In-Person & Zoom Congregation Annual Brunch & Meeting Set for

January 29th @ 10:30; Worship Services Are as Usual.

The ability to hold a hybrid annual meeting last year enabled people to attend despite their inability to be physically present (one member joined from his hospital room!) The Wi-Fi network has been upgraded so there should be no issue with respect to internet connectivity as we had last year. Therefore, the schedule for Annual Meeting Sunday will be as follows.

8:00 a.m. – In-Person Worship

9:30 a.m. – In-Person/Livestream Sanctuary and Reflections Worship Services: Use the link on our website homepage to join the livestream or attend in person. Reflections Worship starts in the Parlor and joins the Sanctuary Worship after the Hymn of the Day.

10:30 a.m. – Congregation Brunch in the Parish Hall: Families are asked to bring a side dish or a dessert to share.
11:15 a.m. – Annual Meeting In-Person & by Zoom. We will begin the Annual Meeting in the Parish Hall at 11:15 regardless of whether people are still eating. Those attending by Zoom can use the link on the homepage of Our Savior's website to join the meeting. The meeting has a somewhat light agenda and should conclude by 12:00.

What if I don't have the ability to use a computer? Can I participate if all I have is a house phone or an old flip cell phone? Yes. The Meeting ID is 818 6032 9679 and the Passcode is 343318, which you will need when dialing into the meeting. Just dial 1-929-205-6099 on your cell and punch in the information when prompted. You will be able to hear the meeting and be heard by everyone in the meeting as well. Your image will simply be your phone number.

How will roll call be taken? Council Secretary Ann Querns will have a paper roll sheet for those attending in person to sign. We will be recording the meeting so we will have a record of all who are attending. If you are dialing in by phone instead of using the internet you will be asked your name so we can record your name with your phone number that is on the screen.

Why is it so important for members to make the effort to participate this year, especially when it will be so challenging? In addition to the election of Council and Memorial Gift Board members as well as approving the 2023 Financial Plan for Ministry the big topic for discussion and voting of members will be the approval of Our Savior's Memorial Gift Board Bylaw changes that were brought up last year and tabled for approval until this year. The original and revised document will be available in January for members to review prior to the meeting. Memorial Gift Board will also hold a Q&A session on Sunday, January 22 for any who have detailed questions about the change.

"God's Extraordinary Love Revealed in the Ordinary" By Pastor Wayne Zschech

Did you attend December's Lessons and Carols worship? It was entitled, "Knowledge, Wisdom, Worship, Awe" and I for one was left in awe of how impactful the experience was as we headed into Christmas. As I sat next to my wife, Kate, who I rarely have the opportunity to sit next to and share our faith together in worship, I listened to the Nativity of our Lord from Luke and the reflection adapted from Sarah Bessey following it. I always enjoy when Rebecca reads. She makes the story

come to life. And as I listened to her share the reflection I was drawn into one powerful part of the story. It was the part where the miracle of God's love and grace are more often not found in the grand displays we might expect, but in the simple ordinary experiences of life. Sometimes, most times, it is in the ordinary little things in life where God's extraordinary love and grace is revealed.

That's what Epiphany is all about. Mary and Joseph are changing Jesus' diaper when Magi from the East knock at the door bearing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. God's love revealed in an infant. Don't forget that parents even when that adorable child hits the raging hormone rebellious stage of puberty.

Amidst many being baptized in the Jordan for the forgiveness of sin a cloud opens with sunbeams shining down on Jesus. "This is my son with whom I am well pleased." Can something as simple as bathing become an experience of the holy?

An ordinary hike up a mountain becomes an extraordinary experience of Jesus transfigured before Peter, James, and John's eyes. When was the last time a hike in the woods, along the beach, or up a mountain resulted in a transformation experience of God's extraordinary grace and majesty in our midst?

Epiphany is the season we look for God's extraordinary love in the ordinary practices and experiences in our lives. It might happen on the commute into work in a casual conversation with someone seated near us on the PATCO train car. It might happen while watching an Eagles playoff game with family, friends, or neighbors while sharing a plate of nachos. It might happen amidst a fight between spouses when true heartfelt reconciliation is realized and felt. It might even happen while listening to a song we've heard a million times before on the radio, but this time, there's a verse that captures where you are and offers THE WORD you need to hear most for healing and hope.

I want to get a copy of that reading Rebecca read from Sarah Bessey. Even more so I'll probably see if there's a podcast or an audiobook by her I can listen to while walking the dog in the morning. Who says God's extraordinary love can't be revealed while taking care of your pet's ordinary business? That's how the God of infinite power and majesty who was born in a lowly stable manger works — God's love and grace are revealed most intimately in the messy ordinary parts of our lives. In Epiphany we are invited to pay attention to them and like the Magi to worship the Christ child with awe and wonder. Blessings in this ordinary time of the church year.



