Blessing of Pets/Animals on Oct 4 at 5:30

St. Francis of Assisi has long been associated with being the patron saint of animals whose commemoration as a renewer of the church is observed on October 4. As a way of remembering this Saint of the Church and our calling by God to care for creation and its creatures The Lutheran Church of Our Savior will hold a Blessing of the Animals service on Sunday, October 4, beginning at 5:30 p.m. outside in and around the Memorial Garden area.

Members, friends, and neighbors are invited to bring their pets for a blessing service that will include prayer, readings, singing, and a blessing of the animals by Pastor Wayne Zschech for those who bring their pets to the service. Please have your pets either on a leash, crated, caged, or in a bowl for the blessing. If you prefer to remain in your car to insure social distancing please be sure to park along the church side of Wayne Avenue or across the street from the church on Wood Lane. Be sure to let your neighbors know as well as your friends as this is open to the public just as are all our worship services. Observing Our History's Closet Skeletons in October Can Lead to Healing and Wholeness By Pastor Wayne Zschech

Do you have any skeletons in your closet? Granted in October most skeletons are on people's lawns or propped up against trees, doors, or windows for Halloween, but there are other skeletons in the closets of our history that October's celebrations remind us we have hidden over the years.

When I was a boy my mother was proud to tell us her great-great grandmother was a Cherokee Indian. I remember us singing Cher's hit, "Cherokee People" with pride. I remember wondering if she traveled The Trail of Tears. Years later my aunt revealed a portrait of her when Kate and I were visiting family in West Virginia, confirming the legend of this ancestor was not just a folk tale. Her chocolate colored skin and features clearly revealed she was not from Europe. We really were of Native American descent.

When Kate joined Ancestry. Com we learned even more about her. Her name was Euthlike, also known as Liney, and she wasn't Cherokee, but a member of the Chickasaw Nation. She was married to Edmund Okchantubby Pickens, whose father was white and mother was Chickasaw. In 1837 Edmund and Liney, along with their children, began their forced removal (the Trail of Tears) from the old Chickasaw nation and settled in the Choctaw/Chickasaw lands of Indian Territory on the Red River. Later Edmund would become the first elected and consequently last Chickasaw chief of the Chickasaw Nation after being instrumental in creating a Chickasaw constitution. He served in the new Chickasaw government and supported and served as a captain in the Confederacy during the Civil War.

He did a lot more before his death, but that's my history to remember. The thing is, with all that Edmund Pickens did and achieved in his life, why is it the only thing my mother knew about her Native American ancestry was that Edmund's wife was, incorrectly, a Cherokee Indian? As OkChanTubby and Euthlike's descendants married into white families and settled further East into the Scotch-Irish areas of West Virginia was it more advantageous to hide the skeleton of their dark-skinned heritage, with both its suffering and success, in the closet of their family history?

Kate and I were married on October 12, the day our nation officially remembers Christopher Columbus and his discovery of the Americas. It has also become known as Indigenous People's Day; a holiday that celebrates and honors Native American peoples and commemorates their histories and cultures. It began as a counter-celebration to Columbus Day, with many believing the celebration of Christopher Columbus' discovery also covers up his actions of enslaving Native Americans. Our nation's history has skeletons in its closet and Indigenous People's Day reminds us of this fact.

I often tell people, "You can't change what happened in the past. But you can effect what the future will be by what you choose to do today." I wonder how my attitudes and actions toward the current challenges and suffering of Native Americans living on reservations today would be impacted if I learned more about my Chickasaw heritage as much as I know about my German one? Many descendants of those indigenous people Columbus encountered and enslaved are still suffering today from legislation that created perpetual suffering from one generation to the next.

As baptized Christians of predominantly European descent who promised to "strive to work for justice and peace in all the earth" at our Affirmation of Baptism what does it mean for us to examine the "skeleton in the closet" of our nation's historical actions toward this country's indigenous peoples, or any ethnic group that has been disenfranchised or alienated by those in power? Is learning our history and listening to their stories the beginning of the journey toward healing and wholeness in this land?

I believe so. We must first be willing to listen, even if what we hear is painful and hard to accept. The good news is as people of the Resurrection we trust from the font that we cannot experience new life without first experiencing a death. One day that history of the Trail of Tears might also include a Journey of Jubilee if we are willing to be led by the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, knowledge and the fear of the Lord we first received in Baptism. As we journey together, may the saints who've gone before us inspire our steps together. Happy Halloween.



Worship Assistants Needed for 8:00 Sanctuary Worship

Now that worship in the

sanctuary has resumed at Our Savior during the 8:00 service there is a need for Worship Assistants (ushers extraordinaire) to volunteer each week. The primary role of the worship assistant/usher during this pandemic period of sanctuary worship has two major prongs;

- TRANSMISSION CONTROL: Insure EVERY-ONE entering the sanctuary is wearing a mask covering nose and mouth as well as sanitizing their hands immediately upon entering the building or sanctuary. This greatly reduces the risk of transmission.
- SOCIAL DISTANCING CONTROL: This is effectively done by directing worship participants to ON-LY SIT IN RESERVED PEWS and to be seated from THE FRONT TO THE BACK and dismissed in reverse (the first really are last and the last first it seems!)

