18 to Participate in Affirmation of Baptism on Either May 23 or June 6

On both May 23 and June 6 at the 10:30 worship service the 18 confirmation youth both, the Class of 2020 and 2021, will participate in the Affirmation of Baptism (Confirmation) rite depending on their preference and availability. We had to postpone the Class of 2020's Affirmation of Baptism due to the pandemic and the uncertainty of when we would be able to gather again safely in sanctuary for worship. Despite now being reopened for worship the pandemic protocols still require use of only half the pews, which would both eliminate the possibility of other worshippers attending on Confirmation Day and families being able to invite additional family and friends for the occasion. By holding the rite on two separate Sundays this will allow for more guests and regular worshippers to attend worship at 10:30 despite having the two classes mixed on their confirmation day.



### National Day of Prayer Cancelled Again Due to Coronavirus

Due to the Coronavirus pandemic the annual National Day of Prayer Breakfast regularly scheduled for the first Thursday in May has been cancelled again. ### "I Can't Save the Planet But I Can Be a Steward of Creation" By Pastor Wayne



I write this article with Earth Day just a few days away. The topic of Climate Change or Climate Crisis is heard daily and the challenge to Earth's citizens to "Save the Planet!" from by our choice of "green" energy over fossil fuels, reusable over disposable products, and the four R's of Reduce, Reuse, Repurpose and Recycle. But will my driving a Tesla, installing solar panels, using metal straws and cloth napkins really save the But maybe what's more important is living in relationship with the earth the way God intended from the be-

planet? Maybe. But maybe what's more important is living in relationship with the earth the way God intended from the beginning.

In Genesis 1:15 we read, "The LORD God took the human and put the human in the Garden of Eden to till (*abad* = to serve) and keep (*shamar* = to protect) the earth." In other words, every human being has the responsibility to protect and serve creation. And if the planet is too big for us to get our head around, maybe we can start with protecting and serving the portion of creation that impacts our home, our community, our state and our nation. I may not be able to save the planet, but I can begin to consider how my everyday actions either work toward protecting and serving creation or work against it. For instance, when it comes to caring for my lawn and garden, how might my choices *best serve and protect creation* and not just my yard? Do I put down chemicals that when washed into the sewer system and flows to local waterways will compromise the health of the plants and fish (and birds that eat the fish) in that ecosystem? In a time when water conservation is becoming a greater imperative of our protecting and serving creation where does having a lush green lawn fall in that imperative to protect and serve creation? Is it more important to plant local and indigenous plants in my garden rather than exotic ones that could become an invasive threat if not properly tended or don't serve as a food source to local birds and pollinating insects?

We protect and serve creation well when we live a lifestyle that minimizes our impact in landfills. Recycling is the last of the four "R's" and we would do well to first consider how we can reduce our use of plastics and paper products that go into landfills and then consider how we can reuse or repurpose those products if possible. We rarely need plastic bags when shopping anymore since beginning to use reusable cloth bags for grocery shopping. Individual packaging is a convenience, not a necessity, and often serves our personal wants rather than serves and protects creation. What would it be like to buy in bulk, use cloth napkins, and travel with reusable metal straws?

How does my choice of transportation protect and serve creation? Can I walk or ride my bike to my destination rather than drive my car and reduce my carbon footprint? Sure it may take longer and be less convenient *for me*. But in doing so I'm be protecting and serving creation. Carpooling with co-workers or classmates or using public transportation to go to work, concerts, or out to dinner may be less convenient and require us to give up control of our schedule to come and go as we please, but we will be protecting and serving creation better by doing so.

How do our actions, and the legislation we support through our elected officials, contribute toward God's expectation that we protect and serve creation? Earth Day isn't just one day a year. For Christians who take seriously God's intention for humanity and our relationship with God, each other, and creation, it's a focus of our daily living. I can't save the planet, at least not by myself.


But God didn't give me the responsibility to save the planet, just to serve and protect the portion of the earth my life impacts. So I think it's time for me to get my bicycle tires inflated, trade in my dress shoes for walking shoes, and get a Freedom Pass from PATCO as well as start weeding the gardens by hand rather than by Roundup and reconsider my shopping habits. Do my choices serve my personal preferences and conveniences or do they serve and protect the planet as well? Old habits die hard. But thanks be to the God who raised Jesus to new life new habits can lead to new life.

