Our Savior Hosts Homeless for 2 Weeks Beginning Feb 24 – Volunteers Needed

The Interfaith Homeless Outreach Council (IHOC) runs a program for 12 homeless men that begins in November and runs until May when they graduate. The men are provided with training, career and life skill counseling before seeking and securing employment during the program, as well as, attend addiction counseling and support groups. By the end of the program the men are completely self-sufficient and able to move into housing and live on a budget their income can afford. During the program they stay for two-weeks in different locations and from Feb 24 until March 3 the men will be lodging at Our Savior and eating dinners here every night. Here is what we will need from the congregation to make their stay here possible.

Sleeping Area: The cots the men sleep on will be set up in our Parish Hall and during those two weeks there will be no outside or congregational activities that will be held in that space. Prior to their arrival the first floor custodial closet with a floor mop sink will be converted to a shower for the men to use during their stay. They will have access to the Youth Room in order to relax, read, or watch TV or movies at night or during the day on the weekends.

Schedule: The men will leave Our Savior by 6:30 a.m. and return no sooner than 4:00 each weekday. During that time they will either be in counseling, searching for a job, or working at one after being hired. On the weekends they will either be here at Our Savior or engaged in an activity as a group (e.g. go bowling, to the movies, laundromat, etc.) as some congregations provide the funds for some recreational activities. Prior to leaving in the morning the men will make their breakfast and lunch from grocery supplies the congregation volunteers will have provided. In the evening the Dinner Host will make the meal at Our Savior as well as eat with the men and engage in conversation. The men are also required to attend a 12-Step Program at least once a week.

Volunteers Needed: There are basically three categories of volunteers needed.

Breakfast or Lunch Supplies Provider: Volunteers would provide the food supplies for either breakfast or lunch for the men to prepare on their own. 14 of each will be needed.

<u>Dinner Hosts</u>: An individual or family volunteer will be at the church from 4:00 until 7:00 on the night they host. During that time they will prepare the meal and eat with the men as a means to get to know them and be a support to their participation in the program.

Overnight/Weekend Hosts: An overnight host must be a man who is expected to arrive by 7:00 p.m. and remain in the church until 7:00 the next morning or until all the men have left if sooner. A cot will be provided and overnight hosts are encouraged to socialize with the men at their discretion. Weekend hosts will be asked to remain in the church in two shifts beyond the Overnight Host shift; from 7:00-Noon and Noon-4:00 when the Dinner Host arrives.

"Being Intentionally Invitational" By Pastor Wayne Zschech

How many new neighbors have moved into your area in the last year? Have you welcomed them to the neighborhood and introduced yourself to them? In the streets around Our Savior I'd guess there are at least ten new neighbors we've had move into the community over the last year, with about five having moved in since the fall! As Christmas approached I began to wonder, "Where would they celebrate the

birth of Christ in worship if they are from out of the area and that is a part of their Christmas tradition? Shouldn't the church in their "backyard" be reaching out to invite them to join us on Christmas Eve?"

So with this in mind I went out on a Sunday afternoon and knocked on all ten doors, introduced myself as both the pastor of the Lutheran church down the street and their neighbor. I welcomed them to the neighborhood and said, "I don't know if it's a part of your tradition but if you are looking for a place to celebrate the birth of Christ on Christmas Eve I wanted to invite you to join us." I then gave them one of our LCOS brochures and the business card sized advertisement of our Christmas Eve worship times and styles. Then I said good-bye. To those not home I simply placed the brochure and card in the door. Not as personal, but at least they know we stopped by.

Do we just assume people who move in near our church will automatically start attending Our Savior (thereby making us better known as The Church of the Most Holy Convenience?) Maybe we assume they aren't Lutheran and will be looking for their "brand" of church in town and if they are Lutheran they'll just start to come. Either way we excuse ourselves from being intentionally invitational in welcoming them to the neighborhood and inviting them to join us for worship, fellowship, or service events. I believe Our Savior provides inspiring worship. I believe our social ministry programs make a significant difference in the lives of those in need in our area. I believe our faith education ministry deepens participants' relationship with God and God's people. Why would we not invite newcomers in our neighborhood to experience this as well with us?

