## One 9:30 Worship Service at Challenge Park on June 11 Followed by Church Picnic

As a way of celebrating the end of our church program year the Lutheran Church of Our Savior will hold one worship service at Challenge Grove Park in Cherry Hill (just off of Brace Road) beginning at 9:30 to be followed by a Church Picnic. Here are the details.

**9:30 Outdoor Worship at Challenge Grove Park Pavilion**: Bring a camp or folding chair as we create our own worship space at the pavilion at Challenge Grove Park. Songs will be accompanied by acoustic guitar and the style will be more akin to camp songs of faith. Holy Communion will be provided by intinction. Wear appropriate clothing for the picnic to follow.

**10:30 Church Picnic & Outdoor Games**: Grilly Cheese will be our lunch caterer for the event and will provide a grilled cheese or hot dog, a side, and a beverage for each participant with the option of going back for another side and beverage. The church-subsidized cost is \$10/person and participants are encouraged to pay in advance by June 4 so staff can have a reasonable figure for total participants. Please see Sandy DeDonatis for payment. However, you can still pay the day of the event so don't stay home just because you missed the deadline.

In addition to eating there will be plenty of outdoor games to be played including lawn bocce, cornhole, wiffle ball, and a variety of group outdoor games coordinated by Sabrina LaBelle. The fun ends when the last family leaves so stay as long as you like and we hope to see as many faces, young and not-as-young, come out for our end of year celebration.



## 11 to Affirm Baptism at Confirmation, June 4 at 9:30 Worship

## "Living With a Holy Curiosity" By Pastor Wayne Zschech



As I spoke with Jamie Bruesehoff, our Pride Month speaker on Transgender Advocacy to be held on June 22, I expressed my biggest concern. "I just don't want people to show up who have a predetermined agenda that shuts down questions from participants. I want this to be a 'safe-ish' space that allows people the freedom to ask questions." She had a wonderful reply. "We want to encourage people to attend who have a 'holy curiosity' about the topic of transgender identity."

A holy curiosity? What a wonderful way to express how a disciple of Christ ought to live out our lives! Imagine if the original disciples did not have a "holy curiosity." Would Peter have been willing to change his position on how the Gentiles were to be included in the newly forming community of The Way that originally was comprised and led by Jews proscribing all members must abide by Jewish law? Would Luther have been open to the concept of priests being able to marry? Would the Lutheran Church have been willing to change their position on the ordination of women in 1970? Having a holy curiosity seems to be a part of a healthy Christian's discipleship DNA from the very beginning until now and beyond. The challenge, of course, is by having a holy curiosity it also means one must be willing to change one's mindset and behavior in the presence of new information or change in reality. I know I did. In 1999 the ELCA created a draft Human Sexuality Statement that did not pass at the Churchwide Assembly. At the time I was thankful because I was opposed to the prospect that I would be required to officiate publicly accountable lifelong monogamous same sex marriages. But in 2003 we had a lesbian exchange student whom we loved as our own for the eleven months she lived with us, and continue to relate to her as our daughter. She has been married for ten years and we have a grandson by her as well. Between my relationship with her, updated scientific studies, and increased biblical scholarship and theological reasoning my position has changed completely. I've even officiated some weddings for those in the LGBTQIA community. But it would never have occurred if I didn't first maintain a "holy curiosity" when it came to this issue from the beginning.

Having a "holy curiosity" is similar to having a "beginner's mind" that participants in this year's Lenten Midweek study of the book "Prayer: a Primer" discovered. In it the author reminds readers, and us, that a "Beginner's mind is a state of mind that is open, curious, not intimidated by seeming contradictions and paradoxes, eager to explore possibilities, at home with mystery." In other words, to have a "beginner's mind" or "holy curiosity" means we acknowledge we don't have all the answers or are the expert on any topic or issue. We can always learn something new and may change our mind or perspective on an issue because of that new information. The church has always adapted to a changing culture to share, proclaim and reveal the truth of the gospel through word and deed. As we celebrate Pride Month in June, I hope all of us can embrace a "holy curiosity" or a "beginner's mind" as we discover what it means to be advocates and allies of God's children in the LGBTQIA community.