### **April Council Actions Synopsis**

- 1. PPP LOAN: The Council approved the recommendation to adjust the 2021 Financial Plan to incorporate the \$43,500 Payroll Protection Program loan received. (Separate article in this Messenger edition, page 8, providing details of changes.)
- 2. PARSONAGE CENTRAL AC INSTALLATION: Council approved Pastor Wayne's recommendation to seek quotes from various AC companies for the installation of central air-conditioning in the parsonage as two of the mini-split units are now inoperable and need replacement. Changing to central air will result in lower energy bills during the summer months due to the efficiency of cooling. The project would be funded through the Bott Major Repair Fund but will require additional support from the Memorial Gift Board that meets in May.
- 3. FUNERAL HOME USHERS REQUIRED: The Council agreed with Pastor Wayne's recommendation that for any and all funerals in the sanctuary there must be at least one funeral home staff person serving as an usher. Especially during this time of pandemic protocols it is unreasonable to expect church staff to also serve as ushers for funeral services provided in the sanctuary, but also during non-pandemic times. Members are to keep this change in mind when pre-planning funeral arrangements.
- **4.** REOPENING BUILDING FOR NON-MINISTRY USE: The Council reaffirmed their previous decision that Our Savior would not grant building use to groups outside of our ministry plan until September, at which time they anticipate the pandemic will be much less of a threat. Blood drives and other health-related requests are granted exemption from this decision.

So when I was sitting down to write this article, I was really struggling on what to write about. I bounced back and forth with a few ideas, but I decided to talk about how, even though Virtual Sunday School will end on May 23rd for the summer, you can still teach your child at home the stories in the Bible. I understand, life is crazy busy and starting to get busier now that things are starting to open up again. But I invite your family to have Bible time. Pick about twenty minutes out of your week to be your Family Bible Time. If anyone is interested, starting in June, I can send a weekly Bible lesson out to families. 

### NJ Synod Holds Virtual Assembly May 7-8

This year's theme is "Springing Forth" and will include pre-synod workshops before the various sessions focusing on God's action in the lives and ministry of the various NJ congregations. John Drozdal, VP of Congregation Council, and Nancy Gulick, Chair of Memorial Gifts, will be Our Savior's two voting members to the 33<sup>rd</sup> Synod Assembly. Our own Sophia Howard is one of the nominees to attend the 2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Columbus, OH so keep her in your prayers as the voting takes place at this year's assembly. ### When Can We Sing?



I have heard the question directly and through-the-grapevine so many times in the last months, I've lost count. When can we SING again in worship? For many, it doesn't feel like church without getting to sing and getting to hear our choir in person. Well, let me answer that question in this month's article! As you may (or may not) know, singing transmits aerosols and droplets a lot more aggressively than regular speaking, which is why it has been really dangerous to sing during this pandemic. However, we do have Dr Fauci on record that congregational singing will be safe once 85% has been vaccinated! So here is your answer – once our area of Camden County and the surrounding areas has hit that magical number, you

can sing your favorite hymns in church again! As of right now (I am writing this article on April 15th, thankfully NOT tax day this year!), Camden County has over 40% with at least one dose and almost 28% fully vaccinated. We are getting close to being able to make music again! If you just cannot wait and are vaccinated, join the choir for the remainder of the season – those participating are all vaccinated and sing on Thursday nights 8-9pm. If you want the time of singing to get there faster, help those around you to get their vaccines by helping them get appointments, registering those who may not be tech savvy, or driving them to appointments.

Here is a helpful graphic from the Center for Congregational Song that tracks the national vaccination rate. We are higher than the national percentage, so we are getting closer and closer to making music together every day. Thanks be to God! Pauline

### Thank you from Lori Greenawalt & Medical Ministry International

Thank you, Lutheran Church of Our Savior, for providing space to store and pack wheelchairs and equipment in a warm, safe, and clean environment during the COVID-19 pandemic. While your church building was closed to church services during this time, it enabled us to continue keeping our program services running.

Lori Greenawalt sources and ships wheelchairs and physical therapy equipment for Medical Ministry International (MMI) Peru. MMI Peru, which is fully

staffed by Peruvian medical professionals, provides year-round physical therapy, dental, and optometry services to address the ongoing needs of the poor. There is a current need for 150 specialty and neurological pediatric wheelchairs!

Lori was previously housing the inventory she sourced in small, dark, unheated garages and warehouses. She was shovelling snow to create enough dry space to sort the items. In January, Lori made a cold call to the church whose bells she could hear from her home, hoping you might know of available space, and you graciously offered her a classroom, an elevator and first-floor storage.

"This church space has been a blessing beyond words," - Lori

She now walks to the church building knowing she will be welcomed with heat, electricity, ramps, an elevator, and space to spread out and pack properly; amenities she didn't have access to before. This ministry could not take place without the help of numerous others over the past 1 ½ years who have lent a helping hand, identified equipment, loaned trucks, workers to move, storage locations to accumulate equipment and those with PT expertise to review quality. For this final part of the journey, the church location has been the perfect spot!

Thank you, Lutheran Church of Our Savior, for coming alongside Medical Ministry International as they provide quality, accessible health care to the poor and work to restore the dignity of disabled children in the communities in and surrounding Arequipa, Peru.

In these difficult times, Our Savior's faithful givers are sharing their offerings so that others may know God's love. We may be socially distant, but our faith and commitment continue to be at work in the world.

### Stewards of Time and Talent God Comes Down, God's People Look Inward

At Our Savior we spent last year recognizing that God comes down to us in love, signified when we make the sign of the cross and bring our hands down from our heads to our hearts. This year we're keeping our hands at our hearts and turning inward to God to discern his plan for our lives. We look in to discover all of the resources God has entrusted to our care. God gave each of us varying talents, resources that we can use to love God and our neighbors.

