In the January 24, 2021 devotional from *Christ in Our Home*, Shelly Cunningham writes: The world needs people who commit their lives to raising up followers of Jesus – pastors and deacons and youth ministers and faith formation directors. But just as much, the world needs people of faith who quietly use their gifts for the good of their neighbor as they strive "to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with (their) God." (Micah 6:8)

God has blessed us all with some skill or talent. Maybe you're a teacher, nurse, IT tech or carpenter, and you use your skills every day in your job. Maybe you're a stay-at-home mom managing your household and your kid's time and talents. Whatever your abilities, how is your faith leading you to use those talents to help others in your congregation and community? "Be Not Afraid, Sing Out for Joy. Jesus Is Risen, Alleluia!" By Pastor Wayne Zschech



With the CDC's announcement on May 13 that fully vaccinated people are virtually at no risk of contracting the Coronavirus nor of spreading it to non-vaccinated people, you could almost hear the collective sigh of relief in our nation. I know I did. For over a year we worshipped virtually and carried out ministry in Zoomland to the emotional and mental exhaustion of many. We've worn masks, socially distanced, and sanitized

for the sake of keeping the spread of the virus to a minimum and thereby loving our neighbor despite the inconvenience. It has been a long fifteen months of heartache, grief, and fear of contracting a virus that has killed millions.

Now that time is coming to an end. Yet, it is understandable to still be afraid of re-engaging with the public world. It's one thing for us to go without masks in our homes with others who are vaccinated or in our quarantine "pod." But what will it be like to go back to church, sit in the pew next to others, sing the liturgy and hymns, receive Holy Communion, and engage in fellowship with others now that the restrictions are being lifted for those who are vaccinated? We may even wonder, "Am I wrong for still being afraid?"

There is a Taize hymn that is sung at Easter. "Be not afraid, sing out for joy. Jesus is risen, Alleluia." Our resurrection faith gives us the ability to not be afraid of death's "sting" in our lives as we trust in the God who raised Jesus from the dead. As Paul wrote in his second letter to Timothy "For God did not give us a spirit of fear, but a spirit of power and love and self-control." In other words, we need not allow fear to dictate our lives. And for those who are fully vaccinated this is now the time to trust the medical scientists and consider how we might reengage in the lifestyle we lived before the pandemic.

Last Sunday we had our first "fully vaccinated" worship at 8:00. I consider it the first step in reengaging in a pre-pandemic worship lifestyle. While we still wore masks in keeping with the governor's regulations, we did get to sing the liturgy and hymns. Participants were able to receive Holy Communion from me at the front of the church if they chose. Soon we hope to allow moving out of our socially distanced pews to greet one another with the Peace of Christ. During the pandemic we adopted different rhythms for worship and being the body of Christ together that included Facebook Live and Zoom gatherings. It enabled us to stay connected even while apart. Yet, I have missed being *with* you on Sundays and throughout the week for Bible study, faith education classes, and, yes, even Council and other meetings of the church!

And I know you have missed being together as the incarnational body of Christ as well. When I hear the laughter from Room 112 as our Mission Quilters sew and stitch together quilts for Lutheran World Relief, I hear the joy in their voices. When I visit the homebound to share Communion and the story of our lives together, I see the joy and relief on the expression of your entire face, and not just in your eyes.

I will still wear a mask, practice social distancing, and sanitize my hands when I am out and about in public out of respect and love toward those who are still at risk as well as be a model of what Christian love looks like in the final months of this pandemic. However, I will not let my past fear of this virus prohibit me from embracing and engaging with those around me who are not at risk of contracting the disease from me or I from them. We were not given a spirit of fear, but a spirit of power, and love, and self-control. Let us live in that spirit as we reengage with our neighbors, co-workers, classmates, friends, and siblings in Christ's body in these final months of this dreadful pandemic. Do not be afraid. Peace be with you.

