

Quilt Blessing to Occur Nov 13 During Worship

On Sunday, November 13, at both the 8:00 and 9:30 Sanctuary worship services, over 25 quilts made by the women in our Mission Quilts ministry will be blessed by the congregation before being transported to the Lutheran World Relief distribution center in New Windsor, MD. These quilts are a labor of love that truly make a difference in the lives of those living in Third World countries. In addition to keeping one warm in bed they also serve as a protection from the sun and wind, a room partition, ground cover for eating and sleeping, as well as a way to wrap up multiple items as "luggage" when traveling from one place to another.

Led by Cheryl Hastings and Millie King, the Mission Quilts ministry at Our Savior meets on the first and second Thursdays of the month in the Conference Room 112 from 9:00-11:30 AM sewing together the fabric squares that are then sewn to the backing with batting in between. Then comes the community building part when all three are sewn together with pieces of yarn that secure the batting to both sides of the quilt. It must be a lot of fun because you can hear the laughter throughout the first floor whenever they meet. There is plenty of room around the table for more quilters so check them out on a Thursday in the beginning of the month to join in the joy and fun of making a difference in the lives of people bound together in the body of Christ by love.

True confession. I'm a Bruce Springsteen fan. And anyone who enjoys the music of The Boss knows he was a big fan of Woodie Guthrie, one of America's greatest folk singers. One of Guthrie's greatest songs he ever wrote and performed was "This Land Is Your Land," written in the time of the Great Depression after Guthrie had arrived in New York City after traveling across our depressed and economically downtrodden country. I remember being taught this song in elementary school in Cinnaminson.

This land is your land and this land is my land From California to the New York island From the redwood forest to the Gulf Stream waters This land was made for you and me



While Guthrie wrote the song as one of both protest and hope for a country that was divided between those in abject poverty and the ultra-wealthy, I wonder if in a month where we remember and honor the Indigenous Peoples of these United States we also might remember that before this was the land of white Northern European conquerors and colonizers it was the land of The Peoples.

I grew up in Cinnaminson. I remember reading the historic plaque on Route 130 that stated the town was founded by Swedish settlers back in some date I no longer remember. I also remember its true origin that a quick Google search refreshed my memory. The Lenni-Lenape Tribe came to the Cinnaminson area from somewhere west of the Mississippi long before the Swedes ever showed up. Lenni-Lenape means "original people" which to Cinnaminson they were. They named their hunting grounds Cinnaminson, which meant Sweetwater (now you know why the main diner is called Sweetwater Café). One ancient spelling of Cinnaminson was Senamensing; this name belonging traditionally to a trail from the Delaware River through Moorestown and Mount Laurel to the seashore.

Cinnaminson was my land, the land I grew up in. But it was also the Original People's land, although in my entire time living there I never met anyone who claimed Lenni-Lenape ancestry. My dad and I joined the Indian Guides (along one of our members, Bob Heinze) and we were in the Choctaw Tribe. Ironically, I would decades later discover, my fourth-great-grandfather was the Choctaw Nation's last chief before they became a democratic federation.

I ramble on about all this to point out we often have a fascination about the Indigenous People who originally lived on the land we know as New Jersey and these United States but we rarely take the time to learn their history and how this land was their land first and continues to be their land and ours today.

This month we celebrate Thanksgiving. Children will re-enact a meal shared between Pilgrims and the people of the Wampanoag Tribe in elementary school plays across the nation. Maybe we can do more this month. Maybe we can check out the history of the Indigenous Peoples who lived in our area of New Jersey. Maybe we can discover what happened to them after Elizabeth Haddon and other "founders" of our towns settled on these same lands and displaced them from the land that was also theirs and now also ours. Maybe we can pay attention to how their descendants are still being displaced and what we can do about advocating for equity and justice on their behalf. After all, this land is their land and this land is our land, from the Delaware River to the Atlantic Ocean, from the lofty mountains to the Pine Barren forests. God made this land for all the peoples. Have a blessed Thanksgiving.



In anticipation of a change to the Memorial Gift Fund bylaws at our next Congregational Meeting which will be held in January 2023- members of Memorial Gift Board felt it would be appropriate to highlight why the Memorial Gift Fund was established and some of the rules that govern the operation of the Memorial Gift Fund. (hereafter referred to as the FUND)

First, the purpose of the FUND is to receive, hold, manage, invest, reinvest, and dispose of all special gifts, devises, bequests and memorials received by the CHURCH or the FUND and apply such funds and income from the FUND to provide for the support and maintenance of the CHURCH or for

some religious, charitable, benevolent or educational object of purpose conducted or connected to the church.

