

Unity & Fellowship Sunday Set for Jan 27; Combined Worship @ 9:30 Followed by Brunch and Annual Meeting

On Sunday, January 27 Our Savior will hold one worship service at 9:30 so members from the regular three worship times can worship together as one congregation. Immediately following worship the congregation will move to the Parish Hall for a sumptuous brunch prior to the Annual Meeting that will follow. There will be separate activities for children on the 3rd Floor while parents participate in the Annual Meeting scheduled to end by noon.

Why one service prior to the Annual Meeting?

- 1. It creates the opportunity for the congregation to truly worship as a unified body of Christ rather than a segmented one.
- 2. It provides members who regularly attend one service the opportunity to meet and enjoy fellowship with regular members of the other worship services.
- 3. Members with children in Sunday afternoon activities can participate in the Annual Meeting.

The Council realizes this may be an inconvenience for some, especially those who will need to get children up and ready for worship and Sunday school 60 minutes earlier than usual. We also believe the benefit will greatly outweigh the cost. It is their sincere hope that many of the congregation will mark their calendars to attend this year's Unity Fellowship Sunday Worship and Annual Meeting on January 27 with worship at 9:30 and brunch following immediately afterward.

At the Annual Meeting the main topics of discussion will include:

The status of our faith formation ministry led by our new Director of Youth and Family Ministry, Jaime Frazier, and goals for new initiatives in 2019 as regular Sunday school participation has increased this fall compared to past years and we hope to keep the trend going.

Also, five Congregation Council members and two members of the Memorial Gifts Board will need to be elected by a quorum of the congregation to serve three and four year terms respectively. Dan Cook (Financial Secretary), Judy Caravelli (Communications), Laura Oakes (Congregation Resources), and Nancy Frazier (Outreach) will all be going off council and LuAnne Fogelson (Treasurer) will sadly be going off Council as she and Scott are relocating to California before January leaving two years of her unexpired second term unfilled. We offer our most heartfelt thanks to Mike Fallon (Chair) and Bob Mirabello (Secretary) who will both be completing their second four-year term on the Memorial Gift Board.

Finally, the 2019 Financial Plan for Ministry will be voted on. The final Financial Plan will not be fully prepared until after the January Council meeting, and the Congregation Resources ministry team is confident the 2018 Ministry Fall Campaign commitments along with estimated giving from non-pledging members will meet the challenge for supporting our current and future ministry in 2019.

"Revelations, Resolutions, and Renewal" By Pastor Wayne Zschech

On Epiphany, Jan 6, the church celebrates the arrival of the magi bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. In this ordinary child too small yet to journey back to Jerusalem God reveals his extraordinary love and grace for the world. The infinite God becomes the finite human Jesus. Throughout the season after the Epiphany we hear the stories of God's extraordinary grace manifested in the ordinariness of our lives.

On New Year's Day we often make resolutions for the year ahead. We resolve to be healthier by eating fewer sweets and more veggies, join a gym or yoga studio, or start a walking or running routine in preparation for a 5K or 10K race later in the year. We resolve to read more and watch less TV. We resolve to stay connected more with friends and make new connections through volunteer opportunities. And sometimes we actually follow through on those resolutions.

The Sunday after the Epiphany, Jan 13, the church celebrates The Baptism of Our Lord, and at Our Savior we celebrate and bless all those who were baptized in the previous year. They, and we, are reminded of the promises we make to God and the body of Christ, the church, to live among God's people, hear God's word and share in the Lord's Supper, proclaim the gospel in word and deed, serve the needs of all people, and work for justice and peace.

What would it be like if we combined all three in our "new life" of 2019? In your goal to read more could that include a book study at church with a friend in which you discover the extraordinary grace of God in the ordinary pages of a book? Could partnering with a friend from church or another member of Christ's body to train for that race be a way you "live among God's faithful people" as you discover grace and joy while pounding the pavement over the miles? Could you share the healthier meals you are now making with those we feed on Tuesdays at My Father's House or make it here for the homeless men we will be hosting for the Interfaith Homeless Outreach Council of Camden the last week of February and first week of March? This January I invite you to explore how you might incorporate the lifestyle of faith we all promise to live when affirming our Baptism into the resolutions we make for 2019 and in the process of living them out discover how God's extraordinary love, grace, and joy are revealed in those simple, ordinary actions. 
Bible Discussion for Daily Life on Joshua Begins Jan 7/9 (7 weeks)

Blessing the Home at Epiphany

Matthew writes that when the magi saw the shining star stop overhead, they

were filled with joy. "On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother" (Matt. 2:10-11). In the home, Christ is met in family and friends, in visitors and strangers. In the home, faith is shared, nurtured, and put into action. In the home, Christ is welcome.

