"A Dollar-a-Day Challenge to Ensure Mission Support" By Pastor Wayne Zschech



A bit of background first. I write this on Tax Day, a day many citizens grudgingly file their taxes with the IRS along with a check if their obligation is greater than what they paid out the previous year. Like it or not, taxes pay for what benefits our society. They pay for infrastructure improvements, our nation's defense, assistance programs for our neighbors in need, as well as for research and other programs that improve the quality of life for all citizens. Even if you don't like paying taxes, I don't imagine anyone would want to live in a nation that didn't provide the various programs so many United States citizens

benefit from every day.

Synodical Mission Support contributions by congregations are not the same as paying taxes to the synod. It is, and always will be, a voluntary offering by congregations for the work of the gospel by the larger church. The combined mission support of the 155 ELCA congregations in New Jersey, anticipated to be \$1,760,000 in 2023, make it possible for ELCA and Ministry Partner growth, strengthening congregations, providing leadership for mission, and oversight and planning of synod ministries.

Historically, Our Savior has provided 10% of our Envelope and Loose Offerings toward our Mission Support contributions each year. Unfortunately, to balance our proposed financial plan for ministry in 2023 we had to reduce that percentage to 5% to make the numbers balance. That significant reduction was not lost on our bishop, and she has encouraged us to do what we can to exceed our expectations for envelope giving so reductions in synodical ministry would not be necessary.


This is why the Council included a CHALLENGE line item in our financial plan. Here is the challenge. If each household were to put a dollar-a-day into a jar and each time they attend worship empty the jar into their offering envelope there would be more than enough in Challenge Offerings to both meet the \$5,000 line item in our financial plan but enough to make up what we had to cut in Synod Mission Support. "How much?" you might ask. There are 245 days left in the year beginning May 1. If only 100 of the 200 giving households were to participate in the challenge that would result in \$24,500 in Challenge offerings. Some of you have already given an entire year's offering toward this challenge. I provide mine on a week-to-week basis. The choice is yours, but I highly encourage each household to consider participating in this challenge to insure that not only will Our Savior have sufficient funds for our ministry, but even more so the New Jersey Synod will have the funds it needs to enable and enhance ministry for the congregations across the synod, our nation, and the world. One of the blessings of serving this congregation is experiencing the generosity of our members when a ministry need is made known. Our Savior benefits from the work and ministry of the NJ Synod each time we participate in a synodsponsored program, such as the Transforming White Privilege Workshop or a synod-wide youth event. We benefit from the staff and resources that provide support to congregations with respect to stewardship and worship. Our Savior is blessed so we might be a blessing to others. I invite and encourage you and your family to make a commitment to participating in the Dollar-A-Day Challenge this year starting May 1 or sooner. A graph will show how well we are doing with different benchmarks on it to indicate the impact any giving above \$5,000 will have with respect to Mission Support ministry by the Synod. I look forward to celebrating in December the good work we will be able to provide above and beyond our initial expectations. Together let us rise to the challenge set before us as the Spirit guides us.

Acts Bible Discussion For Daily Living in April and May

The Holy Spirit is clearly at work in Acts, pouring out on people from many nations on the day of Pentecost, giving Jesus' disciples the power to speak boldly, gathering early believers together for worship, and sending out Peter and Paul as missionaries. In this course, participants will examine the beginnings of the church and will find meaningful connections between the early church and the church today. Given many of the readings in the season of Easter focus on the book of Acts it is only appropriate to study this Lukan work just prior to and after Easter.

Join the group either in person or by Zoom as they continue their discussion in April and May. The group meets in the Room 112 Conference Room and a Zoom link is available on the church website for both meeting times of Mondays from 7:00-8:30 PM and Wednesdays from 9:30-11:00 AM. There are participant books to aid in preparing for each week's discussion and are available in the church office. LCOS Missionary Support



Lutheran Church of Our Savior has just begun supporting ELCA missionary Kristin Engstrom, a former NJ pastor who is now serving in Zambia. The Sunday School will be having a Mission Sunday on April 30 to learn about ELCA mission work and about Zambia.

