Holy Week and Easter Worship – Now Live and by Livestream

It is hard to believe it has been a year since many have been inside the sanctuary to worship due to the Coronavirus pandemic, but providing there are no new surges in cases and infection rates, we plan to hold worship services both in person and by livestream this year for Holy Week and Easter. Those attending worship in person need to wear a mask covering nose and mouth and sanitize their hands upon entering the building. There are assigned pews in which to sit and each service will have unique pandemic protocols we will follow in conjunction with the unique features of the service. Here are the details.

Maundy Thursday, April 1 at Noon & 7:30pm: This service has three foci and we encourage you to participate with the following suggestions:


Absolution by Laying on of Hands: Whether you are in the church or at home you are invited at the time of absolution to place your hands on your head, as Pastor Wayne proclaims the absolution in worship. This may seem weird but you are encouraged to imagine you are feeling the hands of Jesus on your head, offering forgiveness.

Foot Washing: For those in the sanctuary this will be more of an observation than participation part of worship. However, for those participating by livestream you might consider placing your feet in a basin of warm water during the foot washing portion of the service. Have a towel handy to dry off as well.

Holy Communion: Individually packaged Holy Communion cups of grape juice with wafers will be located in the reserved pews for participants to take during the Meal portion of the worship. For those participating by livestream we invite you to have some bread and wine/grape juice available to share and eat when Holy Communion is celebrated in worship so you might feel connected to the Lord's Supper being shared by the body of Christ on this day.

Good Friday Tenebrae, April 2 at 7:30pm: We will hold the service of shadows on Good Friday that includes the reading of John's Passion narrative as well as the Bidding Prayer and prayers centered on the seven last words of Christ on the cross. While those in the sanctuary will have kneelers to use we invite livestream participants to create a way for you to kneel during the Bidding Prayer so you might experience the physical penitential aspect of this worship. You may also choose to light some candles in your home and darken the room where you are watching the livestream.

Resurrection of Our Lord, April 4 at 8:00, 9:30, and 11:00am: Please refer to the directions below for details on reserving "tickets" for the worship service time you and your family plan to attend. Social distancing protocols and the anticipated larger attendance dictated we utilize a means to assign seating for those attending to maximize each worship attendance. The livestream worship will be at 9:30 for those celebrating the Resurrection of Our Lord from home, and you are encouraged to prepare for Holy Communion worship with elements of bread and wine (or grape juice) for the Meal portion of worship.



Easter Sunday Attendance: Reserved Tickets Required

Easter Sunday Services will be held on Sunday, April 4, 2021, at 8:00am; 9:30am; and 11:00am. The livestream service on Facebook will be at the 9:30am service. Reserved tickets will be required for all services. They can be attained by contacting Sandy in the church office, 856-429-5122, if you do not have internet access. 
We can accommodate 70 to 100 people, depending on social distancing logistics, at each service, so that we can maintain 6ft apart per household in each pew. We will e-mail you your pew assignment.

There will be <u>assigned seats to maximize attendance</u>, those 2 and up will be <u>required to wear a mask</u> and <u>sanitize</u> hands. Sanitization stations will be located at each church entrance. Please enter through the sliding doors. If you intend on using the elevator, there will be sanitizing wipes by the elevator doors. Please wipe down the buttons that you touched inside and outside of the elevator. There will be **no** Nursery available.

"But We Had Hoped..."

would need to be socially distanced, but we had hoped both the ceremony and reception celebration would be mask-free and jam packed with joyous dancers. Yes, we had hoped. But now, like so many, we will wait until later in the year for such a celebration.

"But we had hoped." How many people have uttered these words in the last year? But we had hoped the virus would not touch our lives. But we had hoped mom would get off the ventilator. But we had hoped not to lose our job. But we had hoped the kids would be back in the classroom by now. But we had hoped the senior trip would be possible and we could have a prom. But we had hoped to be in church to worship by Easter, by Christmas, by Easter.

