experience the truth of God's love and forgiveness in receiving the bread and wine, Christ's body and blood, at the Lord's table.

What is truth? The truth is, sin and death does not have the last word. The God who raises Jesus from the dead does. The truth is, the love of God we have come to know in Jesus wins in the end. Not even a cross and tomb could stop such love. And that's the truth we have been called from the waters of baptism to live out each and every day. We are called to be God's agents of love and grace in a world filled with hate and vengeance. We are called to be God's ambassadors of mercy and forgiveness in a world that seeks retribution and revenge. We are to be God's voice and servants of courage and hope in a world filled with fear and despair. And we are able to be such disciples because we know and trust THE TRUTH, that God's kingdom way of life is not of this world, yet through our hands and voice the work and word of God's life-giving kingdom is revealed by the power of God's Holy Spirit poured out on us in Baptism.

This summer, as you travel to shore or mountains, near or distant lands, or simply dial down your weekly schedule from its regular frenetic pace, I invite you to stay connected to “the truth” of the good news of Jesus Christ amidst all the other forms of news in our world. Attend worship services wherever you may be. If you're a parent with school age children who typically attend Sunday school make a point to use the summer months to teach them how to engage in corporate worship with the gathering of the baptized. Help them learn how to listen to God's truth revealed in scripture, sermon, song, and sacraments. And then, together, let us reveal the truth of God's life-giving kingdom in the corner of the world in which we live. The refrain to that old song are as true and needed today as ever before. They will know we are Christians by our love, by our love. Yes, they'll know we are Christians by our love. And that's the truth!

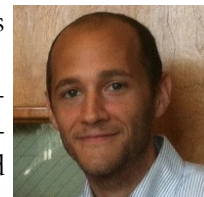
Service of the Word Worship on July 1 & 8; Seminary Graduates Maggi Edwards and Joshua Sullivan to Supply Preach

Pastor Wayne Zschech will be away on vacation and away on the Youth Mission Trip for the first two Sundays of July, and has lined up two excellent seminary graduates, who are currently in the first call process, to provide worship leadership during his absence. Because they are both not yet ordained, our ELCA guidelines stipulate they are not eligible to preside at Holy Communion. Maggi Edwards is a 2017 Masters of Divinity graduate of The Lutheran Seminary at Philadelphia and resides in Turnersville. She recently finished her capstone internship year at Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Tabernacle after also working with Apostles Lutheran Church in Turnersville, and is currently an approved candidate for ordination in the call process here in the New Jersey Synod.

Joshua Sullivan is a 2017 Masters of Divinity graduate from Yale Divinity School and is currently completing Sacred Theology Masters at the United Lutheran Seminary at Philadelphia. He is an approved candidate for ordination from the New England Synod and is assigned to the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod where he also is currently in the first call process.

30 Youth/4 Adults Participate in Goldsboro NC Habitat Mission Trip July 7-14

On Saturday, July 7, there will be 30 youth from Our Savior and the surrounding community, along with four adults, who will be heading to Goldsboro NC to work with their chapter of Habitat for Humanity. This will make our 12th consecutive year appearance in Goldsboro, and it will also be our largest group. \$1,300 was raised toward the HFH \$150/participant fee. The Youth Mission Team is so thankful to those who supported the Pasta Dinner fundraiser in May. The theme for this year is "Be Love" and we will explore the Great Commandment Jesus offers his disciples to love God and love your neighbor through actions and advocacy. While we do not know what work exactly we will be doing at this time it may range from framing, to siding installation, handicap ramp construction, painting or landscaping. We do know that due to the large group size there will be about ten each day that will be working the Habitat ReStore in town and learning how that ministry both provides additional funds for Habitat projects and enables homeowners to purchase materials at a reduced cost. Please keep our group in your prayers as we work in the hot and humid North Carolina heat this July and for safe travels there and back.

Giving Gems: Did You Know?

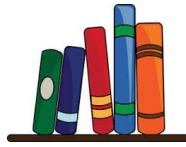

Reflections on Music in Worship

As Christians, our primary identity is centered around Christ. In worship, we celebrate this unity and the radical message that we all belong in the kingdom of God. There are no insiders or outsiders. This sense of belonging is something to celebrate! Music in worship, especially hymns, needs to be consistent with these goals. By using music that draws us to Christ, we focus on what unites us.

