Holy Week and Easter Worship – Both In Person and by Livestream

Now that we are coming out of the pandemic we hope the congregation will begin to experience the joy of worshiping in person again without masks this Holy Week and Easter Season. Here are the worship opportunities this year with descriptions of each.

Maundy Thursday, April 6 at 7:00pm: This service has three foci and we encourage you to participate with the following suggestions.

Absolution by Laying on of Hands: Whether you are in the church or at home you are invited at the time of absolution to place your hands on your head, as Pastor Wayne proclaims the absolution in worship. This may seem weird but you are encouraged to imagine you are feeling the hands of Jesus on your head, offering forgiveness.

Foot Washing: For those in the sanctuary this will be more of an observation than participation part of worship. However, for those participating by livestream you might consider placing your feet in a basin of warm water during the foot washing portion of the service. Have a towel handy to dry off as well.

Holy Communion: Communion will be distributed by intinction (dipping the wafer into the cup) for those worshiping in person. For those participating by livestream we invite you to have some bread and wine/grape juice available to share and eat when Holy Communion is celebrated in worship so you might feel connected to the Lord's Supper being shared by the body of Christ on this day.



Good Friday Tenebrae, April 7 at 7:00pm: We will hold the service of shadows on Good Friday that includes the reading of John's Passion narrative as well as the Bidding Prayer and prayers centered on the seven last words of Christ on the cross. While those in the sanctuary will have kneelers to use we invite livestream participants to create a way for you to kneel during the Bidding Prayer so you might experience the physical penitential aspect of this worship. You may also choose to light some candles in your home and darken the room where you are watching the livestream.



Resurrection of Our Lord, April 9 at 8:00, 9:30, and 11:00am: A string ensemble will replace the brass of years past to accompany our Easter celebration this year. Communion will be by intinction for those attending in person. The livestream worship will be at 9:30 for those celebrating the Resurrection of Our Lord from home, and you are encouraged to prepare for Holy Communion worship with elements of bread and wine (or grape juice) for the Meal.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Our Savior is a faith community that worships Jesus as our Lord, proclaims and shares God's Word, welcomes all people, serves human needs, and nurtures personal and spiritual growth through fellowship all to the glory of God.

"Where Does Resurrection New Life Fit with Cancel Culture?" By Pastor Wayne Zschech



You may or may not know what cancel culture is, but I'm sure you've heard the term used in the media or wherever people gather for conversation. According to Meriam Webster "Cancel culture is the practice or tendency of engaging in mass canceling as a way of expressing disapproval and exerting social pressure." More simply put, it's boycotting on steroids. Boycotting addresses the injustice and exerts economic and societal pressure on the people and systems that perpetuate an inequity in order to effect change. From what I understand about cancel culture the masses effectively cancel the very person or

people who are at the source of the injustice. It is as if they are dead to the cancel culture proponents. There is no room for redemption. There is no room for reconciliation or renewal or new life. I may have this incorrect and would welcome a conversation about it.

So, in a month when we celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord and the hope of new life, new beginnings, in which the world now has access to because Jesus is risen (indeed) I began to wonder how one's faith and trust in the Resurrection could ever fit into a cancel culture perspective. It is the resurrection that enables us to boldly confess our sins to God and neighbor, confident that we are forgiven and receive new life as a result. As "Resurrection people" Christians are all about new life through death rather than being cancelled forever as a result of our actions or words. Imagine if God was a member of cancel culture. Would there be any hope for a new tomorrow, a new way of living life, an opportunity for transformation?

If Cancel Culture is truly a practice of cancelling people, institutions, and organizations not just to effect change, but as a permanent practice, regardless of whether there has been true contrition and transformation, then I don't see where there is room in such a mindset and practice for those who follow a Risen Lord who offers new life through death. We proclaim in our Affirmation of Baptism that we will strive for justice and peace in all the earth. Participating in acts that effect economic and social pressure to can lead to injustices and inequities being remedied fits within that promise we make at the baptismal font. Cancelling the person, institution, or organization beyond their contrition and reconciliation is not consistent with what disciples called into a ministry of reconciliation are commanded to do. Love your enemies. Pray for your enemies. Pray for those who persecute you. None of this sounds like cancelling people for the rest of their lives regardless of their penitence and contrition.


