Sunday Morning Format Changes to Better Enable Sunday School Participation

Our Savior's Sunday morning format for worship and faith formation is changing on September 4 to better enable children to participate in Sunday school before their extra-curricular activities begin at noon. The decline in Sunday morning participation at the 10:30 worship and Sunday school by families with school age children is directly attributed to activities that begin at noon, making it impossible for children to participate in both. The Worship and Music Committee recommended, and the Council approved, the following new Sunday morning schedule.

NEW SUNDAY FORMAT

8:00-9:00: Traditional worship as has been provided to date.

9:00-9:30: Coffee Fellowship in narthex.

9:30-10:30: Traditional worship in sanctuary with livestream on Facebook Live. All blessing rites, choir anthems, and baptisms will occur during this service.

9:30-10:10: Children aged 4 to Grade 6 attend Sunday school classes before joining families in sanctuary worship for the Meal and Sending portion of worship.

9:30-10:10: Reflections Interactive Worship in the Parlor and by Zoom. Participants will join the sanctuary worship for the Meal and Sending portion of worship. (SEE SEPARATE ARTICLE)

10:30-11:00: Coffee Fellowship in narthex.

The goal each week will be to provide a meaningful worship experience for each service with the second worship services ending by 10:30, regardless of additional worship rites and music. When there are baptisms, blessing rites, and anthems all in one service the 9:30 worship will need to be pared down of less essential components of the liturgy. The following prioritized practices will be implemented to facilitate such services lasting approximately sixty minutes.

WEEKLY STANDARD

- Announcements will begin at 9:25 followed by the Prelude. The Brief Order for Confession and Forgiveness will begin promptly at 9:30.
- Hymns will be selected with no more than four verses, or 3-4 verses will be selected to be sung of hymns with five+.

AS NEEDED FOR TIME CONSTRAINT PURPOSES (Prioritized list)

- The Kyrie and Hymn of Praise will not be sung/read.
- The liturgy will be spoken rather than sung.
- The sermon will be ten minutes or less.
- Holy Communion distribution will be by intinction rather than at the rail.
- Holy Communion liturgy will be limited to the Great Thanksgiving, Eucharistic Prayer, and Lord's Prayer prior to distribution.
- The Sending Hymn will be omitted, but only if all other time reducing options have been implemented and the anticipated time of worship will exceed 65 minutes.

Obviously, if some or all these time reduction measures are implemented for the 9:30 worship the 8:00 worship will end sooner than 9:00, most likely by 8:50 or earlier. This will give Music Director Pauline Worusski the opportunity to rehearse with the choir(s) prior to the 9:25 start time. The Reflections Worship will begin at 9:30 in the Parlor but will be led by a Worship Assistant who will facilitate the interactive reflection portion of the worship as well as the parts of the liturgy not requiring a pastor. "Showing Up Is 80% of Ministry"

Woody Allen had a famous saying. "I have learned one thing. Showing up is eighty percent of life. Sometimes it's easier to hide home in bed. I've done both." Somehow, I think this quote is indicative of ministry as well. Especially after the Covid pandemic. For the first year we were basically told, "Don't show up. Stay at home and hide from the virus." Some even chose to do so in their beds. Zoom Meetings or Google Meets were the way we "showed up" for work, school, confirmation, Sunday school, and even some worship services. We said we missed being with people, but the ability to attend activities without ever having to get into your car or change out of your pajama bottoms became a conven-

ience we got used to.

Here's the thing. Even God realized the necessity and importance of "showing up" in the flesh when it comes to experiencing the love, grace, and hope God has for us. God's love for us "showed up" in the flesh in the person of Jesus Christ. God tried the law (Ten Commandments) and God used the prophets (God's virtual voice), but neither of them was sufficient. God's love and hope for the world needed to become incarnational, in the flesh, for us to truly experience what God's kingdom life of love and grace was really all about. I think it still does.