## North Carolina Mission Trip Cancelled. Local Mission "Trip" Open for Grades 6-12

This year's Youth Mission Trip won't be just for those age 16 and up. Youth entering sixth grade through graduating seniors will be able to participate in local mission daytrips to address landscaping, painting, and small repairs at homes of those who cannot afford or are physically unable to do such work. Pastor Wayne Zschech will solicit potential job sites from Pastor Giselle Coutinho at Bridge of Peace in Fairview as well as other area pastors for parishioners and neighbors who need either cosmetic or structural home improvement and/or repairs. Any interested rising middle schooler or high schooler should contact Pastor Wayne by June 11 if they are interested in participating so sufficient adult supervision can be provided. When the pandemic shuttered the Senior High Youth Mission Trip to work with Habitat for Humanity in Winston-Salem it also squashed the momentum the trip had established for over 15 years. With only two youth having expressed interest in the NC trip Pastor Wayne made the decision to make the trip a local one and to expand the age requirement for participants. "The success of the trip in past years was largely due to the excitement and hype provided by past participants," said Pastor Wayne "With an age requirement of 16 by HFH and two years of pandemic-related shuttering all the past participants had graduated, leaving no one to talk up their experience to potential new mission-trippers. It was no wonder we only had three youth last year and only two this year. A local trip including youth of a larger age range will hopefully bring back the momentum we once had to return to NC and working with Habitat for Humanity."

## **LUTHERAN CHURCH OF OUR SAVIOR: APRIL 2023 REPORT**

#### **FINANCIAL NARRATIVE**

April Envelope and Congregational Challenge offerings of \$39,663 slightly exceeded the Plan of \$39,446. We are estimating Year End Envelope offering to exceed Plan by \$7,000 and Congregational Challenge offering to be below Plan by \$2,000.

Other Income is estimated to be below Plan by \$4,000 as a result of Matching Funds not being received as expected. Expenses are estimated to be below Plan by \$500 as a result of Property Expenses lower that expected and Administration expenses higher than Plan. It is still early, but we are expecting Income of \$1,500 by Year End based on the above above estimates.

The Dedicated Account Summaries have a total balance of \$104,506.

## Nationally Recognized Author & Advocate to Speak at LCOS on June 22

Local resident and Lutheran pastor's wife Jamie Bruesehoff will discuss what Christians can do to be allies and advocates with the LGBTQIA+ community. A nationallyknown speaker, award-winning LGBTQ+ advocate, and a heartfelt writer, Jamie, her family and their advocacy work have been featured by media outlets and organizations around the world, including Disney, NPR, Good Morning America, USA Today, The Today Show, News, Parents, EducationWeek, Human Rights Campaign, and The Trevor Project. Jamie holds an M.A. in Religion from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg. She has testified before

National Gun Violence Awareness Day, June 2 & Wear Orange Weekend, Jun 2-4 From the Wear Orange Website: "On January 21, 2013 Hadiya Pendleton marched in President Obama's second inaugural parade. One week later Hadiya was shot and killed on a Chicago playground. Soon after Hadiya's friends commemorated her life by wearing orange, the color hunters wear in the woods to protect themselves and others. Wear Orange is now observed every June. Thousands of people wear the color orange to honor Hadiya and the more than 40,000 people who are killed with guns and approximately

85,000 who are shot and wounded every year. We honor the communities shattered by gun violence, as well as the 120 people who are shot and killed, and hundreds more who are wounded, every day in our country. Together, we call for meaningful action to save lives."