We promise in our Affirmation of Baptism that we will both "proclaim the good news of God in Christ in word and deed" and "strive for justice and peace in all the earth." When we do we need to be sure that the means that we do the second is also aligned with what we practice in the first. The good news is that by Christ's death and resurrection we celebrate at Easter we are free to forgive as we've been forgiven so new life might be experienced by both oppressor and victim. We are also free to confess our sins so we might hear the good news of absolution and experience the new life that comes from forgiveness. Cancel culture has a place in striving for justice and peace, but for those who follow a risen Christ it has limits. We cannot cancel our neighbor forever. It's not what God does toward us. It's not what God's children are called to do toward others and the world in which we live. We can't because Christ is risen. He is risen indeed.

Acts Bible Discussion For Daily Living in April and May

The Holy Spirit is clearly at work in Acts, pouring out on people from many nations on the day of Pentecost, giving Jesus' disciples the power to speak boldly, gathering early believers together for worship, and sending out Peter and Paul as missionaries. In this course, participants will examine the beginnings of the church and will find meaningful connections between the early church and the church today. Given many of the readings in the season of Easter focus on the book of Acts it is only appropriate to study this Lukan work just prior to and after Easter.

Join the group either in person or by Zoom as they continue their discussion in April and May. The group meets in the Room 112 Conference Room and a Zoom link is available on the church website for both meeting times of Mondays from 7:00-8:30 PM and Wednesdays from 9:30-11:00 AM. There are participant books to aid in preparing for each week's discussion and are available in the church office. The cost of the book is \$10 for those who wish to defray the budgeted expense, but is not a requirement to participate. The reading assignments for each week are as follows.

Flexibility - Could Jesus Touch His Toes? (Or Is This About Different Flexibility?)

Our choir has a warm up song that's a fun and bouncy tune with the words "Flexibility, flexibility, sing with light and short notes, flexibility, flexibility, sing with easy floating breath" (it makes more sense when you actually hear/sing it!). While it may sound fun, flexibility is not actually often something we enjoy or expect! I learned about flexibility the hard way this week when I had to go to the ER due to food poisoning (I was fine, we just had to make sure the baby was okay as well!) and realized that this maternity leave may not be starting when I want it to, but when this baby wants to, and that all my music really needed to be ready to go any day now for whoever was jumping in for me! Thankfully all was well and I am still on track, but do you ever feel like God just wants to make sure you're flexible and ready to go whatever direction He needs you to go? If only flexibility was only about being able to touch your toes (though I can't do that one well these days, either!). I often read stories about Jesus in the Bible and wonder if he ever knew what was about to happen - people lowering their friend in through a roof hoping for healing, a woman touching him in a

crowd, children running to him, etc. It seems that whatever happens, Jesus is flexible and makes sure to pivot and pay attention to what is happening in that moment (you may notice that the disciples are a lot less flexible and often seem surprised or even annoyed that Jesus wants to pivot their plans and heal or listen to the people).

Where in your life does Jesus want you to be flexible? Is it long held on beliefs you haven't questioned because that's just how it's always been since growing up? Is it in things in worship when we introduce a new hymn, a new liturgy, or a new order? A book or Bible study that pushes your understanding of Scripture and God? Or maybe it's something in your personal life that God is wanting you to pivot or expand on. A little extra time in a day for an act of service, or an extra second to breathe before answering to someone who pushes your buttons, or maybe not pushing yourself too hard in a workout to honor where your body is physically or emotionally on a particular day.