Let's put ourselves in the shoes of a first-time visitor in worship at LCOS. Does the text of the hymn point towards the Creator and developing our faith, or does it feel more exclusionary? Are the words inviting you into the family of believers? Does the text focus more on serving God or serving a country?

If a text focuses more on patriotism and treats God as an afterthought, it is a patriotic song, not a hymn to be sung in church. We can certainly sing those songs at patriotic gatherings, but they do not belong in a hymnal or a worship service. As July 4 is just around the corner, some may want patriotic music in worship, as a way of expressing thanks to God for this country and the freedoms many of us enjoy. On the other hand, as Jesus is the subject of our worship, singing about our freedom in Christ is paramount.

A good example of a hymn that is patriotic but keeps God at the forefront is "This Is My Song" (ELW 887) - it prays for one's own country, while also acknowledging that "other hearts in other lands are beating / with hopes and dreams as true and high as mine." On the other hand, a song that would be considered inappropriate for worship is "America the Beautiful" because it focuses more on listing the attributes of a country rather than focusing on God. In 8 lines per verse, God is only mentioned in one line each, while the rest describes the country.

A compromise that Pauline often considers is the playing of a song without the words, such as a postlude - if you were here on Super Bowl Sunday, you know that she played the Eagles fight song on the organ. The singing from the congregation happened spontaneously and was not planned, and since the Eagles in the Super Bowl has not been a regular occurrence, she was happy to compromise. Similarly, Pauline would play a patriotic hymn arrangement without the words as a nod to a national holiday, but would rather not sing several patriotic hymns during one worship service to not give the patriotic sentiment more weight than worship itself. To end, Pauline has a quote from a song by Derek Webb which she always comes back to when thinking about patriotism:

*My first allegiance is not to a flag, a country, or a man
My first allegiance is not to democracy or blood
It's to a king & a kingdom*

May we always remember who we are and whose we are, and may our worship point us and others towards God.

What percent of your household income do you give to God's work through Our Savior's ministry?

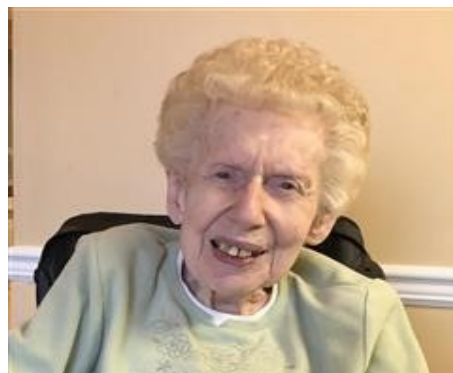

Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA

Nearly four years ago, the ELCA launched its first comprehensive campaign, *Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA*, with the goal of raising \$198 million in support of churchwide ministries across the United States and around the world. **Now, as we enter the final year of this five-year effort, we look to the future of this church by highlighting the campaign's Leadership priority, including the ELCA Fund for Leaders and Youth and Young Adults.** Through these ministries, we are accompanying youth and young adults in their faith journeys and supporting talented, gifted seminarians as they prepare to begin a life of rostered ministry.

With the \$4 million campaign goal for Youth and Young Adults, the ELCA will support new and growing youth leadership academies, camps, labs, and schools across the country; provide funding for leadership internships with Lutheran Services in America; and provide grants for collaborative and creative youth and young adult ministry initiatives.

How will this campaign affect LCOS youth and young adults? From June 27, 2018 to July 1, 2018, our Director of Youth and Family Ministry, Jaime Frazier, will accompany two youth from LCOS, Sophia Howard and Hailey Melcher, to the National Youth Gathering in Houston, Texas. Sponsored by the ELCA, the gathering will focus on the theme, "This Changes Everything" and hopes to help the youth become leaders in the church. The expected attendance is 30,000. Nadia Volz-Weber will address the crowd; the New Jersey Synod Bishop, Tracie Bartholomew, will meet with NJ youth; Houston will find service projects for 30,000 kids; representatives from seminaries will discuss their calling to ministry; and all participants will worship together and take communion.

Jaime, who grew up in LCOS, loved her Youth Group experiences here. After graduating from Immaculata University with a major in religion, she earned a master's degree from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, concentrating in Youth and Family Ministry. Jaime feels that "church is a welcoming place for youth, a second home" and wants to help them deepen their faith.