**Juneteenth** (June 19th) is the Federal holiday commemorating the emancipation of enslaved African-Americans. Once again this year at LCOS we are observing this important date by displaying Juneteenth flags at the entrances to our church during the week leading up to this historic date. Keep an eye out starting June 11 for the red and blue flags with a starburst that represents the state of Texas, where slaves in the most remote part of the Confederacy learned of their emancipation on June 19, 1865.

## Stewards of God's Gifts...gifts of time and talent



Stop me if you've heard this one before. Stewardship is NOT only about money. In the time-talent-treasure trinity, money is outnumbered two to one by time and talent, and it's that season of the year again, folks. Let's talk time and talent. You're probably thinking, "Let's not. I'm too busy as it is." Aren't we all? In today's busy world it sometimes seems that time is harder to share than money. But stop and consider what gifts God gives to us.

This year at Our Savior we're focusing on the five spiritual gifts God bestows on us through our baptism and again whenever we reaffirm our faith. ## My Father's House Update

After much thought, prayer, and discussion, the Social Ministry Committee has decided to make some changes to the My Father's House ministry. Due to the increasing challenge of finding volunteers to make meals each week, along with the changing needs and numbers at MFH, we will transition from sending weekly meals to providing MFH with snacks and beverages. We believe

this change will be a better fit for our volunteer base, and will enable LCOS to serve a greater number of MFH clients. Anyone who has already signed up to send a meal or who wants to continue to make and deliver meals beyond this transition period is welcome to do so.

Moving forward, we are asking the congregation to donate boxes of individually wrapped, non-perishable snacks (granola bars, popcorn, pretzels, etc.) along with cases of single-serve drinks (water, soda, Gatorade, iced tea, etc.). Donations can be left on the designated shelves just outside of Parish Hall. Kathy and Amelia Wright, along with Gabby Berrios, who will be taking over as coordinator of this ministry, will deliver the food and drinks to My Father's House.

## Deodorants and Soap Collection for Caring Hearts

Social Ministry Committee assists Caring Hearts families that are seen by Cooper Hospital's Pediatric Infectious Disease Practice. We usually support the seasonal holiday parties by providing baked goods and refreshments as well as a collected item (underwear, baby wipes, socks, deodorant, and gifts from Advent Giving Tree) and provide assistance at these parties. We also support Caring Hearts with a monetary donation in March and a special Christmas donation. All in-person events were cancelled in 2020, 2021, and 2022 due to the coronavirus pandemic. So far, no in-person events have been planned yet for 2023. But, Ilyse Janove is hoping that Caring Hearts can have a Back-to-School party in late August.

LCOS has been asked to collect men's and women's deodorant, and 3-packs of soap, at least 20 of each. The deodorants and soaps will be included in tote bags along with other personal care items to be given to the families. ## Ukrainian Refugee Update; Dental Work and Summer Jobs

As many members know Tanya Zhara, Natalia Derets and her son Mark, and Iryna Chastukhina and her three children, Nick, Kyrylo, and Sonya moved out of the parsonage on March 18 to the two-story apartment on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floors of the Wezner House owned by First Presbyterian Church of Haddonfield. Many thanks to all who donated furniture and assisted in the moving process! Here's where the family stands today.

**DENTAL WORK**: Due to the high stress related to the refugee experience the three women have experienced significant dental issues that have been initially addressed by Monokian Family Dentistry of Haddonfield at a discount and the remainder paid from funds provided by the congregation to the Refugee Fund. While this has addressed certain severe issues there are still significant issues left to address that may cost thousands of dollars. Pas-

tor Wayne and Kate Zschech are working with various resources to determine how the family can get Medicare or Medicaid to address the costs going forward.

**EMPLOYMENT**: Ira has a full-time job at Pizza Crime in Haddonfield and in the summer Natalia will be the Director for the Girl Scout Summer Camp program at one of the South Jersey camps with Ira working as her assistant. They will rely on bus transportation to get to and from work. They continue to seek full-time employment with a more permanent employer.

