### "Racism and White Privilege: What Do Lutherans Say About It?" By Pastor Wayne Zschech

The words "racism" and "white privilege" have been a red button issue in the United States for years and lately it is even more prominent given the current events over the summer months. The ELCA at our Churchwide Assembly this past August even issued a Declaration of Apology to People of African Descent as a follow-up to our 1993 social statement *Freed in Christ:* Race, Ethnicity, and Culture. As I've listened to people's comments in conversation, on social

media, and in general, I've wondered if we are all using the same glossary of terms when we talk about racism and white privilege. Racism isn't only about prejudice or privilege. In that social statement by the ELCA we defined racism as a sin that is "a mix of power, privilege, and prejudice." Power is a key element of racism. In his book, Evil and the Followers of Jesus, Lutheran author, professor, and pastor Scott Gustafson adds, "This definition is behind the contention of many African Americans that persons of African descent cannot be racist in the United States of America. They can indeed be prejudiced, but victims of racism cannot be racist because they lack the other component to racism, namely, the power to enforce their prejudice." He goes on to add that "this description of racism enables us to understand it as an institutional problem as well as a personal problem." The simple explanation is this: institutions established in a climate of racism did not acknowledge the power of racism and tend to perpetuate that which is not explicitly purged because the primary goal of most established institutions is survival. "When survival is the primary goal, it follows that the unarticulated, racist assumptions and behaviors that were present at the institution's foundation will be perpetuated in the institution's quest to persist."

This helps understand what is meant when we talk about "white privilege." It isn't talking about white people not working hard to get where they are in work, education, and in other aspects of our communal life. However, it is saying there are barriers and hurdles they did not have to contend with in that journey that people of color have and continue to struggle against today.

So what is the ELCA saying about racism and white privilege in this Apology to People of African Descent? The document that is available online or you can pick up a hardcopy on our Visitor table in the narthex offers responses to the following questions many might have.

- Why is the ELCA issuing this apology?
- Why look at slavery? It happened in the past.
- Slavery is over, so why can't we just move on?
- Slavery ended over 150 years ago, and I am a white Lutheran who never owned slaves. How and why am I a part of this apology?
- What is the history of Lutherans related to slavery?
- What is the history of people of African descent in resilience and resistance?
- Where do we go from here as a church?

I encourage you to read this short nine-page document. If in reading it you are inclined to engage in a conversation about what it says and how our faith calls us to respond I invite you to join me and others on Monday, September 9 at 7:30 in Room 112 as we go through the document and provide opportunity for discussion. If you'd like to read more on the topic of racism here are a list of books I've been reading and are on my shelf waiting to be read that I've found to be enlightening and challenging.

- America's Original Sin: Racism, White Privilege, and the Bridge to a New America by Jim Wallis
- Raising White Kids: Bringing up children in a racially unjust America by Jennifer Harvey
- The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness by Michelle Alexander
- I'm Still Here: Black Dignity in a World Made for Whiteness by Austin Channing Brown
- Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the US by Lenny Duncan (an ELCA pastor out of Havertown, PA)

This is not an easy journey to engage in if you are a white Christian. I know from experience. I've been tempted to stop a few times, especially when its cost is relationships with people I care about. It is in those moments that I remember I am yoked with Christ in my journey of faith and that with Jesus all things are possible, but not without transformation of my heart and life. May the Holy Spirit give us the courage and strength to follow our Savior in this process.



### Churchwide Assembly Questions, Answers, & Conversation In Lieu of Bible Discussion

In August the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America met in Milwaukee for our Churchwide Assembly that was filled with nearly a 1,000 Lutherans who gathered for worship, elect a Presiding Bishop (Spoiler Alert: Elizabeth Eaton was re-elected on first ballot) and a new ELCA Secretary (Deacon Sue Rothmeyer), as well as discuss and vote on several important and historic resolutions

and memorials. Three actions were especially significant which Pastor Wayne will lead a time of questions, answers, and conversation on during the time the Bible Discussion Group normally meets. The dates and topics in September are as follows:

Sep 9&11: The Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent offers an apology to our siblings of African descent and calls for accountability and living into the words shared in it.

Sep 16&18: The ELCA is declared a "sanctuary church body," encouraging participation in the ELCA AMMPARO initiative for migrant children, and other means of caring for immigrants, migrants, and refugees.

Sep 23&25: The Poor People's Campaign: What is it and why did we affirm it?

Information on all three of these topics will be available at the information table in the church narrhex for participants to read through prior to the discussion as it will be helpful to know what each of these resolutions and documents are about before gathering on Mondays at 7:30 in Room 112 or at the home of Linda Powell on Wednesdays at 9:30 on those dates.



### Confirmation Ministry Begins with Orientation Sept. 15 at 6:30;

### Blessing Service Sep 22 at 10:30 Worship

Another year of confirmation ministry with catechetical instruction begins Sunday, Sep 15, at 6:30 with a "Back to Confirmation Night" orientation for both youth and parents in the Church Sanctuary where the goals and volunteer opportunities of the program will be reviewed. The class of about 22 seventh and eighth grade youth, along with parent Guides, will cover the Ten Commandments and The Lord's Prayer at biweekly Learn Events, and Stewardship of Time, Talent, and Treasure at the fall Lock-In Retreat. They will also receive acolyte training as a part of the retreat. Each Learn Event's theme will utilize the Teen Study Bible, all youth entering the ministry receive, as well as, Luther's Small Catechism, at every event, and process what was shared in Small Groups with an adult Guide facilitating the conversation. In addition, the program includes:

- Play Events coordinated with the Oasis Youth ministry
- Serve Events ranging from making meals for My Father's House and Youth Sunday Worship leadership, to serving either as an acolyte or singing in the Youth Choir.
- Participation in a Stepping into the Catechism Blessing during the 10:30 worship on September 22.