Rally Sunday is September 11. It will be a day I am looking forward to being a Sunday where those who used to regularly "show up" on Sunday for worship and Sunday school will do so again after a long pandemic hiatus of staying at home. Granted – there are some changes since you were here last. The 10:30 worship and Sunday school will now be at 9:30 in the hopes Sunday school families will be able to show up amidst noontime activities. The Reflections worship will now begin in the Parlor and end with Holy Communion in the sanctuary with those attending that worship service and Sunday school children. All these changes were made to better enable people to "show up" for worship and ministry on Sunday morning. And showing up for ministry isn't just on Sunday morning. I invite you to consider what other ways you can show up to not only experience but reveal God's love, hope, and grace to others around us. I invite you to show up for Bible Discussion for Daily Living. I invite you to show up as a confirmation Small Group Guide. I invite you to show up as a Sunday school teacher or Oasis Senior High Guide. I invite you to show up with a meal for My Father's House. I invite you to show up as an usher, communion assistant, reader, greeter, acolyte, or Altar Guild member to facilitate worship.

Most of all, I invite you to just show up. Show up and re-member yourself to the body of Christ that is this faith community of Our Savior. The pandemic may not be officially over but the need to hide at home in our beds is no longer encouraged. It's time to show up. I hope to see you when you do. I know there are many who are looking forward to seeing you too. God bless until then.



September is once again a month chock full of blessing services for our families participating in our Faith Stepping Stones ministry of faith formation. There will be some changes in when the blessing services are held now that Sunday school children are going first to their classrooms on Sunday and joining parents for the Meal and Sending portion of worship around 10:10. Please take note of the dates, times, and locations of when each blessing will occur as some changes from the norm have been made.

Sep 4: Backpack Blessing: 9:30 worship service for all school age children and teachers.

Sep 11: Stepping into Sunday School for all 4–5-year -olds for whom it is their first year in Sunday school.

Sep 11: Sunday School Teacher Blessing after the Faith Stepping Stone blessing.

Sep 18: Stepping Into the Catechism at the 9:30 worship service prior to the Prayer of the Day.

Sep 25: Stepping into Serving at the Altar for teens serving as acolytes at either the 8:00 or 9:30 worship services prior to the Prayer of the Day.


Choir Times - A Note Or Two

Third graders and their parents are invited to attend the 60-minute Faith Stepping Stone class "Stepping into God's Stories" on Sunday, September 18 immediately following worship from 10:30-11:30. The focus of the class is on the importance of studying God's word of the Bible in a disciple's daily life. Parents and children will highlight key passages in each book of the new Spark Bible (NRSV) the children will be receiving each night using the FAITH5 model for Family Home Huddles. Parents will also write a dedication to their child inside the Bible. The Spark Bible was chosen for its focus on teaching children how to read, understand, and reflect on God's Word WHILE they are reading the Bible. Annually on September 17th, the ELCA commemorates Hildegard of Bingen, a monastic from the High Middle Ages. Hildegard was a polymath—with capacities in the fields of philosophy, music, medicine and mysticism. Beyond these fields, she is also considered by some scholars to be the founder of scientific natural history in Germany.

Her work in that field and in the mystical collide in her vision of "viriditas" or "greening". Viriditas comes from Latin, meaning "green-truth". This image or idea had appeared in previous writers in the tradition, such as in the work of Augustine, but it is applied by Hildegard with frequency and import. Due to her extensive use of the term, it could offer various meanings, but generally-speaking, it refers to the power that makes living things both grow and heal.

Dr. Victoria Sweet, a medical historian, in her book Rooted in the Earth, Rooted in the Sky: Hildegard of Bingen and Premodern Medicine, connects Hildegard's vision to her medical practice. Monasteries, at that time, were places that were organized to provide the right conditions for growth and healing, much like a gardener would arrange a garden—providing for proper soil conditions, enough water and sunlight—while offering enough spaciousness for a seed to do what a seed does best: find the light. Monasteries were essentially hospitals. Hildegard's medical efforts, then, were guided by the design of viriditas, or as Hildegard herself succinctly defines it: "the greening power of God".