Haddonfield Child Care Closes; Our Savior Explores Taking Up the Torch

About thirty-five years ago a group of dual-working parents whose half-day kindergarteners had no childcare for the other half of the day established the Haddonfield Child Care (HCC) or Early Development Kindergarten Program (EDKP). They provided both supplemental education for kindergarten children in the program as well as before and after school childcare in the various Haddonfield schools. For the last seven years the HCC has called Our Savior their home as we've provided both the classrooms for the children and teachers as well as the

administrative office space for this community need. Sadly, with the Haddonfield School Board choosing a different company to provide the before/after school care program and Covid-19 forcing virtual education for the 2020-21 school year the HCC Board voted to close rather than suspend their services until the pandemic was past.

However, while the Coronavirus may have shut the door on the HCC the Holy Spirit may be opening a window of opportunity for Our Savior to take up the torch of providing kindergarten wrap-around childcare as well as summer camp childcare for dual-working parents for not only Haddonfield, but our neighbors in Haddon Township and Haddon Heights. The Congregation Council has begun exploring what would be involved for The Lutheran Church of Our Savior to take over this "ministry" to the local community beginning in the 2021-2022 school year if not by the summer of 2021 by providing various childcare camps. This childcare ministry would have two objectives:

- Provide a wrap-around childcare for up to 40 kindergarten children per session during the school year.
- Provide childcare camps during school holidays and summer months when childcare options are desperately

Pastor Wayne and the Council both believe this is a community need Our Savior is already equipped to address since we've been providing the facility for its operation for nearly a decade. Director Donna Marie Clancy has already agreed and is eager to facilitate the transition as she has raised the quality of this program over the last three years serving as its director and knows there is more we can do. A Steering Committee will need to be formed to begin addressing the various questions and tasks necessary in transitioning from the stellar program provided by HCC under Ms. Clancy's leadership to one that melds our current ministry with this expanded and much needed one in our community.

A proposal will be made at the January Annual Meeting for the congregation to vote on and we hope the congregation's support, questions, and concerns are raised throughout the process. While Our Savior is still in the exploratory stages of this proposal it is the intent that the Childcare Program not be an additional financial expense to the General Fund, but will operate with complete self-sufficiency.

If you would like to know more about this ministry opportunity and/or volunteer to help determine its viability and/or serve on the Steering Committee please contact Pastor Wayne. We know some of our members have been served by the HCC in the past and even served on its Board. We hope you might consider volunteering again. Until then please pray for those who will be gathering information and discerning what is best to serve the needs of those in our community with a childcare ministry that has been a blessing to many in the past.

The Greatest Commandment

Hi Everyone! I have been thinking about starting a new series for my messenger articles. Each month, I am going to take one of the Bible stories that the Sunday School program will learn about during the month and expand on how we can relate it to our everyday lives. For the month of October, I have decided to focus on what will be our lesson on October 25th, this will also be the Gospel we will hear during worship. Our story is "The Greatest Commandment", this

can be found in Matthew 22:34-46. If you have a copy of a Spark Story Bible by Sparkhouse you can follow along with this story. In this story Jesus is asked by the Pharisees "What is the greatest law?". When the Pharisees asked this question, he did not expect an answer, he wanted to trick Jesus. But Jesus responded by saying, "Love God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." He also added there is another one that is very important. "Love your neighbor as your-self, If you obey these two laws, then you obey all of the law."

So how can we relate these two Commandments to our everyday lives? Let's look at the first one, to love God with all our heart, soul and mind. What is a way you can do this? How about saying a prayer as a family before dinner or before bed. You could thank God for all that was provided for you during the day. One of the best ways to show your love for God is by giving thanks. We can also show God our love by taking care of God's greatest creation by taking care of our Earth. Do you know one simple way to take care of the Earth? Here are a few of my favorite ways; turning off the water while I am brushing my teeth, turning off the lights when I leave a room and using a reusable water bottle (I know a lot of you have seen my BIG water bottle!). These are just a few simple ways we can show God our love.

We are helping our neighbors around the world with our offering. Did you know that when you bring food to the pantry that you are showing your love to your neighbor? Right again! We are helping our neighbors who are in need of meals. I want to hear how you are going to show your love for your neighbors this month.

If your child wants to learn more about this story or the other stories we are learning about in Sunday School, please join us for Zoom Sunday School. This is opened to all kids 3 years old to 6th grade. Each week, I will read the Bible story and we will

have a little chat about the story. If your child cannot join us every week, that is fine. If they want to stop by and try it out, that is fine too! I will be recording a short video each week that you can watch at your convenience on our website, if you cannot join us between 9:30 to 10:10 on Sunday mornings. Stewards of God's Love

When we make the sign of the cross, we start by making a vertical line down from our heads to our hearts. This symbolic movement reminds us that everything we have—tangible and intangible— comes *down* from God. We have only to look around to see his beautiful creation and abundance that sustain us; we have only to ask to experience his love and blessings.

The ultimate gift that comes down to us is Jesus, the very reason for our Christian faith. God comes down to us directly through Jesus. As we learned in what is most likely the first Bible verse we memorized, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." When we accept Jesus as God's son come down to us, we receive forgiveness, grace and salvation.

According to Clarence Stoughton, former president of Wittenberg University, stewardship is everything we do after we say "I believe." It is the way in which we use all of the resources that God has entrusted to our care so that we can love God and our neighbor.

In November at LCOS we will be giving our annual stewardship response. Please take some time over the next few weeks to ask yourself in what ways has God come down to you in love? How are you stewarding the grace, the story and the creation that God has entrusted to you?

Martin Luther taught that it is precisely in places where we would least expect to find God, in suffering, pain, disaster, catastrophe, and pandemics – and in the cross – that God is clearly present. Lamentations, then, does more than simply express despair. It shows us that in the most difficult of times and places God is present and hears our desperate cries for help.