Confirmation isn't just for youth any more. Parents are invited to gather for Learn Events and participate in their own Parent Group for fellowship and rediscovering the faith applications of Luther's Small Catechism in their daily lives. While this may be a lot to ask of families with extremely full schedules, Pastor Wayne strongly believes the most important way to teach faith to our children is to first teach and empower loving adults to model and share the faith with them. In addition, parents have the opportunity to explore what they once learned in confirmation from their perspective and life experience of an adult, and how that impacts their own faith in daily life.

### Confirmation Lock-In on Sep 20-21 Focuses on Community Building & Stewardship

On Friday and Saturday, September 20-21, the Confirmation Youth will gather at the church for a lock-in retreat followed by a community building experience at Camp Edge in Alloway. The Lock-In portion of the retreat begins Friday, Sep 20 at 6:30 and will include acolyte training and a focus on the Christian discipline of Giving of our time, talent, and treasure.

On Saturday the group will travel to Camp Edge in Alloway for a Low Ropes Course session to enhance becoming more tightly knit as a community in the body of Christ. The cost of the event is \$20/participant to cover the cost of Camp Edge fees. Parents will be chaperoning the event both overnight at the church and at Camp Edge.




### New Sounds On the Horizon For This Season




If you're anything like me, you're staring at the calendar wondering where the summer went wasn't it June just last week? But when I look at the hymnals, anthems, notebooks, and sticky notes all around me in my office (that I had so enthusiastically and naively promised myself I would keep tidy from day one!), I realize that September is just days away. I am excited to be starting our music season in just a few weeks, and while I am keeping many of the beloved traditions, I am also looking forward to introducing a few new things. Favorites like Lessons & Carols, all choirs, and our LCOS music series are staying - don't you worry!

A new musical addition this year will be the music of Taizé, which some of you may have heard me talk about. I am lucky to be flying to Taizé with the support of LCOS at the end of August. The Taizé Community is an ecumenical Christian monastic fraternity in Taizé, France, and I will be spending a week with other young adults from around the world learning about music, faith, and environmental issues. Most Taizé songs are very brief, beautiful, and are learned by rote (no need to be able to read music!), and then are repeated several times (with added singers or instrumentalists) as a meditative prayer.

We will also be expanding our choral repertoire as we will be adding a seasonal young adults choir (contact me if you are interested!) as well as incorporating more contemporary music for our younger choirs. And a few more things you'll be hearing about in the next Messenger - but if you don't want to wait, feel free to just come say hi and ask me questions any time!







I would like to start out by saying a big "thank you!" to everyone for the warm welcome that I have received as I start my ministry and internship year here in Haddonfield.

By way of introduction, my name is Josh Pontious and I will be serving as Vicar/Intern here at LCOS for the next year. Vicar Josh works just fine, just don't call me Pastor yet, I haven't gotten that far in the process! Before coming here, I have been a student at United Lutheran Seminary in Philadelphia for the past 2 years, studying for my Master's in Divinity.

Before moving to Philly, I lived in Southeast Florida with my wife Rebecca, and my son Grayson who, as of this writing, is three and a half years old. You'll see them around from time to time, as their own schedules allow. Be the change God's world needs!





### 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly Summary; Aug 5-10 in Milwaukee

Our denomination, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, holds a Churchwide assembly triennially – to worship, vote on matters of governance and policy, and be church together for the sake of the world. This year's assembly was full of important votes and actions, including:

- Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton being reelected for a second six-year term on the first ballot.
- Deacon Sue Rothmeyer being elected as Churchwide Secretary, a full-time position which acts as executive administrator and leader on all constitutional matters and interpretation.
- Adopted a constitutional change for Deacons (rostered ministers of Word and Service) to be ordained, rather than the previous practice of consecration.
- Extended a declaration of apology to our siblings of African descent, which was received by the African Descent Lutheran Association with thanks and a call to accountability and living into the words shared in the document.
- Approved the resolution declaring the ELCA as a "sanctuary church body," that encourages participation in the ELCA AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation, and Opportunities) Initiative for migrant children, discernment of care for our immigrant neighbors in our context, and the promise of forthcoming resources for this work. - Approved a resolution for support of the World Council of Church's *Thursdays in Black*, an awareness movement for a world without rape and violence.
- Approved the Declaration of Inter-religious Commitment, reaffirming ecumenical interfaith partnerships.
- Adopted a new Social Statement: "Faith, Sexism, and Justice: a Lutheran Call to Action," and its implementing resolutions.
- Approved various memorials that included; affirming, but not endorsing the Poor People's Campaign and its efforts to address the impact of racism on poverty, care for immigrants and refugees, and other statements.
- Approved the recommendations from a strategic taskforce which has been studying how to work toward authentic diversity in our church (ELCA is "whitest" denomination at 97%)