Minister's Monday Musings and Thursday Thoughts Resume in June



May Council Actions Synopsis

- PARSONAGE CENTRAL AC: The Council recommended moving forward with using the Bott Major Repair Funds to install a two zone central AC system in the church parsonage as two of the main split units are no longer operable and the transition would save in utility expenses over time. Matching funds from Memorial Gifts will be needed to fully fund the project and will be discussed at their May meeting.
- CHURCH VAN SALE: The 2000 Church Van is being sold due to lack of regular use and better use of the Kathryn Davis Trust funds for ministry. The new owner is related to a member of the congregation and will be able to use if for their business.
- CONFERENCE ROOM 112 VIRTUAL MEET-ING RECONFIGURATION: Memorial Gifts will receive the two proposals to provide the capability for virtual meetings to occur in the Conference Room 112 in order to expand our member's ability to participate in ministry and meetings even if they are unable to attend in person.



Accepts Council Bishop's Jehu Jones Mission Challenge

At their May Congregation Council meeting the members accepted the NJ Synod Bishop's Challenge of The Jehu Jones Mission that includes

raising \$375 for a fund to support Black ministry candidates in the NJ Synod.

The Rev. Jehu Jones was ordained in 1832 as the first Black Lutheran Pastor in the U.S. He purchased two plots of land in Philadelphia at \$375 each for a building for his growing Black congregation. Jones lost the mortgage after his Synod refused to rescue the project for \$100! Even after calling him to ministry and commending him for his service, the Synod refused to support him.

For the symbolic donation of \$375 or more, each congregation will receive a quilt square, which represents a congregation's commitment to growing in awareness to the history of uncompensated loss in Black American history, accepting this legacy as responsible for ongoing disparities and injustice today, and moving toward action in Christian love. Congregations will send their quilt square to be combined in a large quilt and presented to the Bishop at the 2022 Synod Assembly. The Council agreed to invite the Memorial Gift Board to match their donation of \$375 as well as invite the congregation to make contributions of their own to be added to the funds intended to raise \$50,000 to support the lives of emerging leaders of African descent in our denomination today.


Youth Group: Congratulations to all of 2021 Seniors! I am so proud of all of you and cannot wait to see what your future holds for you!

SONGS FOR THE HOLY OTHER LOBTOIASY COMMUNITY

"Wonderfully Made" Inviting Every Voice Into the Song Of the Church

One of the many reasons I love the sound of a choir is that it is the voices of many producing one piece of music. Most choral pieces consist of different voice parts, all blending in one song. Some may sing quieter and some louder (whether the piece requires that or not), but all are invited to join into one song, be it a hymn, a choir anthem, an oratorio movement, or something else.

The church should be similar – all are invited to bring their own selves, fully as they are, everyone welcome. We see it on many church signs and brochures, including our own – "All are welcome." We say that everyone is invited to fully join our song, and yet there are so many who do not feel welcome to show up as their full authentic selves. Psalm 139 proclaims that we are all "fearfully and wonderfully made" by God, and yet some of us are afraid to show that wonderfully God-made self in the church. One of the communities often unwelcomed in the church is the LGBTQIA community, based on decades of many churches preaching the unwelcoming message telling them the way they were created (fearfully, wonderfully, God-made) was wrong – a message based on an incorrect translation and interpretation that still pervades to this day. They have not been invited into the song of the church, the body of Christ, the fold of God. I so often hear complaints that "young people have left the church," but it seems to me that the church made them leave by not letting them join our song, by telling them the way they had been created wasn't welcome.

So for the month of June, we will literally sing them back in. With a hymnal provided by the Hymn Society, called "Songs For the Holy Other" (reminding us how often we have "othered" those in the LGBTQIA community), we will close each worship with a hymn that celebrates the way that God created them, lament the way the world and especially the church may have treated them, and proclaim that we are all one beautiful, diverse Body of Christ. Additionally, our offertory anthems will focus on a similar message – if you are interested in being a part of the choir (we will record in advance, distanced and masked), let me know, we will accept every voice!