The impact of this vision for her theological teachings was profound, and perhaps one could say, truly timeless and even prescient. Hildegard's vision broke from a dualistic understanding in which God was distant and separate from the earth, all living beings and humanity. At a time such as ours, with the effects of climate change more obvious than ever, Hildegard's words on the interdependence of all our life could not be more timely: "Humanity, take a good look at yourself. Inside, you've got heaven and earth, and all of creation. You're a world—everything is hidden in you." And if that was not clear enough, she also says, "The earth which sustains humanity must not be injured. It must not be destroyed!" Hildegard's vision teaches that within all of humanity, made in the image of God, there is a "verdancy of justice", a deep desire for all to be right, for all to be well, such as the desire for the green shoot within the seed to break forth from broken seed through dark soil to radiant light. Her vision teaches us that healing is possible both within us and without us, and that sometimes all we require is a little space for things to move of their own accord.

This time of ours requires urgency. As we commemorate Hildegard of Bingen this month, let us recommit ourselves to the task of seeking a more verdant and just world as the greening power of God guides our hands and feet. Vicar Tom


Reading "The Book That Matters Most" (Literally!)



Justice and Peace Committee: Looking Behind the News



September 15 to October 15: Recognizing Our Hispanic Neighbors

Each year Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from celebrating the histories, cultures and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Central and South America. This observance started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson, and in 1988 President Ronald Regan expanded it to a 30-day period, becoming law that year. The 2022 theme is "Inclusivity for a Stronger Nation."

October 11: National Coming Out Day (NCOD)

Have you ever noticed that it's not uncommon for the media to carry stories of famous people who come "out of the closet" in the fall, usually around October 11? There's real significance to this date for our friends in the LGBT community—also known as the queer community.

National Coming Out Day is observed annually to raise awareness of the queer community and the need to continue advocating for their civil rights. The date of October 11 was chosen because it is the anniversary of the 1987 National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights. Inaugurated the following year by Robert Eichberg, New Mexico psychologist, and Jean O'Leary, lesbian political leader and long-time activist from New



York. Along with other activists, they did not want to respond defensively to anti-LGBT actions because they believed it would be predictable. NCOD was established to maintain positivity and celebrate coming out.

The first decades of observances were marked by private and public people coming out, often in the media, to raise awareness and let the mainstream realize that everyone knows at least one person who is part of this community. In more recent years, because coming out as LGBT is far less risky now in most Western countries, the day is more of a holiday. Participants often wear pride symbols, such as pink triangles and rainbow flags.

The initial idea was grounded in the feminist and gay liberation spirit of the personal being political, with the emphasis on the most basic form of activism being coming out to family, friends and colleagues and living life as an openly queer person. This belief is founded on the idea that homophobia thrives in an atmosphere of silence and ignorance, that once people know that they have lesbian and gay loved ones, they are far less likely to maintain homophobic or oppressive views, especially if they live in developed countries.

The next meeting of LCOS' Justice and Peace Committee is Sept. 18, 10:45 a.m. in the Parlor. All are welcome.

POTENTIAL BENEFITS FROM THIS CHANGE

In addition to the potential for increased Sunday school and worship participation by families with children this new Sunday format also allows for additional potential blessings.

- Coffee Fellowship will allow participants from all three worship times and formats to engage in conversation and enhance congregational life and relationships.
- Sunday school parents who may have been interested in the interactive worship can now choose to do so while their child(ren) is/are in Sunday school.
- 9:30 is identified by mission developers as the most popular time people choose to worship on Sunday morning. This may increase the likelihood of first-time guests to worship who also will have a choice of worship format.
- More of the congregation will be able to gather together around the Lord's Table for Holy Communion.

The worship staff and leadership realize that this kind of change will negatively affect some who have difficulty in getting out of the house for a 9:30 worship time. It is their hope the livestream will offset that inconvenience when they are unable to attend. However, if we don't change when Sunday school is offered, we will continue to experience a lack of families being able to participate who have activities that begin at noon.