Twelfth Night (Jan 5), Epiphany of Our Lord (Jan 6), or another day during the time after Epiphany offers an occasion for gathering with friends and family members for a blessing for the home. Someone may lead the greeting and blessing, while another person may read the scripture passage. Following an eastern European traditions, a visual blessing may be inscribed with white chalk above the main door; for example, 20 + CMB + 19. The numbers change with each new year. The three letters stand for either the ancient Latin blessing *Christe mansionem benedicat*, which means, "Christ bless this house," or the legendary names of the magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar).

The following is a simple Blessing for the Home. Families can use this and every year at Epiphany. Chalk will be given out in church on Sunday, January 6, for families to use for the blessing.

Greeting

May peace be to this house and all who enter here. By wisdom a house is built and through understanding it is established through knowledge its rooms are filled with rare and beautiful treasures. (*Proverbs 24:3-4*)

Reading

As we prepare to ask God's blessing on this household, let us listen to the words of scripture.

Read John 1 verses 1-4, 14, and 16)

Inscription

This inscription may be made with chalk above the entrance: 20 + CMB + 19

Write the appropriate character (left) while speaking the text (right) The magi of old, known as

C Caspar

M Melchior, and

B Balthasar

Followed the star of God's Son who came to dwell among us

20 two thousand

19 and nineteen years ago.

+ Christ bless this house,

+ and remain with us throughout the year.

Prayer of Blessing

O God, you revealed your Son to all people by the shining of a star. We pray that you bless this home and all who live here with your gracious presence. May your love be our inspiration, your wisdom our guide, your truth our light, and your peace our benediction; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Undeck the Sanctuary Jan 6 @ Noon


LASER TAC

Did you know...? Every Day is a Precious Gift From God.


During a recent near-death event in my life, I had the opportunity to exchange thoughts with family, friends, health care professionals and our Pastor. I would like to share with you some the insights that led me to a new realization of this precious gift from God.

The ancient Greek dramatist, Euripides, wrote, "No one can confidently say that he will still be living tomorrow." We seldom focus on that reality and often act like we are confident of a tomorrow. We remember names of those who died suddenly, in tragedy or simply in the quiet of sleep. However, calling those names to mind will probably not make most of us contemplate our own mortality before we place our heads on our pillows at night.

There is no need for us to obsess about dying, but realizing the gift of today and reflecting on the possibility that it may be our last day on earth may cause us to act differently. We might forgive more easily, argue less

and embrace one another. Instead of procrastinating, we might act now, becoming more mindful of the needs of others and reaching out to those who are lost.

What is God calling you to do? You might wonder what it is to live more fully and to give of yourself more freely. Do not let a single day pass you by without truly loving others and our God. One thing you can be confident about: this day will never come again. Janice B.

Our Savior is currently sponsoring six students.



Once again the people of Our Savior have put their faith into action with their generosity. A huge thank you and well done from the Social Ministry Committee to everyone who took Advent Giving Tree tags and bought the gifts or donated money to purchase gifts. We started with 228 tags and ended with 167

tags taken and 61 tags left. Also, in addition to the \$2500.00 budgeted for the Giving Tree, a total of 1205.50 was contributed to the Advent Giving Tree fund as of 12/9/18 to purchase gifts for all of the leftover tags. The gifts are given to children, teenagers, young adults, adults and families through the following organizations.

Urban Promise – provides Christian outreach and education programs for children and youth of Camden.

My Father's House – a court mandated substance abuse counseling center for male and female teenagers and adults.

Caring Hearts Ministry – provides support for individuals with HIV/AIDS and their families.

Pantry Families – families in our area who are regularly provided with groceries from the LCOS pantry.

Glenview School in Haddon Heights – children of low income, needy families.

Garfield and Tatem Elementary Schools in Collingswood – children of low income, needy families.