As we near the time to be able to physically sing in church again, I hope in June and going forward, you will raise your voice to physically and spiritually sing EVERYONE into the fold of God, who has loved and created every single one of us - wonderfully and beautifully made.

Senior Sunday

We often hear that the children of the church are the church's future, but I believe that they are Church right now. So on June 20th, we will be honoring some of our amazing seniors, for Senior Sunday! For starters, Sophia Howard, who is graduating from Cherry Hill East and will be attending Rutgers New Brunswick in the fall, will be preaching at both 8:00 and 10:30 services. Our church has never had a youth represented at Churchwide Assembly. We are so proud of her for stepping up into this leadership role and being an amazing mentor to other kids in our church community.

Simply Giving Online Options Updated – More Expansive

The Congregation Resources Ministry Team has updated the Simply Giving online options for giving electronically through our website. The site now provides four different groups with various funds for potential contributions, along with extensive options within each group for specific ways to support ministry at Our Savior. Check it out!

GENERAL MINISTRY: Supports the financial costs associated with regular program and staff ministry.

ELCA MINISTRY: Supports the various agencies of the ELCA, such as Disaster Response, World Hunger, and World Relief with a designation line if gifts given are for a specific disaster or relief kit.

SOCIAL MINISTRY PROGRAMS: Supports the various appeals for those in need at various times throughout the year, such as the Holiday Food Drive, the Advent Giving Tree, and the Pantry.

MEMORIAL GIFTS: Provides those wishing to give named gifts in memory of a loved to make a contribution to the church electronically as well as contribute to the Dunkle Endowment, Patterson/Plotzke Education Scholarship Fund, or the Memorial Garden Fund to insure the ability to fund new and expansive ministry beyond the scope of the annual General Fund ministry.

Fully Vaccinated Worship Every 3rd Sunday of Month at 8:00

At the May Worship and Music meeting the team addressed the concern of some members in holding a fully vaccinated worship option so those who are concerned about contracting the Coronavirus could worship without worry. The Council approved the recommendation to hold a Fully Vaccinated Sunday Worship on the third Sunday of each month at the 8:00 worship time. Those who are not yet fully vaccinated are invited to attend the 10:30 worship time instead. Features of the Fully Vaccinated Worship service include:



- Singing of the hymns and liturgy (although still masked until the governor lifts the requirement for fully vaccinated residents)
- Holy Communion distribution from the front by the pastor. Please sanitize hands before coming forward to receive
 wafer and dipping it in the wine.

As the pandemic continues to abate as a result of increased vaccinations and state mandated restrictions are lifted, we will be expanding fully vaccinated Sunday worship to more Sundays in the month. It is our hope that by September we will be able to worship without masks and without any restrictions or limitations to participation. Thank you for your patience throughout this past 15 months. Be bold in the Spirit as we step out in faith, trust the science world with recent information, and return to our faithful living among God's faithful people, worshipping together, proclaiming the Good News, serving all people, and striving for justice and peace as Christ's disciples.

Toothpaste and Toothbrush Collection for Caring Hearts

Social Ministry Committee assists Caring Hearts families that are seen by Cooper Hospital's Pediatric Infectious Disease Practice. We usually support the seasonal holiday parties by providing baked goods and refreshments as well as a collected item (underwear, baby wipes, socks, deodorant, and gifts from Advent Giving Tree), and provide assistance at these parties. We also support Caring Hearts with a monetary donation in March and a special Christmas donation. We helped Caring Hearts prepare and provide food for Thanksgiving dinners for families served thru Cooper Hospital's Pediatric Infectious Disease Practice. These events were all cancelled in 2020 due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Caring Hearts will be assembling tote bags filled with various personal care products such as shampoo, toothpaste, toothbrushes, bars of soap, and deodorant that the Cooper staff will give to families at their appointments in June. The goal is to fill about 25 tote bags with these personal care items. LCOS has been asked to collect full size toothpaste (not the little sample toothpaste) and toothbrushes, at least 25 of each.
