Holy Week and Easter Satisfy More Than One's Sweet Tooth

Holy Week is the most meaningful time in the Christian year. From the celebration of Jesus' triumphal entry in Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, to his institution of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday and crucifixion on Good Friday, to our celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord on Easter, we hear the stories central to our Christian faith. The celebration of Holy Week and Easter revives our baptismal faith in the hope a crucified and risen Lord offers to all who follow him from the font. Here are the list of worship opportunities and each one's focus. Please share it with someone you know who needs to hear a word of hope. Invite them to join you this year as we gather for worship.



April 14 Palm/Passion Sunday (8:00, 9:15, 10:30): Palms are distributed to all attending and a palm processional begins the worship. The Passion (Christ's crucifixion) according to Luke will be dramatically read with actions by various people from the congregation in addition to worship leaders. Please note the worship times are the same as usual. Those interested in providing the dramatic reading/presentation of the Passion need to contact Austen Wilson.



April 18 Maundy Thursday (Noon & 7:30): This is the first of what the ancient Church considered a three part worship that moves from Maundy Thursday to Good Friday to the Vigil of Easter or Easter celebration. There are three foci for this evening worship, Confession and Forgiveness, Jesus' new commandment (mandate or Maundatum) to love one another, and the institution of the Lord's Supper. Worshippers are invited to receive the laying on of hands for the

forgiveness of sins at the beginning of the service. The stripping of the altar concludes the service as a reminder of the stripping and whipping Jesus received on our behalf on the night he was betrayed and arrested.



April 19 Good Friday (Noon Ecumenical at Haddonfield United Methodist): This three hour community wide worship focuses on the seven last words of Christ found in the various four gospels. Pastors from within Haddonfield share in preaching the seven sermons and a choir with opera quality singers offer a musical interpretation of the same words from the cross from Dubois. It is inspiring whether you attend for all or part of the worship. Pastor Wayne will be preaching the 4th Word.

April 19 Good Friday (7:30 Tenebrae at Our Savior): This "service of shadows" places extreme emphasis on the cross of Christ and is marked by a somber tone. Lights are dimmed as the candles representing Christ's last words are extinguished and the congregation again leaves the worship in silent and meditative reflection.



April 21 The Resurrection of Our Lord (8:00, 9:30, 11:00): All three worship offerings will be identical with Holy Communion offered at all three. The alleluia of song returns to the liturgy and hymnody after a long absence during Lent. Those attending the 8:00 worship also participate in a brief component of the Vigil of Easter worship where the light of Christ symbolized as the Christ Candle enters our lives at the beginning of this worship. The baptismal font also returns to front and center in the chancel as the life giving waters of the Resurrection now begin to flow again.

Every Christian owes it to him or herself to participate in the various worship opportunities of Holy Week. Your faith will be renewed when you do.

Easter Lily Delivery Volunteers Needed April 22 at 9:30

Help is needed to deliver Easter lilies to those in our congregation who could use a "touch" of resurrection life and love this spring. Volunteers need to arrive at church by 9:30 in the morning and gather in the Parish Hall. "Change or Die!" By Pastor Wayne Zschech

No, this isn't the ELCA's new motto to replace "God's Work – Our Hands." It is, however the title of Alan Deutschman's book in which he describes how, when heart patients are given a choice between changing their lifestyle to avoid the high risk of dying by heart attack, ninety percent choose not to change. That's right! 90% choose death!! Why? Deutschman shares three "F" words we think will produce change

but most often does not.

FACTS: Even when presented with the truth people won't change behavior for sake of reason.

FEAR: People tend to revert back against it in defiance. "I'll show you!"

FORCE: You can lead a horse to water but you can't make it drink. The same goes for people.

What does Deutschman claim brings about change? The answer is the three "R's."

RELATIONSHIPS with a person or community that can inspire hope.

REPETITION of new practices that reinforce the new behavior.

REFRAME your way of thinking.

If we reflect on this we know it's true. When I graduated college I was very overweight and out of shape. I joined Weight Watchers with my mom and sister and attended the regular weekly meetings, weighing in at the beginning and listening to the inspiring leader and people's stories that gave us hope we could actually reach our goal. We followed the new eating plan each day every week. I joined Bally's Fitness and began to work out six days a week and often twice a day. I loved the Life Rower and would compete with myself to hold the record for greatest distance rowed in each of the time frames. And in 17 weeks I lost 62 pounds thanks to new relationships at WW that inspired hope, repetition of a workout that built muscle and burned fat, and reframing my way of thinking when it came to how I spent my spare time working out instead of watching TV. It was one of the healthiest times of my life.

At Easter the Christian faith proclaims the opposite of "Change or die." The message of Good Friday and Easter is "Because Christ has died and resurrected we are able to be changed, to be transformed, and to be resurrected into new life in Christ." However, that new life in Christ, that Kingdom life Jesus revealed in his earthly ministry, is a change from the worldly kingdom life we experience every day. Christian living that follows a risen Christ is different and will be a change from the status quo and norm we are tempted to follow daily.

How might we live this new life faithfully despite the temptation to go back to our worldly ways? Deutschman's three R's still apply.

RELATIONSHIPS with God, God's Son Jesus, and God's people in the church inspire us with a hope that does not disappoint us and the world cannot give. Maybe this is why the first promise we make in our Affirmation of Baptism is to "live among God's faithful people."

