Pre-Recorded Christmas Eve Candlelight Worship Planned During Pandemic

Sadly the impact of the Coronavirus pandemic that prevented us from celebrating the Resurrection of Our Lord at Easter in our sanctuary will also prevent us from gathering at church for the celebration of Our Savior's birth at Christmas. The worship staff realize for many families their Christmas Eve traditions include a particular time for attending worship for a variety of reasons. Rather than pick which time (5:00, 8:00, or 10:00) to provide a livestream worship the staff will be pre-recording our traditional Christmas Eve worship that includes a variety of musical anthems, a children's sermon, and a traditional sermon. We invite you to acquire candles you can light in your home while singing "Silent Night" at the end of the worship. We plan to make the video available by noon on Christmas Eve on our Facebook page as well as from our website.

And we can use your help in making this Christmas Eve worship special. We realize many people reconnect with other congregation members and family at our Christmas Eve worship. In an effort to provide the opportunity for you and your family to offer Christmas greetings to the congregation we invite you to dress in your Christmas attire and send us a few second video greeting from your family to the congregation that we can include in the worship video we will air on December 24. Deck the Halls Dec. 6 at Noon

In order to maintain safe social distancing protocols while decorating the church and narthex for Christmas, Pastor Wayne and Jamie Frazier have broken down the tasks into time slots for confirmation youth and their families to sign up to complete. The various tasks and the number of families needed for each one are as follows.

- Erecting the pulpit, lectern, and narthex artificial trees (3 families needed) Noon-12:45
- Hanging the lights on the narthex and sanctuary trees (2 families needed) 12:45-1:15
- Decorating the sanctuary trees with Christmons and the narthex tree with angels and ornaments (3 families needed) 1:15-1:45
- Clean up of all the bins and boxes that will be stored under the back stairwell (1-2 families needed) 1:45-2:00 There will also be an opportunity for families to sign up for the January un-decking the church that is the above in reverse. Because Covid is currently on the rise and mostly all the recipients of the poinsettias are in the high risk category if contracting the virus, the staff has agreed it is in the best interest of the congregation to not deliver poinsettias to the homebound members this year. We are deeply saddened in making this decision and look forward to the day when the traditions that keep us connected as the body of Christ will once again be possible.

"This Christmas Will Be Like None Other, But It Still Comes" By Pastor Wayne Zschech

No Children's Christmas pageant at church. No live Advent Lessons and Carols in worship. No Christmas caroling in the neighborhood. No jam-packed Christmas Eve candlelight services in the church. The coronavirus has once again will prevent Christians from gathering in churches to sing and celebrate a high holy day as at Easter. This time it keeps us from celebrating and singing the carols of Christ's birth we traditionally

and faithfully do each year on Christmas Eve. Yet, while it will not be the same, the celebration of Christmas still comes. If the gifts aren't all wrapped – Christmas still comes. If the cookies weren't all made or the store was out of a key ingredient for the dinner – Christmas still comes. If the extended family cannot gather in one home around a crowded table as we traditionally do (which for some families relieves them from having to visit two to three different homes in one day) – Christmas still comes. If we cannot sit in church to hear the Nativity of our Lord read, sing with hundreds of voices the carols of Christmas, or receive the host of Christ with the host of Christ's church gathered for Christmas Eve worship – Christmas still comes. The celebration of God's love for us made manifest in the babe born in Bethlehem, God becoming flesh and dwelling among us, still comes regardless of the limitations and restrictions this pandemic has inflicted upon us.


So the question that remains for us is this; "How will we uniquely celebrate the birth of Christ this year with worship in our home?" Our Savior's worship staff will be preparing a Christmas Eve candlelight worship recording that will be available by noon on Christmas Eve for anyone with internet access to participate in from their home from our Facebook page. We will also provide a link from our website for those who don't have Facebook. We will also do our best to make DVD copies for members without internet to watch from their DVD players at home. And because this will not be a livestreamed worship we will not be celebrating Holy Communion. Here are some ideas you might consider in celebrating Christ's birth as you worship from home this year.

- Determine in your Christmas Eve or Christmas Day plans when you will celebrate the Nativity in worship. Just like any year, plan what time you will worship.
- Host a "Watch Party" on your Facebook page if you are able. You might also invite family and friends to worship with you from their home knowing that as you are singing the carols of Christmas in your home so too are the people you normally are sitting in the pew with on Christmas Eve.
- Dress up as you would for attending worship on Christmas Eve at church. It's a special night. Why not dress for the occasion?
- If you can link your computer to your TV screen so the image is larger you may have a better sense of "being in church" even though you're at home. The sound will also be better.
- Get the worship materials you'll need such as candles for singing Silent Night.
- The words to the carols will be on the screen so you won't need a worship book or even a bulletin.
- Finally, and actually a week before December 24, we invite you to send a few second video clip of your family wishing Merry Christmas to those who will be watching. Consider it your sharing of the Christmas Peace video we can combine with all those provided in a montage of greetings before the worship and possibly during the Peace.