In the January 6, 2021 devotion from *Christ in Our Home*, Pastor Fred Fritz, as a campus pastor, was frequently asked by students "What do you think I should do?" In reply he would ask them two questions:

"... What brings you joy and purpose for living each day? Whom could you benefit by the exercise of your gifts?

"The Lutheran tradition appreciates that Christian vocation is not embodied in particular professions, careers or trades. We don't categorize certain occupations as 'holy' and others as 'worldly.' Rather, Christian vocation—Christian living—involves using whatever gifts, dispositions and skills God has given us so as to honor God, the giver of the gifts, in caring for the needs of our neighbors. Our Christian vocation—or calling—is ultimately an unself-ish expression of our love and concern for the other..."

Looking inward, we can ask ourselves: How might God be calling us, both as individuals and as a congregation, to use our unique gifts to love God and our neighbors? For some of us the answer may come easily. Others may want to investigate a little before we know what gives us joy and purpose and whom we will benefit.

During May, we will receive a Time and Talent Survey that presents the various ministries available at LCOS. Exploring one or more of these ministries may present ways for each of us to find our joy and to use our gifts to love God and our neighbors.

Please take some time when you receive the survey to thoughtfully consider how God is calling you.

### LCOS March Financial Report

We were successful in securing a PPP Loan for 2021 in the amount of \$43,500 to support our financial mission. We are confident that we have implemented an accounting approach that will provide for this Loan to be forgiven in the future. In developing the 2021 Operational Budget, we reduced, eliminated, or needed funding from Dedicated Accounts and Memorial Gift to reduce expenses and we still needed \$25,006 support from Memorial Gifts to balance our Budget. Now, with this new funding, we are able to revise our Financial Plan as outlined below:

We are excited to share news of the opening of the **Mustard Seed Community Childcare at Our Savior**. In August 2020 Haddonfield Child Care announced that it would be closing its doors. This reality became a hardship to many families in Haddonfield needing reliable and meaningful childcare. Pastor Wayne and the congregation of the Lutheran Church of Our Savior saw the necessity of continuing this important ministry of the Kindergarten Extended Day Program along with adding a summer childcare component. After months of brainstorming, planning and developing, the **Mustard Seed Community Childcare at Our Savior** has germinated and is now an official NJ 501(c) 3 business. Additionally, the Mustard Seed CCOS Board of Trustees is excited and honored to have Donna Marie Clancy continue in her role as the Executive Director as she did for HCC.

The Mission of Mustard Seed CCOS is "Providing a safe, creative, and nurturing community for children to explore and expand in heart and mind, body and soul". The Kindergarten Extended Day Program is planned to open in September 2021 for the children in the Haddonfield School District. We are hoping to begin a Summer Camp in June 2021 for children entering grades Kindergarten through 5th this fall. It is our hope to continue the great legacy that Haddonfield Child Care has left in our community and provide a vital service needed in our community with the creation of Mustard Seed CCOS.

Even though the physical resources from Haddonfield Child Care are able to be donated to **Mustard Seed Community Childcare**, there is still a need for a sizeable budget of start-up costs associated with establishing this new program. The congregation of Our Savior has generously provided \$10,000 toward these costs which have been used for legal fees and office organizational tools. 
We will be using this spot in the monthly newsletter to help keep the congregation abreast of the mission support being funded to various ministry areas by your memorial gifts.

### 6-Week Wednesday Night Book Study of Kendi's "How to Be An Antiracist" Begins May 5

Our nation has struggled with racism for centuries, and despite the efforts of the Civil Rights Movement it is clear from the events of the last year that racism continues to be America's original sin. It's not a matter of "not being a racist." In order to eradicate racism we must be engaged in promoting antiracism.

"Antiracism is a transformative concept that reorients and reenergizes the conversation about racism – and, even more fundamentally, points us toward liberating new ways of thinking about ourselves and each other. At its core, racism is a powerful system that creates false hierarchies of human value; its warped logic extends beyond race, from the way we regard people of different ethnicities or skin colors to the way we treat people of different sexes, gender identities, and body types. Racism intersects with class and culture and geography and even changes the way we see ourselves. In *How to Be an Antiracist*, Kendi takes readers through a widening circle of antiracist ideas – from the most basic concepts to visionary possibilities – that will help readers see all forms of racism clearly, understand their poisonous consequences, and work to oppose them in our systems and in ourselves." - *How to Be an Antiracist* book jacket.

Beginning Wednesday, May 5 from 7:00-8:30, Pastor Wayne Zschech will lead book study participants in a six-week discussion of Kendi's book and how racism impacts our lives and how we can respond with antiracist actions and support of antiracist legislation. After reading this book Pastor Wayne has shared it changed his way of understanding this volatile issue in our time and country and hopes participants will come with both an open mind and heart to the weekly discussions, holding open the possibility that they too might be transformed.