As I am writing this last article before my maternity leave, I want to thank you for your flexibility and understanding as I embark on this exciting new journey! First of all, thank you to all who participated in my wonderful surprise baby shower (especially Kate, Sandy, Peg, and Cathe) and showered us with love! It was such a beautiful afternoon. I also hope that while the music has been planned out ahead, if there are any hiccups for whatever reasons, you may meet them with flexibility and grace. I am writing this a little under 4 weeks away from the official start of my maternity leave, but if things change between now and then, I thank you in advance for your patience and flexibility even then! Justice & Peace Committee: Earth Day Round Up



Earth Day 2023, Saturday, April 22, reminds us of our responsibility as Christians to be stewards of God's creation, not only for our own benefit, but for the world's poor and disadvantaged who feel the biggest impact. Many thanks to Pastor Sarah Lilja and the efforts of Lutherans Engaging in Advocacy Ministry (LEAMNJ) for representing our NJ Synod congregations in Trenton and keeping us all informed. Some recent LEAMNJ updates show how much is at stake. *Linda Nelson*

• Gov. Murphy's Green Energy Push

Gov. Phil Murphy recently announced new goals and initiatives to bring NJ closer to a 100% clean-energy economy. Along with plans to retrofit over 400,000 new and remodeled homes with zero-emissions cooling and heating systems, the governor also moved up the date to 2035 for banning the sale of gasoline-powered vehicles.

• Pinelands Face Development Pressure

The NJ Pinelands, an internationally recognized region of natural and scientific importance, has faced continued attempts to develop its land into pipelines and sports complexes. This is worsened by the appointment of developers and corporate lobbyists to the NJ Pinelands Commission, an agency meant to preserve and manage the protected area. Poor oversight in the Pinelands could lead to major future development.

NJ Watersheds at Risk

NJ's ample watersheds are at continued risk of pollution and damage from climate change. Advocates urge that changes need to be made. Run-off introduces dangerous chemicals into the water supply, and rising sea levels already are adding salt to some watersheds. This not only endangers the safety of our drinking water, but also the preservation of protected land and forests and the diverse wildlife that lives there.

Stewards of God's Gifts...the Five Gifts of Discipleship



According to the ELCA website, a steward is one who takes care of that which belongs to another, including gifts given by God. Over the past three years here at Our Savior, we've striven to be Stewards of God's Love. We've come to understand that everything we are or have has come down to us in God's love. As stewards of that love, our congregation has done an outstanding job of sharing our earthly blessings with others. This year we're shifting our focus slightly to think about being Stewards of God's Gifts. By gifts we mean the gifts that come to us personally through our baptism and again whenever we reaffirm

our faith in the covenant God made with us in baptism. Why would a focus on stewardship, which too often we think of only as sharing money, lead to a focus on baptismal vows? Think of it as the safety drill the crew puts us through before an airplane takes off. "In the unlikely event of an emergency," we are to put on our oxygen masks first before helping others around us. Stewarding the spiritual gifts we receive through baptism lays the foundation for stewarding the earthly gifts we receive. We need to make sure we're safely in God's hands before we take off into the world.

When we reaffirm our faith, we make five promises, which are five gifts of discipleship: to live among God's faithful people; to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper; to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed; to serve all people, following the example of Jesus; and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth. These five gifts help us to practice our faith and serve as a reminder of Who has claimed us. If we do not practice faith, it's easy to get confused, distracted and complacent. Rather than stewarding these spiritual gifts, we chase other dreams and wander away from God's calling.

Since we have made these five promises, it's wise to stop once in a while and think about whether we're fulfilling our side of the covenant. This month we're focusing on our promise to live among God's faithful people. After you've said, "I do, and I ask God to help and guide me," what has happened in your life? Is gathering with your church community in worship part of your regular routine, or an occasional event when you can fit it in? Do you take advantage of fellowship opportunities to get to know fellow congregation members? How about responding for requests for help by showing up with a willing pair of hands? After getting to know fellow LCOS members, do you care for them enough to include them in your prayers? Are you living among God's faithful people...or standing on the sidelines?





After Jesus was raised from the dead, he appears to his disciples with a very specific message. That message is one of peace. Jesus says to them two times, "Peace be with you" (John 20:19). 


Vacation Bible Camp