On the same day as Jesus' resurrection two of his disciples were on the road to Emmaus when the risen Christ joins them on their journey. "What are you talking about?" Jesus asks. They explain the events of the last few days, of Jesus who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God who was handed over by the leaders to be condemned to death and crucified. "But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel." It wasn't just Jesus who died on the cross for these disciples. It was their belief in a Messiah who would redeem Israel from their Roman occupiers. Their hope was in a national messiah, not a Savior who would defeat death itself for the sake of the whole world. Even after Jesus interprets the scriptures to reveal this truth to them it isn't until he breaks bread with them that his identity is disclosed. It is the Lord!

The disciples' definition of the Messiah was short-sighted. Jesus didn't come to save Israel from Roman occupation. Jesus came to save the world from the power of sin and death by dying on the cross and rising from the tomb. And because Jesus died and rose again we need no longer fear death having the last word in our lives. Of all the things we could hope for in our lives is there anything greater than death being defeated so that we no longer fear it?

We have experienced many manifestations of death in our lives over the last year. Half a million dead from Covid-19. Jobs lost. Home evictions or foreclosures. Celebrating holidays, milestone birthdays, graduations, weddings and other major events without the grandness or pomp we had dreamed about. Yet, because Jesus rose from the tomb those "little deaths" do not have the last word when it comes to our work, where we live, family gatherings, and other events of life that have "died" in the last year. We are Easter people who believe and trust in a Savior who saved us from death itself by joining us to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ in the waters of Baptism. All that for which we "had hoped" pales in comparison to the Easter resurrection hope our risen Jesus offers the world.

We still have a journey to travel of this pandemic. We still may have hopes that may or may not come to fruition. But thanks be to God that when our ultimate hope is in the resurrection of our Lord, Jesus, then there is no "death" we experience that God cannot provide new life. I pray you experience this hope in these days of the Easter season and beyond, and may the peace of God comfort and console you when your hearts are heavy with sorrow or despair. For Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia! Amen.

"The Very Good Gospel" - Bible Discussion for Daily Living Continues Through April

"God once declared everything in the world 'very good.' Can you imagine it?" That's the question behind Lisa Sharon Harper's book *The Very Good Gospel: How everything wrong can be made right.* "Through careful exploration of the biblical text, particularly the first three chapters of Genesis... Harper shows us what 'very good' can look like today – in real time. If you would like to explore how the theme of God's shalom is woven throughout

both the Old and New Testaments you are invited to join either the Monday night (7:30-9:00) or Wednesday morning (9:30-11:00) Bible Discussion for Daily Living group for the 8-week study of Harper's book, *The Very Good Gospel.* Each week the group will discuss the content of the chapter(s) assigned as well as share insights discovered in completing the Reflections section located at the end of each chapter. Pantry Update: We are continuing the suspension of the Pantry process during the closure of the church. "Depending on

the size of the family, we are sending out \$100-\$200 Acme Gift Cards to each of the Pantry Families on a monthly basis. The food items that have been donated are also being distributed.

REMINDER: Altar Guild Checks Now Written to "LCOS"

In keeping with the recommendations made during Our Savior's last audit the Altar Guild closed their bank account and transferred their funds to the Mission Investment Fund Dedicated Account overseen by the Congregation Council. As such, all altar flower memorials being paid by check



need to be made payable to "LUTHERAN CHURCH OF OUR SAVIOR" with "ALTAR GUILD" written in the Memo section of the check. The Altar Guild leadership will receive weekly updates of any checks received for flower memorials and will continue to oversee the purchase of worship supplies and replacement of ecclesiastical items (communion wafers, candle oil, linens, baptismal candles, etc.)

March Council Actions Synopsis

At the regular Congregation Council meeting in March the following proposals were discussed and actions taken.