**SCHOOL & ACTIVITIES**: Both Nick and Kyrylo continue to participate in the Concert Band and attended the Sophomore Dance at HMHS. Mark runs track at the Haddonfield Middle School and placed second in an online international chess competition. Sonya sings with the ChildrenSong group that rehearses at Our Savior and will have a concert on May 21 at 4:00 at LCOS.

**FUTURE CONCERNS**: As the women secure more permanent jobs there is the reality that those jobs may require independent transportation. That will require a vehicle, NJ driver's licenses, and insurance. Until they can afford a car and insurance they will continue to use public transportation, but in the meantime the two mothers will be preparing to qualify for a NJ driver's license as well as begin saving for insurance and a car, unless one is donated.

**FINAL THOUGHTS**: The generosity of the congregation of Our Savior enabled Pastor Wayne and Kate Zschech to house the family of seven for the year they lived in the parsonage without severe consequence. While they no longer live in the parsonage, Our Savior's commitment to walking with them in their journey to stability to citizenship has not ended. Please know any contributions to the Refugee Dedicated Fund are greatly appreciated and used judiciously to meet the most pressing needs of the family. Gift cards to Acme are still needed and appreciated. Pastor Wayne will continue to update the congregation on how the family is doing.

## Mustard Seed Community Childcare at Our Savior Taking Summer & Fall Registrations

Mustard Seed Community Childcare is currently accepting applications for their Summer Camp program for children entering Kindergarten through those having completed Fifth Grade. Camp runs from June through August from 8:30-5:00 Monday through Friday with daily activities and a "travel camp" during one of the weeks.

Applications for their Kindergarten Extended Day Program (EDP) in the fall are also being accepted. There are already 40 students already enrolled with openings in both their morning and afternoon sessions. 

With summer around the corner, I thought it might be nice to suggest some potential summer reading material based for kids of all ages to read on their own or with a parent. And I snuck in a couple of books for adults, too!



#### For babies:

**God Gave us You** by <u>Lisa Tawn Bergren</u> and <u>Laura J. Bryant</u> – a beautifully illustrated book with a message about the love of parents everywhere (human and animal alike)!



#### For toddlers:

**Goodnight, Ark** by Laura Sassi – Geared toward children (specifically toddlers), this is a wonderful message of God's protection and it's a great way to tell the story of Noah's ark to young children in a way they might always remember. As a plus, the illustrations are gorgeous!



### For young elementary children (5-8 years):

His Grace Is Enough: How God Makes It Right When We've Got It Wrong by Melissa Kruger – a rhyming books with great illustrations that drives home the most important point kids need to know (and adult also need to remember): God's grace is enough. It is a book about how we can turn to Jesus whenever we mess up.




### For older elementary/middle school:

**The Chronicles of Narnia** series by C.S. Lewis – A classic that never goes out of style. This series is filled with faith and fantasy, a winning combination. It checks all the boxes: a wicked witch, a talking lion, and plenty of reminders of the power of sacrifice.



## For high school:

<u>The Hiding Place</u> by Corrie Ten Boom – A true story about a family who chose to risk their own lives to shelter Jewish people during World War II in the Netherlands, and how she, the author, was able to find healing even after her family was reported and punished.



#### For adults:

*Holy Envy: Finding God in the Faith of Others* by Barbara Brown Taylor – a reading list would not be complete without a book from my favorite (and luckily very prolific) author. Recently published, this could not be more relevant with its emphasis on love, respect for people from all over the world and the way they worship. We can all learn a lot!

**Becoming Mrs. Lewis:** The Improbable Love Story of Joy Davidman and C. S. Lewis by Patti Callahan - I love reading through C.S. Lewis, from his more fantasy and sci fi novels to his very deeply spiritual books. This particular book chronicles the true story of the relationship between C.S. Lewis and Joy Davidman, which began as a friendship and then ended in a short marriage, preempted by Joy's death. It's a beautiful story mostly from the perspective of Joy, but also interlaced with glimpses of C.S. Lewis' life and faith.