Reflections Worship Gathers in Parlor Starting Sep 4 Led by Lay Worship Assistants

Beginning September 4 the Reflections Interactive Worship that has been meeting in the sanctuary at 9:15 will begin their worship in the Parlor. The service will include the Gather and Word portion of worship before participants will gather in the sanctuary with the other worship service for the Meal and Sending portion of worship. The Parlor will be reconfigured in the style of a meditation room or small chapel within the front to allow for participants to read from the slides was well as Zoom participants to be seen and engage with the in-person attendees. Initially, Vicar Tom Natalini will be leading the Reflections worship when he is not preaching or at Bridge of Peace, with Pastor Wayne leading it when Vicar Tom preaches. A lay worship assistant from the Reflections regular parishioners will need to lead worship when neither the pastor or intern are available.

What would a normal worship look like? Here is a tentative worship schedule breakdown. Keep in mind the intimate setting of this worship greatly facilitates the opportunity to develop a greater sense of connection within the faith community and is an asset for anyone seeking such in their journey of faith.

- 9:30: Gather in the Parlor for worship. Share with those attending both in person and by Zoom the joys and challenges of your last week that later in the Prayers of the Church can be lifted up by the one leading prayer.
- 9:40: Prayer of the Day is read by all in attendance from the slide followed by the reading of the Scripture of the Day by the lay worship leader.
- 9:45-10:05: Interactive reflection among attendees of the questions prepared by Pastor Wayne prior to the service. The lay worship leader serves as a facilitator for this part of worship.
- 10:05-10:10: Prayers of the Church led by the lay worship leader
- 10:10: The Reflections Worship participants join the Sanctuary worship participants in the sanctuary for the Offering as well as the Meal and Sending portion of worship. A reserved section of the sanctuary near the narthex entrance will be reserved for those joining the rest of worship.

Why is this worship format so important? Participants who have attended for many years agree is it the only time on Sunday when they actually get to talk about their faith. If you're a person who's always wanted to interrupt a sermon to ask a question this worship format is perfect! Questions are encouraged!! Secondly, it provides participants with an opportunity to actually practice talking about their faith. Ever felt intimidated when those around you are talking about their faith, the church, or religion in general even though you had something to say? This worship format is a safe place to try this out.

What are the other benefits of Reflections Worship being held simultaneously with the 9:30 Sanctuary worship and Sunday school? There are two main benefits. First, more of the congregation will get the opportunity to engage in fellowship with each other every Sunday. 8:00 worshippers can share coffee and conversation from those gathering for either of the 9:30 services thereby creating greater connection with the congregation at large and body of Christ. Second, parents with Sunday school age children have an option of which of the two services they may want to attend. Those wanting a more intimate setting with an opportunity for open discussion of the readings as well as participate in the Meal with the greater congregation and their children now have that option.

What does this new format for Reflections need to succeed? This new format will live or die with the willingness of regular attendees to volunteer as lay assistants. The role is not difficult. The worship slides will be prepared in advance by Pastor Wayne and he will connect with the lay leader for the week prior to Sunday as to how the questions for interactive discussion were developed. When able he will also provide a video of his comments. All of the liturgy for the service is scripted so lay leaders need only read what is on the page/slide. The biggest challenge will likely be ensuring the group is ready to join the sanctuary worship at 10:10!

So this year why not try a new way to worship at 9:30 you may never have had the opportunity to do so? Come out to Reflections Worship in the Parlor for a worship experience that may change the way you encounter God and the body of Christ on Sunday.

<u>LUTHERAN CHURCH OF OUR SAVIOR: JULY 2022 FINANCIAL REPORT</u> NARRATIVE

July Envelop Offering of \$31,585 was above plan of \$26,501, generating an anticipated year end estimate of \$5,000 above plan.

Other Income is slightly above plan, generating Total Revenue to be estimated \$6,765 over plan.