Recently, Rev. Engstrom wrote a letter to the congregations that are supporting her work: Dear Congregations:

I have been here in Zambia, working with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Zambia (ELCZa), for almost a year now. During that time, I have been welcomed and invited into ministry by our siblings in the ELCZa. The church here has been a blessing, even as the work I am called to has challenged me to develop new skills and ways of ministry that are appropriate for the

Zambian context.

Council Recommends Memorial Gift Board Support of Haddonfield Community Caseworker and other Council Actions:

The following is an update of the last two months of Council actions at their March and April regular meetings.

- HADDONFIELD COMMUNITY CASEWORKER SUPPORT: The Council recommended the Haddonfield Community Caseworker be provided additional support from Our Savior through Memorial Gift Funds by the Board in the amount of \$5,000. Ed Hess serves as the Caseworker and operates out of the First Presbyterian Church in Haddonfield twice a week in meeting potential clients.
- PASTOR CONTINUING EDUCATION GRANT: Pastor Wayne Zschech had hoped to attend the ELCA Rostered
 Ministers Gathering in 2020, but the pandemic delayed that event for three years when he hopes to attend this July in
 Phoenix. However, with zero funding in the General Fund financial plan, Pastor Wayne is seeking a grant from the Memorial Gift Board for the registration, lodging, and travel costs for the trip. The Council approved an amount to guarantee all three and recommended the proposal to the Memorial Gift Board, which was approved at their March meeting.
- PARSONAGE PARKING ONLY SIGN APPROVAL: Outside guests using the church building along with various vendors and repair personnel servicing the church's property needs often confuse the parsonage driveway with a church "parking lot." In doing so, Pastor Wayne and Kate are often either blocked in or out of using the parsonage driveway. The Council approved the purchase and installation of signage to indicate the driveway is for parsonage parking only to deter guests and service personnel from illicit parking in the future.

• May is Asian-American & Pacific-Islander Heritage Month

Stewards of God's Gifts...gifts of word, bread and wine



We are living in unprecedented times—a pandemic, economic uncertainty, unresolved racism, divisive politics. It all leaves us unsettled and anxious. While there is much in the world we can't control, we can control our own beliefs and behavior. We can intentionally choose healthy patterns to offset the stress and uncertainty the world throws at us. Fortunately for us, the promises we make when we reaffirm our bap-

tism provide a good pathway to healthy choices.

This year at Our Savior we're focusing on the spiritual gifts God bestows on us through our baptism and again whenever we reaffirm our faith. We're good stewards when we use these gifts wisely to strengthen our faith and guide our behavior. We're foolish stewards if we let these gifts lie unused or ignored. We're called first to use the gifts God has given us to strengthen our own lives and then called to share his gifts with others.

Through the promises we make in baptism we receive the gifts of discipleship. Last month we looked at the first: to live among God's faithful people. This month we're focusing on the second: to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper. After you've said, "I do, and I ask God to help and guide me," what has happened in your life? Have you made gathering with your church community in worship part of your regular routine, or an occasional event when you can fit it in? Have you made reading the word of God a regular practice? Do you take advantage of opportunities to study God's word to understand it better? Do you welcome the opportunity to share in the Lord's supper in Sunday worship or slip out of church during the offering hymn? Do you make sure to show up at special services during the year to receive communion, or only for the big festival services?

God gifts us with His word and His body and blood. Choosing the pathway to a healthy spiritual life starts with unwrapping His gifts. Are you stewarding them or letting them lie unused? The choice is yours.



My Father's House Update

After much thought, prayer, and discussion, the Social Ministry Committee has decided to make some changes to the My Father's House ministry. Due to the increasing challenge of finding volunteers to make meals each week, along with the changing needs and numbers at MFH, we will transition from sending weekly meals to providing MFH with snacks and beverages. We believe this change will be a better fit for our volunteer base, and will enable LCOS to serve a greater

number of MFH clients. Anyone who has already signed up to send a meal or who wants to continue to make and deliver meals beyond this transition period is welcome to do so.