Bible Discussion for Daily Living Study of "Evil & the Followers of Jesus" Begins Jan 9/11

"Evil and the Followers of Jesus says that the existence of sin and evil in the world created by a loving God is more of an ethical problem than it is an intellectual problem. It distinguishes between sin and evil arguing that sin is an orientation away from God that is universal to human beings, and evil is a death-dealing force that receives power whenever sins are not acknowledged and confessed. It further contends that Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection gives His followers the power to acknowledge and confess their sins, and, thereby fight the death dealing power of evil in the world." – Back cover synopsis Join the growing number of people who gather on Mondays from 7:00-8:30 PM or Wednesday mornings from 9:30-11:00 AM in Room 112 or by Zoom (the link is on our homepage) for a 5-week study of Scott Gustafson's book that Pastor Wayne refers to over and over again on the topic of how evil arises when we are unwilling to acknowledge and confess sin. Justice and Peace

Justice and Peace: Looking Behind the News at Anti-Semitism

A recent article in the *Philadelphia Inquirer* noted that anti-Semitic comments by public figures are normalizing hate and ramping up the risk of violence. Public comments that at one time would have been condemned are now part of normal political discourse. The newspaper pointed out that this normalization of hate speech is not only a political problem, but a societal one. Many thanks to LCOS member Linda Harrington for her focus below on the scope of this issue.

Anti-Semitism is increasing across the country and the world at a shocking rate.

The Anti-Defamation League, a leader in combatting hate, records incidents of anti-Semitism. The compilation is extensive. Public figures and politicians voice hostility and prejudice against Jewish people, denying the Holocaust. Banners hung from highway overpasses express racist, anti-Semitic language. Fliers containing anti-Semitic tropes are distributed clandestinely in neighborhoods and left on parked cars and in mailboxes. Protestors stand outside arenas distributing anti-Semitic propaganda. Jewish people are verbally and physically harassed, and their property, including homes, buildings, schools and cemeteries, is vandalized and defaced with hateful graffiti. Synagogues and Jewish community centers receive terroristic threats. And all of these hate-fueled acts occurred in our country—*just in the last month!* Imagine the pain and fear suffered by our Jewish brothers and sisters as a result.


Recently, FBI Director Christopher Wray addressed the pervasive anti-Semitism in the United States: "Jewish people continue to face repeated violence and very real threats from all kinds of actors ... simply for being who they are." He added that 63% of hate crimes in the U.S. involving religion were motivated by anti-Semitism. "The threat of violent extremism is real, and it's urgent," the Director said.

What Can We Do?

- □ Read the ELCA Declaration to the Jewish Community (rev'd 11/2021)—an expression of the church's continual opposition to rising anti-Semitism, a measure of accountability within our church and to our Jewish partners for the church's troubling legacy of anti-Jewish bias and complicity, and a commitment to build a relationship with the Jewish people based on love and respect. The Declaration can be found at www.elca.org.
- ☐ Study the Declaration and Lutheran-Jewish resources available on the ELCA website under "Jewish Relations" to strive toward understanding and respecting our neighbors' beliefs.
- □ Explore the deep common historical and scriptural roots we Christians share with Jews. Learn about the history of Judaism since New Testament times and about their faith community today.
- □ Cultivate relationships and build mutual understanding. Ask to join your Jewish friends at their houses of worship and religious observances and ceremonies, and welcome them to yours. Together, attend lectures and discussions on topics of mutual interest, and tour places of historical or religious significance to each tradition.
- □ Be an active bystander! Respond to prejudiced or stereotyped views about Jewish people, derogatory expressions and "jokes" by calling out and denouncing the speaker's anti-Semitic comments, or, at the least, removing oneself from the conversation. Guard against, interrupt, and condemn anti-Jewish threats and acts of violence. Report hate speech, threats, property damage and violence to authorities, and be supportive of the victims.

Be attentive to opportunities to oppose all bigotry, as individuals and together as the church.

Looking to do more? On January 25 the LCOS Book Group will be discussing *Life in a Jar: The Irena Sendler Project*, based on the true story of a Polish Catholic social worker who saved 2,500 children from certain death and the Kansas teens who discovered and shared her story with the world. 
LCOS Book Club Life in a Jar: The Irena Sendler Project By Jack Mayer

Life in a Jar: The Irena Sendler Project is a Holocaust history and more. It is the inspirational story of Protestant students from Kansas, each carrying her own painful burden, each called in her own complex way to the history of a Catholic woman who knocked on Jewish doors in the Warsaw ghetto and, in Sendler's own words, "tried to talk the mothers out of their children." Inspired by Irena Sendler, these students are living examples of the power of one person to change the world and models for young people everywhere.

Holiday Food Drive 2022

Thank you to all who donated holiday food bags or made monetary donations. This year's Holiday Food Drive benefitted the Peace Center at Bridge of Peace Lutheran Church in Camden, a ministry to the poor and homeless in Camden, and the LCOS Pantry families. This year, a total of 53 bags of food were delivered to Bridge of Peace, and 10 food bags to our Pantry families. At last report, a total of \$1144.82 in donations were received, which will be divided between the Peace Center at Bridge of Peace and the LCOS Pantry.

