Our Savior Hosts Homeless for 2 Weeks Beginning Feb 23 Volunteers Needed

The Interfaith Homeless Outreach Council (IHOC) runs a program for up to 12 homeless men that begins in November and runs until May when they graduate. The men are pro-

vided with training, career and life skill counseling before seeking and securing employment during the program as well as attend addiction counseling and support groups. By the end of the program the men are completely self-sufficient and able to move into housing and live on a budget their income can afford. During the program they stay for two-weeks in different locations and from Feb 23 until March 8 the men will be lodging at Our Savior and eating dinners here every night. Here is what we will need from the congregation to make their stay here possible.

Sleeping Area: The cots the men sleep on will be set up in our Parish Hall and during those two weeks there will be no outside or congregational activities that will be held in that space. Last year the mop sink in the ground floor custodial closet was converted to a shower for the men to use during their stay. They will have access to the Youth Room in order to relax, read, or watch TV or movies at night or during the day on the weekends.

Schedule: The men will leave Our Savior by 6:30 a.m. and return no sooner than 4:00 each weekday. During that time they will either be in counseling, searching for a job, or working at one after being hired. On the weekends they will either be here at Our Savior or engaged in an activity as a group (e.g. go bowling, to the movies, laundromat, etc.) as some congregations provide the funds for some recreational activities. Prior to leaving in the morning the men will make their breakfast and lunch from grocery supplies the congregation volunteers will have provided. In the evening the Dinner Host will make the meal at Our Savior as well as eat with the men and engage in conversation. The men are also required to attend a 12-Step Program at least once a week.

Volunteers Needed: There are basically three categories of volunteers needed.

Breakfast or Lunch Supplies Provider: Volunteers would provide the food supplies for either breakfast or lunch for the men to prepare on their own. 14 of each will be needed.

<u>Dinner Hosts</u>: An individual or family volunteer will be at the church from 4:00 until 7:00 on the night they host. During that time they will prepare the meal and eat with the men as a means to get to know them and be a support to their participation in the program.


Overnight/Weekend Hosts: An overnight host must be a man who is expected to arrive by 7:00 p.m. and remain in the church until 7:00 the next morning or until all the men have left if sooner. A cot will be provided and overnight hosts are encouraged to socialize with the men at their discretion. Weekend hosts will be asked to remain in the church in two shifts beyond the Overnight Host shift; from 7:00-Noon and Noon-4:00 when the Dinner Host arrives.


A signup of all of the various volunteer positions will be made available online and at church. You can sign up on Sunday before or after worship or sign up online. Either way we hope you make a point to volunteer for one aspect of this new opportunity to participate in an amazingly successful ministry.

that is predominantly Christian no longer exists. Even more so, we need to stop sitting Shiva for those days as they aren't coming back – ever. The days of your boss asking on Monday what your pastor preached about are gone. The days of children striving for perfect attendance in Sunday school more than they did public school are extinct. The days of the church being the hub of a family's social life are as dead as disco.

And because our world has changed we cannot expect the way the church operated in the last half of the 20th century to work in the next half of the 21st. Doing the same thing over and over with no change in the results is the definition of insanity, yet we think and believe, "If only we could bring back this program or these events we'll have all the volunteers and people we need to keep our church vibrant and strong." But is that why we do what we do? To keep the institution of the church going strong? Shouldn't our answer to why we do what we do be in line with what God's vision and mission is in the world rather than simply what will get people in the pews or kids in choirs on Sunday?

Full disclosure: seminary didn't prepare me for this either. I was trained to be a pastor for the church of Christendom, not the mission church of the first century. In order for me to lead as pastor I already know I'll need to learn new skills and trust new and different partners along the way. Even more so, I'll likely need to leave behind some of the tools of the trade I was trained to use as they will no longer be useful. And so in 2020 I'll be spending time discovering what the new world the church is facing really looks like rather than pining for the one that baptized me so I can be prepared to lead with you into the 21st century.

I can already hear the groans. "That sounds a lot like a lot of change is heading our way, Pastor Wayne, and you know how we feel about change!" I agree. But maybe if instead of thinking of it as change we think of it as an adventure we are on for the sake of the gospel and becoming what God needs the church, at least our church, to be might make it – well – exhilarating. When was the last time you were on an adventure? As a child? On a vacation? Were there challenges along the way? I'll bet. But was it exciting in the course of it? I'll bet that's true as well.

2020 is a good year to begin talking about vision, God's preferred vision for how the church can be a part of fulfilling God's mission in the world – a world that is vastly different from the one of only a few decades ago. I invite you to join me in this adventure and if you have any ideas or insights or simply want to talk about it I'm always up for cup of coffee. Until then may you see clearly in this new year and beyond.

This is not a Bible lecture but rather a discussion of how what we read in Scripture is applicable to our daily life and faith. 2020 Summer Mission Trip Interest Meeting February 9 @ 6:00 for LCOS Members

On Sunday night, February 9, at 6:00 there will be an interest meeting for both youth and parents of LCOS on this year's Summer Mission Trip (SMT) to North Carolina. Any youth who will be 16 or older by July 11, along with his/her parents, is encouraged to attend this highly informational meeting about an event that has literally changed the lives of youth and adults participating. The dates for the SMT are scheduled for July 11-18 and the group looks forward to working again with the Winston-Salem Habitat for Humanity of Forsyth County in North Carolina.