Moving forward, we are asking the congregation to donate boxes of individually wrapped, non-perishable snacks (granola bars, popcorn, pretzels, etc.) along with cases of single-serve drinks (water, soda, Gatorade, iced tea, etc.). Donations can be left on the designated shelves just outside of Parish Hall. Kathy and Amelia Wright, along with Gabby Berrios, who will be taking over as coordinator of this ministry, will deliver the food and drinks to My Father's House.

Ukrainian Refugee Family Update

LODGING: On March 18, two days shy of a full year, the Zhara, Derets, and Chastukhina families moved out of the parsonage and into the Wezner House two story apartment owned by First Presbyterian Church of Haddonfield. Due to various generous donors from Our Savior, First Presbyterian, and Temple Kol Ami in Cherry Hill the family had all the furniture, kitchen and bath supplies, and helping hands to move them into the 5- bedroom apartment. The Refugee Fund at Our Savior made it possible for two new twin box-spring and mattresses to be purchased, so a huge thank you to all who have contributed to it over the last year. They love their new home and the independence it brings.

EMPLOYMENT: Both Natalia and Iryna now have their Work Authorization cards and SSN cards to be legally employed in the United States. They have created updated resumes and are looking on employment websites for

potential jobs. Their English is not fully fluent, but if you know someone who has experience in bookkeeping or even low -skill service that does not require extensive communication in English please let Pastor Wayne know.

PERSONAL: All three women, Tanya, Natalia, and Iryna, had developed cracked teeth as a result of the stress related to their circumstances of the last year. Monokian Family Dentistry was gracious to provide the services needed at a reduced rate, which were funded from the Refugee Fund at Tol Ami. Mark is learning to play lacrosse at Haddonfield Middle School while also playing soccer, Nick and Kyrylo continue to further their musical talents and will be playing with a" band" at the Arts in the Courtyard Event at Haddonfield Memorial High School. Sonya joined ChildrenSong that rehearses at Our Savior as well as continues to improve her basketball skills with camps in town.

FUTURE PLANS: Natalia and Iryna will begin to practice for their driver's licenses as they used public transportation almost extensively in Ukraine. This will enable them to accept jobs not available by public transportation. Of course, getting a job is the immediate priority. Nick and Kyrolo will begin the college prep process next year as juniors and hope to attend college after graduation if there are available funds. Mark looks forward to entering the high school and playing soccer for the Dawgs, while Sonya is looking forward to being a Middle Schooler and only having a 60 second walk to school for the next three years as well as continue her violin and basketball playing.

One of the best things about spring are the plants... the beautiful flowers, colors, and blooms that we see all around us. In order for anything to grow, it needs three essential ingredients: sun, water, and good soil. With those three things, a seed can grow into a plant and a plant can grow into its full potential. And sometimes, in addition to sun, water, and good soil, we need a little patience. Chris and I planted a garden when

we moved into our house two years ago. The first year, the trees and shrubs, while healthy and green, yielded no flowers. Last year, there were a few buds and a few small flowers. So far this year I see far more buds and some larger flowers have already bloomed. I have every hope that next year will be better still.

In many ways, one of the most important jobs of the church is planting and nourishing seeds. We plant seeds of faith. As a community, we all participate in nourishing those seeds with fellowship, prayer, Bible study, worship, and outreach. Patience is also necessary here because we are all busy, because we don't always see the results of our service work, and because it takes time for one's relationship with Jesus to grow.

I see the fruit of growth in our congregation all the time. This spring, I have already seen it in the eight First Communion students who spent most of Lent learning and preparing, and then in April were able to take communion with more understanding for the first time. I also continue to seen this bloom of growth in Sunday School as, each week, the youth learn more and form friendships with each other and with Jesus. I am looking forward to seeing this bloom also in the confirmation class. The 8th graders will be confirmed at the beginning of June after two years of classes, meetings, and retreats. I see it in the interactions between members, in the fellowship of the various ministries and church events. I see it in the compassion of service projects and social justice outreach.

Psalm 1:3 reads, "They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season, and their leaves do not wither. In all that they do, they prosper." May we pray for God's continued work in our congregation and the blooming of ministries.