Yes, this will be a Christmas like none other, but it will still come. Jesus wasn't born into a serene and idyllic world; an occupied nation, no room for lodging, a stable birth and a manger crib, not to mention a massacre of the innocents after his birth was known. Yet, Jesus still came down to live among us to bear witness to the hope and love and life our God provides to all who trust and have faith. And Jesus still comes to us each and every day, despite a pandemic that would keep us apart, and draws us together as the body of Christ to shine the light of hope at Christmas. Let it shine brightly in your homes this year as we sing from our living rooms, family rooms, or dining rooms that Christ is born to save. Merry Christmas.

Add the actual number of people joining the Reflections service by Zoom to get the total number in attendance for any given week.

** \$46,168 under what was budgeted. The lack of weekly loose offerings and special holiday giving in the collection plate, such as at Easter and Christmas, has contributed significantly to this deficit. Without additional revenue, the deficit is projected to be \$46,000 at year end.

John the Baptist

In the month of December, our Sunday School kids will be learning about John the Baptist for 2 different weeks. So I think this month it is really important to dig a little deeper into who John the Baptist was and why he was so important. In short, John the Baptist was a messenger from God to tell the people that Jesus was coming. But John the Baptist was not like the rest of the people around him. He was known to be very hairy and to have a very long beard. John the Baptist may have looked like some family members who haven't had a haircut since the Pandemic has started. In our Sparkhouse Bible it tells the kids, "His (John) clothes were made of camel's hair, held together with a leather belt! John ate strange foods, including wild honey and locusts, a kind of grasshopper." "YUCK!" So I am sure if you were to see someone that looked like John the Baptist running towards you, you may be a little confused. But God picked John the Baptist to tell that Jesus was being born and how to prepare for this amazing moment. The most important thing that John the Baptist told the people was to tell God that they were sorry for any of the sins that they committed. The best part about John the Baptist spreading this great news is that so many different people came together to hear him. Some people were rich, some were poor, some believed before and some did not. But they all came together to hear John the Baptist, this was not just an one day thing, this went on for many days.

You can find the stories in John 1:6-8; 19-28. I invite your family to read this together during the first two weeks of December. During this time I also want you to start talking about your child's baptism with them or even your own. The reasoning for this is because we will be talking about baptism in the coming weeks of Sunday School. I want them to be able to recognize that John the Baptist is the one who ended up baptizing Jesus. I also hope for you to talk to them about how someone that may not be the best dressed or most put together, was the one who brought so many people together to prepare for Jesus' birth.

I hope that you all have a very happy holiday! Christmas Eve may look a little different this year, but I will be doing a Christmas Eve Children's Sermon in our pre-recorded service. I will be asking a few questions and I hope to get an email with your child's answers. Please all stay safe and healthy during the holidays and I cannot wait to be with you all in 2021!

Tidings of Comfort and Joy

Any other year, when I mention thinking about Christmas music starting around September, people look at me like I am crazy (unless I am hanging out with other church musicians). But this year, I have friends who put up their Christmas tree on Election Day to distract themselves, and others who have been playing Christmas music for weeks now. Others yet said they're waiting until the second Thanksgiving is over (which makes you not even that far off liturgically, since Advent 1 is November 29th this year!). Maybe you're one of those people starting early, or may-

be you are in the camp of ushering in the season at the appropriate and right time.

But these aren't the regular times, are they? I personally started listening to "Lessons & Carols from King's College" (which I usually save for the week leading up to Christmas) this week, which any other year would feel blasphemous, weeks before Advent even begins. In the last weeks, I have revised our Advent/Lessons & Carols/Christmas music plans completely several times, as I watched COVID numbers climb higher and higher and heard from my parents in Germany who just began their second lockdown. What I ended up with are hymns and anthems we all know (with the exception of one new, simple anthem), so familiar you could probably all join the choir and record them with us (Did you really think I'd stop recruiting, even in a pandemic? Nah.). There will be nothing fancy or impressive, not only because of Coronaesque time and space constraints for the choir, but also because in a year where so much has been stripped away, we need music that is familiar and comforting. As the carol goes, "tidings of comfort and joy, comfort and joy, oh tidings of comfort and joy!"

I hope in these days, you find comfort and joy, be it through connection over a screen, phone, or a stroll or conversation outside. May you find comfort in hymns you know well. May you find joy as Christmas lights start to go up. May you give comfort when you see others struggling, and may you find comfort if the holidays are a hard time for you. In a world upside down, let us look to the comfort and joy we hear proclaimed in the message of Christmas - "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord." (Luke 2:10-11)

"Comfort, comfort now my people; tell of peace!" so says our God. Comfort those who sit in darkness mourning under sorrow's load. To God's people now proclaim that God's pardon waits for them! Tell them that their war is over; God will reign in peace forever. ELW 256