- Juhan Runne and John Drozdal will coordinate the updating of our Congregation Constitution and Bylaws in accordance with the one adopted by the 2019 Churchwide Assembly.
- The church van will have the power window repaired before making it available for sale.
- The Payroll Protection Program application was accepted by Republic Bank and approval is pending. Since the meeting the full \$43,500 loan has been granted and deposited into the church checking account. The Personnel Committee will meet to discuss the impact to the 2021 Financial Plan as approved at the Annual Meeting.
- Danielle Deery brought forward a proposal for the congregation to honor June Pride Month that would focus on symbols of support, education about the LGBTQIA community, and outreach opportunities. See article on page 8.
- Altar Guild recommended the offerings provided in the HOLY COMMUNION special envelopes be deposited to the newly created Altar Guild line item in the Dedicated Account to facilitate their purchase of worship elements such as wafers and wine. The Council agreed to this change in procedure.

Facebook has a feature called "On This Day" that shows you what you posted 1, 2, 3, etc. years ago on that day. On March 12, 2020 we had posted a picture of the church sign that read "Worship suspended until April 9. Join us on FB Live." We had no idea what was in store, but in the last couple of weeks many of us have had anniversaries of that moment when you realized life as we knew it was about to change. As we look back on a year full of waiting, disappointment, loneliness, anticipation, and grief, please know that we have held you in our prayers and continue to do so. God was with you in every lonely moment of last year and is with you as we are walking into this new period. Similar to the flowers raising their little heads through the earth, it seems like there are

these little signs of this period of hope and light popping up everywhere. Every day I hear of more friends, colleagues, and parishioners who have been able to get vaccinated. On the anniversary of us shutting down, the choir met in the sanctuary to have a short rehearsal (just about everyone participating is vaccinated, and everyone was distanced and masked) to join our voices in song for the first time in a year. Despite everyone complaining that they were out of shape vocally, it was still some of the most beautiful music I had heard after a year of choral silence in the sanctuary.

So, slowly, the hope is growing. The songs and sounds are coming back. On Monday night, 5-5:45pm, the choir room is filled with the ringing and laughter of our children bell choir, and on Thursday evenings, 7-8pm, our adult bell choir is back to ringing beautiful anthems. The adult choir sings after that. Amazing grace, how sweet the sound.

I hope that you can hear the sounds of hope in the air – the birds singing, the kids out in the streets as they are starting to play outside again, the choir anthems that are offered virtually (but one glorious day will be sung live in the sanctuary), the neighbors offering a hello, a baby giggling. As the hymn goes, "All earth is hopeful." May you carry this hope forward in you.

Mustard Seed Community Childcare at Our Savior UPDATE

At Our Savior's Congregational Annual Meeting in January we approved the establishment of a separate 501c3 extended day kindergarten childcare during the school year and a summer childcare for K-Grade 5 children in order to pick up where Haddonfield Child Care had left off when they were forced to close due to the pandemic. Thus the Mustard Seed Community Childcare at Our Savior was sown, and since then it has germinated and growing quite well. The Steering Committee has morphed into the Board of Trustees with the following members:

Ex Officio Members: Pastor Wayne Zschech, Jaime Frazier (LCOS Dir. of Youth & Family Ministry), and Donna Marie Clancy (former Director of HCC & Director of MSCCOS)

In the last two months the Board has successfully received the Certificate of Incorporation, filed to be included in the ELCA 501c3 Group ruling, opened a bank account at Republic Bank, launched their website (www.mustardseedccos.org), and begun accepting registrations for both the summer camp childcare and fall session for kindergarten extended program childcare. They will be promoting a Dine-and-Donate at Passariello's on Wednesday's in the coming weeks so check your emails for the start date.

Want to help get the word out? We need volunteers to place yard signs on their lawns promoting the Summer Camp Childcare program for Haddonfield and surrounding boroughs as well as the Kindergarten Extended Day Childcare program for Haddonfield school district students in the fall. Your lawn would be an ideal location if you:

- Live on a well-traveled street with respect to both car and foot traffic.
- Live near a Haddonfield elementary school where parents would likely see the sign when either dropping off or picking up their child from school.