Second, the use of principal and income is restricted. No portion of the income generated by the FUND shall be used for the annual operating budget of the church except as provided by the bylaws.

Third, the FUND is required to establish multiple SUBFUNDS. The largest SUBFUND is the Louis Dunkle Mission Endowment Fund. The Endowment Funds purpose is to provide a vehicle whereby persons may present gifts and be assured that these monies will assist in the future work of the church. In the establishment of the Endowment Fund, it is the intention of this Church to create a vehicle whereby all principal amounts so designated for this Fund will be retained and only the spendable income derived will be available for distribution.

Board of Trustees (elected by the congregation) and consisting of the current Vice President of Church Council, the Treasurer of the Church and seven (7) elected additional members of the Board are responsible to administer the FUND and SUBFUNDS of Memorial Gifts. It requires a majority vote of the nine (9) voting members to pass any motion or resolution. Church Council and Memorial Gift Board have worked together over the years to provide for an open dialog between the two organizations to properly administer the funds and carryout the mission of the church.

In January, at the Congregational Meeting we will be looking at the section of the bylaws that refer to the dissolution of the church and how the Memorial Gift Fund would be handled if those events would take place. Next month's article will focus on what changes are being proposed and why.

As my time as Vicar comes to an end, I am brimming with gratitude. My cup overflows. My journey in seminary education began in 2016, when, after a year-long internship experience at Unity ELCA Church in Milwaukee, WI, just after graduating college, I started studies at Union Theological Seminary in NYC. Now, after six years of enriching and enlivening learning, I am on the cusp of graduation, and God-willing, ordination.

It probably took longer than it had to—I took the scenic route, no doubt. I arrived at Our Savior in November of 2021, rather than at a usual start time of August. After years of a lot of think-

ing and wondering about ideas, it was time to walk the walk. And I'm so thankful for how it all turned out. Indeed, if my wandering was all to lead me here, I'll take it.

I was connected with Pastor Wayne through the seminary's field education office, and he creatively imagined an internship experience between Our Savior and Bridge of Peace. Here I was, coming in late, out of sync, and I was blessed from the start. I remember him saying, "It would be a really unique experience!" And looking back over this year, I realize that that was an understatement.

My time with you feels short, but perhaps that is so because I wish it would be longer. I have loved my time with you and have loved Our Savior. The qualities of this community are worthy of praise, and I experienced them throughout my journey as Vicar. Allow me to recount a few of these qualities that I was fortunate enough to encounter.

Our Savior is a community that is deeply rooted in this area. There are families that make up this community that have come here for generations, and are proud of that continuity. They remember when Our Savior met at Tony's Pizza, they remember Pastors come and gone, they remember faithful members, they remember baptisms and weddings and important life passages. That deep-rootedness has a family tree effect where you feel a deep sense of relatedness to each other.

Our Savior is a community that is profoundly capable of adaptation and innovation. Here I came to you, basically from out of the blue, and you were able to not only accommodate me, but to embrace your role as a teaching and supporting community. Recently, this community has changed its worship times to adapt to family schedules, recognizing the fruit of doing so. Change was embraced for the good it would bring.

These two qualities of both deep-rootedness and openness to change are amazing in themselves, but to have them together affords the final quality I would like to mention: energy! There is always something happening at Our Savior, whether in worship, or simply in the building! Our Savior is a community that is alive and vibrant, and so it attracts, it draws in, it is magnetic. Our sacred treasure is the Gospel of new life in Jesus Christ, and Our Savior embodies this energy of the Resurrection.

So, thank you, Our Savior, for welcoming me this year. I have been blessed. I have been a witness to a church that inspires me, that heartens me, with hope for the future of the Church. I will miss Bible study, and Sunday morning worship, and those chance encounters in the hallway or in the kitchen. I will miss being a part of this deeply rooted and deeply innovative community, and surely as I leave I will lovingly carry these qualities wherever I go.



October Council Meeting Highlighted by Funding 2023 Financial Plan for Ministry

At the regular meeting of the Congregation Council in October most of the discussion focused on the concern for funding the anticipated 2023 Ministry Plan. In addition to the congregation's generous envelope giving, in 2021 Our Savior received a PPP loan and in 2022 the Memorial Gift Board provided financial support of the General Fund ministry that enabled the congregation to end each year without being in the red. In 2023 those resources will not be as readily available. Without those resources the anticipated shortfall will be about \$62,000.

