Unity & Fellowship Sunday Set for Jan 26; Combined Worship @ 9:30 Followed by Brunch and Annual Meeting

On Sunday, January 26 Our Savior will hold one worship service at 9:30 so members from the regular three worship times can worship together as one congregation. Immediately

following worship the congregation will move to the Parish Hall for a sumptuous brunch prior to the Annual Meeting that will follow. Turkey and ham will be served. Please bring a side to share; breakfast casseroles, bagels & cream cheese, fruit, stuffing, sweet potatoes, veggies, mac & cheese are just a few suggestions. There will be separate activities for children on the 3rd Floor while parents participate in the Annual Meeting scheduled to end by noon. Why one service prior to the Annual Meeting?

- 1. It creates the opportunity for the congregation to truly worship as a unified body of Christ rather than a segmented one.
- 2. It provides members who regularly attend one service the opportunity to meet and enjoy fellowship with regular members of the other worship services.
- 3. Members with children in Sunday afternoon activities can participate in the Annual Meeting.

The Council realizes this may be an inconvenience for some, especially those who will need to get children up and ready for worship and Sunday school 60 minutes earlier than usual. We also believe the benefit will greatly outweigh the cost. It is their sincere hope as many of the congregation will mark their calendars to attend this year's Unity Fellowship Sunday Worship and Annual Meeting on January 26 with worship at 9:30 and brunch following immediately afterward.

At the Annual Meeting the main topics of discussion will include:


- Use of a \$25,000 gift toward children, youth, and young adult ministry and how it might best foster and enhance our ministry to and with that segment of our congregation and community around us.
- Also, three Congregation Council members and two members of the Memorial Gifts Board will need to
 be elected by a quorum of the congregation to serve three and four year terms respectively. Laurie Eason
 (Secretary), Glen Martin (Property), and Gary Visconti (Christian Education) will all be going off council. We offer our most heartfelt thanks to Mike Fallon (Chair) and Bob Mirabello who will both be completing their second four-year term on the Memorial Gift Board.
- Finally, the **2020 Financial Plan for Ministry will be voted on**. The final Financial Plan will not be fully prepared until after the January Council meeting, and the Congregation Resources ministry team is confident the 2019 Ministry Fall Campaign commitments along with estimated giving from non-pledging members will meet the challenge for supporting our current and future ministry in 2020.



dren baptized last year at Our Savior, I will also be baptizing Jack Angelone and Connor Glass. They are cousins and the third of three children in their respective families. Their moms are sisters and grew up in this church along with two other sisters, one who has also baptized and is raising her two children here. And like those previous baptisms I will be asking them and their spouses to make the same promise and accept the same responsibilities.

To LIVE WITH THEM among God's faithful people, BRING THEM to the word of God and the holy supper, TEACH THEM the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments, PLACE IN THEIR HANDS, the holy scriptures, and NURTURE THEM in faith and prayer.

Keeping these promises is not always easy. In fact, at times it may seem impossible and certainly not convenient. But when we do we are sometimes surprised at how deeply our children's faith life with God and the body of Christ can become.

At the marriage altar vows of faithfulness and love are exchanged. The couple makes a promise to each other for the rest of their lives. In November I had the honor of officiating the marriage of Spencer and Gina, and while I'm not a huge fan of personalized vows I was blown away when Spencer began his to Gina. Paraphrasing he said, "Gina, when I was born I lived in that house right outside that window. My parents used to pick me up and carry me around the corner and walk up those steps into this church. I was baptized in that font. I received my first communion at that rail. Some of my best memories are of VBS and Sunday school and youth group at this church. And today I get to have my dream come true as I stand at this altar on our wedding day and become your husband."

The next day I baptized a baby who lives down the street and led his parents through the same promises. I hope and pray he has a similar experience of faith formation and sense of community with the body of Christ that gathers at The Lutheran Church of Our Savior. His parents will obviously play a big role in that, as Spencer's parents did (his mom admitted at the reception it wasn't always easy and their children didn't always like it). Yet, they are not the only ones who get to be a part of keeping baptismal responsibilities. We do too, the people of God, whether we witnessed the baptism or not. There are a "cloud of witnesses" that are involved in a child's faith formation and as we enter a new year and about five weeks in a row of baptisms on Sunday morning we would do well to be mindful of the implicit promises we make at a child's baptism.

We promise to welcome them in worship; to help teach them the words of the liturgy when they are seated next to us as well as help them learn our hymns. We promise to nurture them in the faith when we volunteer for Sunday school, Vacation Bible School, confirmation Guides, youth advisors, or simply are willing to engage in conversation with them during Coffee Hour in listen to the ups and downs of their lives. We promise to pray for them and especially at those special times in their lives of faith; first communion, first Bible, during confirmation, and as they graduate from high school and enter the next big leg of their journey of life and faith.

Our New Year resolution may not make it past Groundhog Day, but I pray the promise and vow we make to each other in Baptism and Affirmation of Baptism be a vow we keep every day by the Holy Spirit's power. Happy New Year!

Bible Discussion for Daily Life on Gospel of John

An early-church father, Clement of Alexandria, described the Gospel of John as a "spiritual account" of Jesus' life and teaching. Often considered more theological than historical, the portrait of Jesus in the Gospel of John is very different from the other Gospels. John includes stories about Jesus that do not appear in Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Some of these differences will be the focus of our discussions over the weeks and we hope you can attend any one of them as John is the Gospel readings during the season of Easter and interspersed throughout the year.

This is not a Bible lecture but rather a discussion of how what we read in Scripture is applicable to our daily life and faith. Attend either Mondays from 7:30-9:00 in Room 112 or Wednesday mornings from 9:30-11:00. **No prior attendance or scriptural knowledge is required to gain insight and value from the discussion.** Just drop on in. Breaking Down the Great Commission- Vicar Josh Pontious

And Jesus came and said to them,

"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, <u>baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit</u>, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matthew 28:18-20

Baptism and the Trinity

This is probably the easiest section of the Great Commission for the average church member to brush aside. Baptism is definitely one of those things that we can easily leave in the hands of our pastors! We don't all get to do that (well except in emergency situations, but don't worry about that today).

What's more important to note here, is that when we reach out into our communities and friend circles, and begin intentional processes of disciple making, baptism is important. If a person we encounter is beginning their intentional faith journey hasn't been baptized yet, it would be great if some of the encouragement (not pushing) came from a close friend and not just from the pastor.

Also, just because we're talking with people who don't have much of a relationship with the church, with God and are just getting started with this whole Christianity stuff, doesn't mean that they weren't baptized in the past. If they've ever been baptized at ANY church or by any tradition that uses the Trinitarian formula (Father, Son, Holy Spirit), then it doesn't need to happen again.

That formula given to us by Christ is all we need. Water, Word. Done!

To keep it super simple and easy to remember:

- 1. Baptism is super important!
- 2. It only has to happen once, and it doesn't matter much where.





What do you really need for Christmas?



For music nerd me, it is squeezing in listening as much of Bach's "Christmas Oratorio" as I possibly can before heading off to Christmas Eve services, it's the glorious chord on "Word of the Father, now in flesh appearing" in the hymn "O Come All Ye Faithful"... but it's also the peace that immediately sets in in my heart when I hear the opening notes of "Still, Still, Still" or "Silent Night" – or both of those things together, as you heard at the end of our Lessons and Carols service.

We do not need gold or presents to know it is Christmas in our hearts. May the peace of God be with you during this season and always.