REPETITION of the faith practices of daily prayer, weekly worship, regular study of God's word, serving others in need, inviting others to encounter God, encouraging one another in the faith, and giving of our resources towards God's work reinforce not only a new behavior but also a new way of living.

REFRAMING occurs when after living among God's people and engaging in the faith practices of Christian discipleship we begin to view and interpret the world from God's point of view.

I'm not in the same shape I was back in 1986. Why? Well I no longer go to Weight Watcher meetings, don't make the gym a priority, and justify a relatively sedentary lifestyle. "It's just the way life is right now." But does it have to be? Because Christ died and rose again at Easter we need no longer fear death. It doesn't have the last word for those who live out of their baptismal promise. And when we have relationships grounded in God's faithful people, and live a routine that reinforces this new way of living we too begin to experience and live God's kingdom life here and now. We are Easter people. Christ is risen from the dead. And because of that we need not fear change in our lives.



Discover God's Inexhaustible Mercy! Bible Discussion on "Judges" Continues in April


Judges tells the story of God's people after the exodus from Egypt (Exodus), the wandering in the wilderness (Numbers), and the invasion of Canaan, or Promised Land (Joshua). For about two hundred years the people lived in the land without a king, under the leadership of individuals called judges. Why did they need judges? Because the people were always chasing after the gods of the land rather than

worshipping the God who led them out of slavery into freedom and into the Promised Land. Yet, no matter how many times the people turned away from God and fell under attack, God hears their cries and raises up a judge to save them. This is not a Bible lecture but rather a discussion of how what we read in Scripture is applicable to our daily life and faith. Attend either Mondays from 7:30-9:00 in Room 112 or Wednesday mornings from 9:30-11:00 at the home of Linda Powell (603 Crystal Lake Avenue in Haddon Township). No prior attendance or scriptural knowledge is required to gain insight and value from the discussion. Just drop on in. Bibles are available if you don't have one. 
Participants will then receive their First Holy Communion at the 10:30 worship on April 7 with the bread used for Eucharist being made by one of the families whose child is in the class.



LCOS "Piggybacks" Bishop's Challenge to End World Hunger in Lent

At the 2018 Synod Assembly Bishop Tracie Bartholomew challenged congregations of the New Jersey Synod to participate in a campaign to end world hunger "one cow at a time." Every congregation that committed and raised \$500 toward purchasing a cow through ELCA Good Gifts would receive a plywood cow for the congregation to paint and bring to the 2019 Synod Assembly. Our Sunday school children's Noisy Offerings in 2018 have already enable LCOS to make that donation and our cow is ready to be painted!

In Lent we want to go a step further and include the entire congregation in piggybacking onto the Bishop's Challenge by raising a Family Farm worth of animals through our Lenten Self-Denial Offerings. Lenten piggy banks were given out on March 3 and families were asked to put their change in the banks during Lent. If you are giving up something that has a cost we ask you put that amount in the bank instead. Our goal is \$715, which enables a Family Farm of animals to be purchased. A cow, a couple of goats, a dozen chicks, two pigs, farming tools, seeds and agricultural training and support, for example, can help a family achieve a fresh start. With new tools and techniques, crops will grow stronger than ever. Eggs, milk and meat from the farm animals provide a lifetime of food to eat and sell on the market, helping a family escape the cycle of hunger and poverty – for good. If we exceed our goal we will purchase as many animals as the overflowing good gifts of generosity and grace allow. Hopefully we will get to "squeal" with joy when all the banks come in on Palm Sunday, April 14.



Say Your Name – It Promotes Relationships that Matter

"Pastor, how do you remember so many names?" Answer: I practice. Scientific studies show the more you say someone's name out loud it aids in becoming a part of your long-term memory. And when we are able to call someone by their name it reinforces that they matter in our lives and as a part of our faith community. So here are four ways I encourage you to begin remembering more people's names you meet in worship and ministry at Our Savior.

- 1. During the sharing of the Peace say your name before extending the Peace; "I'm Pastor Wayne, the peace of Christ/the Lord be with you." Say it even when the other person knows your name. The person next to them may not and you're helping them remember.
- 2. Always say your name when introducing yourself to someone. Don't just say, "Hello, I'm glad to see you" or "I'm glad you're here." Start with "Hello, I'm name. I'm glad..." To help them even more, whenever possible slip your name into any story you're telling about yourself. It will help remind them of your name without them having to ask again.
- 3. After they introduce themselves, repeat their name as often as possible in conversation without it sounding too awkward. Remember, hearing you say their name helps it go to long term memory.
- 4. Make it a game. When you sit down for worship, see how many names you can put with the faces of those seated around you. Challenge yourself to learn at least one new name with a face each time your worship. It's okay to cheat as well by using the pictorial directory or use the Instant Church Directory application for smart phones when you get stuck

If we all commit to these simple practices it won't be long until you'll know the name of almost everyone who worships when you do. The next step, get to know them too!

Concert on April 7 at 4 pm at LCOS to Focus on Love, Faith, and Hope

On April 7 at 4 pm, Music at Our Savior presents I Believe: Songs of Love, Faith, and Hope. The Adult and Youth Choirs of Our Savior will be joined by the Concert Choir of ChildrenSong, a choral music education and performance program based in Haddonfield, New Jersey that rehearses at Our Savior. The choirs will sing music focused on the themes of love, faith, and hope, all by living composers from the Americas.