Over the last 12 years participants have framed the floors, walls and roofs, installed siding and porch railings, built a handicap ramp, large sheds, painted doors and trim, landscaped, and even shingled a roof! This HFH chapter has their own volunteer lodge that houses up to 20 male and 20 female participants and last year we had plenty to do on the jobsite with very experienced construction leaders. There will be a major fundraiser in April or May to defray the required \$150/participant donation to HFH that goes

toward building materials. The group is limited to 30 teens and six adults to insure sufficient work for the number of workers.

Parents ought to consider also participating regardless of your construction skills. Some adult volunteers have shopped and cooked rather than be on the jobsite, which greatly facilitates our time after work for devotions and fun activities. As mentioned above, it is a life changing event for any and all who participate. Come out on Sunday night, February 9 at 6:00pm and find out how.

Due to the extreme popularity of this trip in the Haddonfield High School the trip has previously become full before members had a chance to sign up, which is why the meeting on Feb 9 is for LCOS members only. There will also be second Information Night on Sunday, February 23 for any youth interested in attending regardless if they are members of Our Savior or not. If you have friends who are interested tell them about the Feb 23 meeting.



Breaking Down the Great Commission-Vicar Josh Pontious



And Jesus came and said to them,

"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matthew 28:18-20

What are we supposed to teach?

One of the most common fears that people share with me when it comes to sharing their faith with other people, and invite them into a relationship with their church, or their creator is this: "I won't know what to say! I don't have all the answers! How do I explain everything!" I know, it can seem daunting, this place in the Great Commission where Jesus calls us to "teach everything" to these new people that we encounter.

Ready for the Good News? This part is actually super simple.

The truth is, we aren't each called to be perfect teachers to every person we meet. Church is a community where people gather and learn, together! So, when faced with the task of teaching others, I say stick to the basics. Remember how Jesus put it so simply earlier in the Gospel of Matthew, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself."

Tell people that. Show them how your faith and your faith community help you to do that, not just on Sunday mornings, but throughout the week. And then you can invite them to join you into times where you don't just participate in those things, but come into worship and bible study situations where they can learn just what all of that can mean.

- 1. Love God
- 2. Love neighbor
- 3. Figure out the details later!

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The Work of Christmas (All Year Round)

I often wonder who is organized and "grown up" enough to take down the Christmas decorations the day Christmas is over. Maybe you are - you have my utmost respect if you are that person. But looking around, I still see many houses with their Christmas decorations, their trees, their lights, their wreaths. Maybe they were like me, and left the house as soon as Christmas services were played to visit family far away and just now got back, or maybe they need to hang on to the feeling of light and peace for a little longer, or maybe "putting Christmas away" just feels like so much work, they just haven't found the energy yet, maybe this, maybe that...

There is a poem that comes to mind as I drive around town seeing these "leftovers" of Christmas. It's called "The Work of Christmas" by Howard Thurman, an author and civil rights leader of the twentieth century (I encourage you to look him up, he was a wonderful person).



When the song of the angels is stilled,
When the star in the sky is gone,
When the kings and princes are home,
When the shepherds are back with their flock,
The work of Christmas begins:
To find the lost,
To heal the broken,
To feed the hungry,
To release the prisoner,
To rebuild the nations,
To bring peace among all,
To make music in the heart.



So often as soon as the presents are unpacked, the guests fed, the decorations put away (or not), we want to be done with Christmas and move on to the next thing. But the Work of Christmas is something that happens all year round. As I read the description of that work in the poem, I think of the church and how the ELCA motto "God's Work - Our Hands" reflects that work so well. Even as the song of the angels is stilled, our hymns and anthems still continue the words of the Work of Christmas. My prayer is that we may all be moved to continue the Work of Christmas throughout all of 2020 and beyond - with our songs, our hands, our words, our actions. If you want to "make music in the heart" a little bit more tangible and literal, come make music with us - in one of our choirs, or just by singing out a little bit more during our hymns - it may be just what your pew neighbor might need to hear that morning, or maybe what you yourself need to hear. The Work of Christmas begins with one note, one word, one action, with you, with me, with all of us, with God-with-us.

Ash Wednesday Worship Feb 26 @ Noon & 7:30; Ash & Dash 7:00-8:30 at Westmont PATCO Station

Ash Wednesday worship has long heralded the beginning of Lent. On February 26 at both Noon and 7:30PM The Lutheran Church of Our Savior will hold this worship service of confession, reflection, and the imposition of ashes to begin the Lenten journey toward Holy Week and Easter. This ancient ritual is filled with spiritual significance for Christians. Here are the main ones.



"Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return." These are the words spoken by the pastor as an ashen cross is smudged on one's brow. Like the words spoken at a funeral committal, ashes are a reminder of our mortality and finitude. They remind us we cannot escape death, no matter how hard we may try to keep it at arm's length or deny its reality in our lives.

Ashes remind us how at one time they were rubbed on one's skin to eliminate hard to remove dirt. Lent is also a time of cleansing and renewal. We pray along with the psalmist to "create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me", and are reminded of God's cleansing Spirit of renewal in our lives.

Finally, because the smudged cross is made with ashes mixed with oil, we are reminded of the mark with oil placed on our brow at baptism. We remember the promise we were given, "Child of God, you have been sealed with the Holy Spirit, and marked with the cross of Christ forever." In the waters of baptism we have been joined to both the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. And while the ashes remind us of our eventual death, the smudged cross reminds us death does not have the last word. As people "of the smudge" we are people who trust in the resurrection to new life it offers through faith in the risen Christ. In Lent we journey both toward the cross and the empty tomb. And this gives us hope.

In these days we need a reminder of hope as we rush from one place to the next. So Pastor Wayne Zschech and any who choose to join him will be offering the imposition of ashes at the Westmont PATCO station for an "Ash & Dash Experience" from 7:00-8:30 am on February 26.