Expenses are anticipated to be above plan by \$8,765 due to the negotiated salary of the Director of Youth & Family,

Continued Ed and Administrative expenses above our initial plan. Therefore, we anticipated a Deficit of \$2,000 by year end.

We have resources from the Dedicated Accounts to fund any year end Deficit if needed.

Thank you for Personal Care Items for Caring Hearts and Camp Bright Feathers

Social Ministry Committee assists Caring Hearts families that are seen by Cooper Hospital's Pediatric Infectious Disease Practice. We usually support the seasonal holiday parties by providing baked goods and refreshments as well as a collected item (underwear, baby wipes, socks, deodorant, and gifts from Advent Giving Tree) and provide assistance at these parties. We also support Caring Hearts with a monetary donation in March and a special Christmas donation. All inperson events were cancelled in 2020 and 2021 due to the coronavirus pandemic. So far, no in-person events have been planned in 2022. Caring Hearts will not be able to hold an in-person Back-to-School event this summer. The children will still receive backpacks which the Cooper staff is getting from the Cooper Foundation. Each family will also receive a \$50 Walmart gift card to purchase other things they need.

LCOS collected full size toothpaste and toothbrushes, men's and women's deodorant, and bars of soap during the Spring and again this summer. Caring Hearts assembled tote bags filled with various personal care products including the toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorants, and soaps that the Cooper staff will give to the families at upcoming appointments. The goal was to fill at least 2 dozen tote bags with these personal care items.

Caring Hearts Collection for Camp Bright Feathers

In addition to the collection of personal care items (toothpaste, toothbrushes, soap, men's and women's deodorant) to be included in tote bags for the families, Caring Hearts also collected items to be donated to Camp Bright Feathers. This is a week-long summer camp in Medford, NJ for children affected by HIV/AIDS to be held August 21-26, 2022. Requested items for Camp Bright Feathers included 20 tubes toothpaste (full size), 10 bottles shampoo (regular size), and 10 bars soap (regular size).

SCREENING
The Power of Prevention

Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings at Lutheran Church of Our Savior on Monday, March 7, 2022.

A package of five screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.¹

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation

A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²

Osteoporosis Risk

An ultrasound is performed to measure the shin bone for abnormal bone mass density. This can help assess the risk of osteoporosis, a disease where bones become weak and brittle.

These 5 vital screenings are offered for only \$139 and take 60-90 minutes to complete.

Confirmation Ministry Begins with Orientation on Sept. 11 - 6:30-8:00

The beginning of another year of confirmation ministry with catechetical instruction begins Sunday, Sep 11, at 6:30 with an In-Person "Back to Confirmation Night" orientation for both 7th and 8th grade youth and parents. Parents and youth are to gather in the sanctuary. The goals and volunteer opportunities of the program will be reviewed at that time as well as the unique roles parents will be asked to engage in. The class of about 14 seventh and eighth grade youth along with parent Small Group Guides will cover the Sacraments, Worship, Lutheran Heritage, and Apostle's Creed at biweekly Learn Events. Each Learn Event's theme will utilize the Teen Study Bible all youth entering the ministry receive, Luther's Small Catechism, and a Faith5 Journal at every event. They will also process what was shared in Small Groups with an adult Guide facilitating the conversation. In addition, the program includes:

• Play Events coordinated with the Oasis Youth ministry

• Serve Events ranging from making meals for My Father's House, hosting an Easter Egg Hunt and Youth Sunday Worship leadership, to serving either as an acolyte, usher, reader, or singing in the Youth Choir.

This year in particular Confirmation isn't just for youth. Parents are invited and encouraged to use the Faith5 Journals provided to each youth to amplify the experience with the Home Devotions included with each Learn Event theme if possible. Pastor Wayne strongly believes the most important way to teach faith to our children is to first teach and empower loving adults to model and share the faith with them. In addition, parents have the opportunity to explore what they once learned in confirmation from the perspective and life experience of an adult and how that impacts their own faith in daily life.