Given the current economic climate that seems like a big challenge – until you break it down per giving household. Currently 206 households have contributed in 2022 toward God's work in the world through Our Savior's ministry. If each household were to increase their 2023 offering by just \$1 a day, or \$7 a week, or \$30 a month the total offering income would increase by over \$74,000! The gap would be eliminated with additional funds for more ministry. The Congregation Resources ministry will factor this information into their fall campaign that culminates with Commitment Sunday on November 20.

The Council recognized that while this would be a significant increase to overall envelope giving, they noted that the ministry our current staff and programs provide have resulted in an increase in Sunday school and Vacation Bible Camp participation, online and in person worship, and support of outside social ministry agencies. However, the ability to afford this caliber of ministry does not come without necessary financial support, and the Council is confident the congregation will rise to the challenge during the Fall Stewardship Appeal with the results on Commitment Sunday and following weeks.

Memorial Garden Flag Retirement/Replacement on Veterans Day, Nov 11 @ 3:30

Our Savior has established a tradition with respect to retiring and replacing the United States flag that flies above our Memorial Garden by holding a short service on Veteran's Day each year, regardless of the day of the week on which it occurs. On Friday, November 11, Veteran's Day, at 3:30 Pastor Wayne will lead a brief ceremony where the current flag will be retired, and a new flag will be flown. The time was changed to 3:30 so Scouts and other children might have the opportunity to

attend as well after school.

The retired flag will be turned over to the American Legion Post 38 in Haddonfield for proper disposal. The Legion's American flag disposal receptacle and ceremony were an Eagle Scout project completed by Jonathan Baxter, a member of Our Savior.

If you would like to donate a flag for future years, it should be at least 3'x5' or 4'x6' in dimension for our 20-foot pole. We look forward to this being an annual event to honor our veterans as well as retire and replace our Memorial Garden flag.

Justice and Peace Committee: Looking Behind the News Recognizing Our New Jersey Native American Neighbors

National American Indian Heritage Month began in the early 1900s as American Indian Day.

Dr. Arthur C Parker, a Seneca Indian and Director of the Museum of Arts and Science in Rochester, New York, persuaded the Boy Scouts of America to set aside a day for the "First Americans." In 1915 the annual Congress of American Indian Association formally approved a proclamation to call upon the country to observe an American Indian Day, the first appeal for recognition of Indians as citizens. Red Fox James, a Blackfoot Indian, rode horseback from state to state seeking approval for a day to honor Indians. On December 14, 1915 he presented the endorsements of 24 state governments to the White House, but there is no record of such a national day being proclaimed. American Indians finally became citizens in 1924 in honor of the many who enlisted in World War I.

Over the years several states sporadically dedicated a day to honor Native American Indians. At one point the day after Thanksgiving was used, as was Columbus Day. In 1990 President George H.W. Bush approved a joint resolution designating November as National American Indian Month. Similar proclamations occurred annually until 2021, when it was officially designated a nationally recognized month.

Haddonfield is located on land that is part of the traditional territory of the Lenni-Lenape. The Lenape People lived in harmony with one another upon this territory for thousands of years. During the colonial era and early federal period, many were removed west and north, but some remained. Three thousand current New Jersey citizens belong to the Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape Tribe.

There is a plaque at the corner of Kings Highway and Chews Landing Road stating "King's Road laid out in 1681 over a portion of the trail of the Lenni-Lenape Indians running from Perth Amboy to Salem. Chews Landing Road used by the early New Jersey Colonists. This stone commemorates the spirit of humanity and kindness existing between the colonists of New Jersey and the Unalachtigo Lenape Tribe, the original owners of this land." Chief Shawuskukhkung stated in a memorial to the New Jersey Legislature, "Not a drop of our blood have you spilled in battle; not one acre of our land have you taken but by our consent."

Lenni means "genuine, pure, real, original." Lenape means "real person" or "original person." The ELCA New Jersey Synod "acknowledges the Lenni-Lenape as the original people of this land and their continuing relationship with their territory. In our acknowledgement of the continued presence of Lenape people in their homeland, we affirm the aspiration of the great Lenape chief Tamanend, that there be harmony between the indigenous people of this land and the descendants of the immigrants to the land as long as the rivers and creeks flow, and the sun, moon and starts shine."