The number one way people begin attending and then join a church is from a personal invitation from one of its members. It's not because of advertising or simply because we have worthwhile worship and ministry programs. It's because someone intentionally invited them to join them for worship or attend one of those ministry programs.


So how do you intentionally invite someone to attend either Our Savior in worship or another event? Here is my suggestion.

- 1. Identify who the "new" people are in your neighborhood, school, work, or other organizations in which you participate.
- 2. Introduce yourself and welcome them to the community. In addition to sharing what local restaurants, stores, pizza parlors, and other services you have found to be great you can also share, "I don't know if you are a person of Christian faith, but if you are looking for a church I invite you to join me at my church."
- 3. When Our Savior is having an event that is ideal for inviting someone, like our Advent Lessons and Carols worship, or a fellowship event, or the Feed My Starving Children mobile pack event, consider who you might intentionally invite to join you.
- 4. If your child is attending Vacation Bible School or another ministry event or program that would be beneficial or fun for one of their friends why not intentionally invite the child and parents to join your child in attending?

In 2019 the Congregation Council will be focusing on how Our Savior's congregation can become a more invitational congregation. I hope you will consider how you might also become more intentionally invitational in this new year and at the very least welcome the newcomers in your community.



Hymn Reflections Bring A Richer Context to Worship

Starting the September of 2017, I started writing and emailing reflections on the hymns for the upcoming Sunday on a regular basis. These reflections include information on the text, music, spirituality, and other background about the hymns. They are emailed on a weekly basis to dozens of members at LCOS. If you are interested in receiving them, please email Austen Wilson at <u>austen.wilson@gmail.com</u>. Below is an example of reflections for two hymns from January 6, 2019, Epiphany Sunday.

Much of the information is from The Hymnal Compan-

ion to Evangelical Worship and published by Augsburg Fortress in 2010. It was compiled by Paul Westermeyer, one of the world's foremost writers on church music in the Lutheran Church. When I refer to "hymn", I am most likely referring to the text by itself. Oftentimes, the text and the tune were written by different people.

300 The First Noel

Both the text and tune for The First Noel have obscure origins. Paul Westermeyer calls the "Noel" refrain kind of a birthday cheer since "Noel" comes from the Latin word "natalis", denoting birth or birthday. The text is English, but the author is unknown. The first time it was published was in 1823. The tune first appeared in 1833 and John Stainer harmonized it for a hymnal in 1871. The First Noel tells the story of the star leading the wise men to the baby Jesus. Let us sing this hymn joyfully, praising God for the birth of Jesus.

302 As with Gladness Men of Old

William Dix, an English hymn writer, wrote this text around 1860 in addition, to others such as "What Child is This". If the tune sounds familiar, it's because it's the same tune as the tune associated with "For the Beauty of the Earth". William Monk, who composed the tune for hymns such as Abide With Me, altered the original German tune, paired it with the text for As with Gladness Men of Old", and named the tune DIX, after the hymn's author. "As with Gladness Men of Old" has many parallels to the Gospel reading for this Sunday (Matthew 2: 1 - 12). Rather than just being passive, the hymn takes the commentary one step further. Each verse starts with what happened, then commends us to do likewise. For example, the third verse starts with the perspective of the wise men "As they offered gifts most rare at thy cradle, rude and bare". The same verse shifts to our perspective, "so may we with holy joy, pure and free from sin's alloy, all our costliest treasures bring, Christ, to thee, our heav'nly king". The first part mentions gifts and the second part mentions treasures. The other verses of the hymn have similar parallel language. May we go forth from church remembering the light of Christ throughout the week.