Once again, the people of Our Savior have put their faith into action with their generosity. A huge thank you and well done from the Social Ministry Committee to everyone who took Advent Giving Tree tags in-person at church or thru the online registry, and bought the gift cards or donated money to purchase gift cards. We started with 200 tags and ended with 135 tags taken and 65 tags left. Also, in addition to the \$1000.00 budgeted for the Giving Tree, \$816.38 was contributed so far to the Advent Giving Tree fund to purchase gift cards for all of the leftover tags. The gifts are given to children, teenagers, young adults, adults and families through the following organizations.

- 1. Urban Promise provides Christian outreach and education programs for children and youth of Camden.
- 2. My Father's House a court mandated substance abuse counseling center for male and female teenagers and adults.
- 3. Caring Hearts Ministry provides support for individuals with HIV/AIDS and their families.
- 4. Pantry Families families in our area who are regularly provided with groceries from the LCOS pantry.

Gift cards were preferred over wrapped or unwrapped gifts as it gives the recipients the dignity to provide for children or other family members, it is a more meaningful gift.



A Journey Of a Thousand Miles Begins With a Single Step

Are you making resolutions for 2023? I used to make big resolutions up there with the rest of them and usually fail. The few I did meet and am proud of to this day are getting into grad school and running a half marathon, and this year I am just a few books shy of meeting my ambitious reading goal for the year, and with 11 days left as I am writing this and all Christmas gifts gloriously taken care of, I think I may just meet that one. My only resolution for 2023 is to grow our little family by one as we are expecting a baby girl in April! (Well, the secret resolution is to have Easter Sunday be my last Sunday before maternity leave, as she's due 9 days after Easter, but I hear babies have their own timing on that one...)

So often we think of changes and resolutions as these big, fast, radical steps. And yet, it has been proven that most changes take time and patience and require small steps. My elementary school teacher had a sign in her classroom that said, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step," and though it took me decades to follow, understand and appreciate that saying, I now try to live by it. Instead of expecting choir mem-

bers to learn how to read music overnight, we have been doing weekly 10–15-minute sessions, and since September have learned a lot! Instead of thinking about changing the world in one session, our Justice and Peace team has been meeting faithfully every month and planning ahead, and the changes that are happening one by one have been one of my favorite things to watch happen in our church. Instead of reading a whole book of the Bible at once and expecting to understand it all, our Bible study members have been breaking it up into weekly chunks to discuss and study, and we have made it through the entire Gospel of Matthew in under two months! One of my personal goals as we were getting ready to move this fall was to donate as many clothes as I could, and instead of doing it all at once, I would just drop off whatever I had done that week in a clothes donation bin on the way to church, and as I look into my closet at my new house, I would estimate that at least four big bags have been donated to those who need the clothes more than I do.

What are the smaller changes that you can make this coming year? What is a small step God is calling you to do? Maybe you want to say hello to two families you haven't previously talked to, either in church or in your neighborhood. Perhaps you want to sing just a little louder when we're singing hymns in the service! Maybe you want to make sure every birthday present you buy this year supports a local store. Perhaps you want to contribute one monthly meal to one of the pantry families or shelters LCOS supports. Maybe you want to join a new committee at church, even if it may not be a new leadership position. Maybe you want to do the \$1 a day challenge that Pastor Wayne suggested for our giving. Whatever it is, I hope you will take that journey that begins with a single step, sing that first note of a new song, and see where God will lead you on your journey. *Pauline*

Join the Daily Donation Challenge in 2023 to Aid Fully Fund Ministry

First things first. Why is a giving Challenge even needed? The short answer is we don't have the outside \$30,000+ funding we had in the previous two years. In 2021 Our Savior received a \$37,500 Payroll Protection Program loan during the pandemic that made up the shortfall in giving and the increase of the Director of Youth and Family Ministry to full time. In 2022 the Memorial Gift Board provided a \$31,000 grant to again make up the difference, despite the fact the DYFM position was only funded for seven months due to a search process to fill the position. In 2023 the position is fully funded for a year. However, in 2023 there is no PPP loan or Memorial Gift Board grant available to fully fund all staff positions and maintain all other regularly funded ministry and support as in past years. Cuts had to be made, including

- A reduction in ELCA Mission Support from 10% to 5% of envelope offerings
- Elimination of Bott Major Repair Fund contributions
- Postpone a financial review by auditing firm for another year
- Certain other non-critical line items that could be cut for a year.

Those cuts equal about \$35,000 that had to be eliminated to provide a balanced financial plan for ministry in 2023. Hence the challenge. If all 206 giving households were to give an extra dollar a day the total increase in giving by New Year's Eve 2023 would \$74,000! So, this is the challenge. Take a jar and put it on the table or wherever you'll see it every day. Then put a dollar, or whatever works for you, in the jar every day. Next time you come to worship empty the jar into your offering envelope. It's that simple. We will even add a Daily Donation Challenge line item to our Simply Giving platform for those who give online if that works better for you. It is the Council's hope that the response is so widespread among the congregation that we can increase our Mission Support to what the Synod has requested as well as partially or even fully fund other cuts made.

Remember! This Challenge is above and beyond what you would normally put in your offering. Thank you for your support of time, talent, and treasure toward God's work in the world through the ministry of Our Savior. Your generosity makes a difference!