You can either pick up the sign at the church or one of our Board members will drop it off. If you live in Haddonfield you will need the sign that promotes both childcare options. If you live outside of Haddonfield you will need the sign that promotes the Summer Camp option only.

Stewards of God's Love God Comes Down, God's People Look Inward

Well, here we are facing another pandemic spring. It's been a year with lots of time to think about priorities, choices and needs. And while the immediate future looks a little brighter than this time last year, there are still a lot of unknowns and issues to be resolved in our lives. It's still a time when we are forced to think about what we value and where we want to put our time and God-given gifts.

In the religious tradition, we are in a period of discernment. Where is God's Spirit leading each of us?

When we affirm our faith at Confirmation, we answer the question "Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism," by saying "We do, and we ask God to help and guide us." And so begins a daily claiming and rediscovering of the God-given gifts of discipleship. These gifts overlap and are intertwined, as one gift flows into another and into faithful living. Such gifts can be transformative and bring unexpected changes.

That is especially true as we ponder our own personal God-given gifts. How might our lives please God? How can we use our gifts to help God's creation?

At Our Savior we spent last year recognizing that God comes down to us in love, signified when we make the sign of the cross and bring our hands down from our heads to our hearts. This year we're keeping our hands at our hearts and turning inward to God to discern his plan for our lives.

We are mistaken if we think that stewardship of God's gifts is only about money and giving, as important as those are. Stewardship is just as much about what God-given gifts of talent, interests and abilities go into making us who we are—each of us God's unique and special individuals.

This spring season of awakening life and new growth calls us to spend time discerning what special talents, skills, and interests God has given us to do his work. Who would benefit if we share those abilities? How can our gifts make us good disciples? What is God calling us to share?

No matter our age, we are all on this journey of pursuing God's plan for us and can still question what else God has in store. Maybe there's a new adventure in our future!

Join a Committee to Plan Celebrations for Pride Month

Many of you may be familiar with June as Pride Month, a celebration of and show of support for the LGBTIA community. Some of you may have attended gay pride parades in Philly or NYC or even marched in them yourselves. And if you are not familiar with Pride month, that is ok too! I am

proposing that this year of 2021 be the first annual celebration of Pride Month at LCOS and I hope that you will join me. Along my journey as an ally (supporter of the gay community), I have learned a lot about the LGBTIA community. Growing up in the Midwest in the 90s, I did not know anyone who was openly gay with one exception. There was not a Pride group at my high school and I went on to a college with few openly gay students as well. In other words, my personal experiences of getting to know those in the gay community was limited throughout much of my early life. It was not until well into adulthood that I knew of and got to know openly gay individuals.

While my journey has evolved, so has our country. There are movies and shows on TV about gay characters, both scripted and reality, (Queer Eye and Schitt's Creek are favorites of mine), along with more vocal support and changing laws (marriage equality in 2005). And you may be just starting on your journey, which is great! We can all go together, at our own pace, as we do this work.

It is important to note that I am in no way an expert or have all of the answers. I am still learning and growing in my understanding, but I want to take some steps to be supportive in a more public way this year in our church community. I recently brought this idea to council for their approval and received their support.

Though our church should always be a welcoming place for all, we as Lutherans have been a leader on this issue in particular. While many churches continue to openly denigrate the gay community, the ELCA released a statement in support of the gay community in 2009. Our church welcomes gay clergy and officiates at gay weddings because this is what Jesus calls us to do as his followers: Love your neighbor.

My proposal to council included three areas for activities: symbols, education and outreach. While I do not think that we can, or should, accomplish everything on my list this year, I would like to continue to build on these themes as we continue our work together in coming years. For example, one of my ideas for this year for symbols would be to fly the rainbow flag outside of the church during June. 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
