




Our Beautiful New Chrismons

"If you make me start texting, I may have to retire early!" That was Pastor Glenn Engelhardt's reaction in 2006 to the prospect of staff communicating by text with each other and the congregation for the sake of facilitating more expedient sharing of information and communication. Of course, texting nearly two decades ago was far more tedious with only a numeric keypad available on flip-phones than a full alphanumeric keyboard on today's smartphones. In time Pastor Engelhardt not only embraced texting, but also many other technological advantages of gathering and sharing information and communication

in a rapidly expanding age of social media. I think he did so for the sake of the grandkids and staying connected to their lives down in Virginia.

Glenn taught me a lesson I'm just beginning to understand. Sometimes, we endure the challenges of learning how to utilize the latest innovations of technology for the sake of a purpose that is important and meaningful in our lives and the lives of others. Like Glenn and texting, I've been a bit adverse to learning how to best utilize Instagram, Facebook Live, and YouTube in sharing my personal life let alone using it for spreading the gospel. It's not a part of my daily routine that is so natural to "digital natives" like former Vicar Josh Pontious who got us up and running with Facebook Live worship services when Covid-19 forced us to close in-person worship for months.

Yet, historically, Lutherans have often used the latest technology for the sake of spreading the gospel. Martin Luther used the Guttenberg movable type printing press to mass produce his writings and share his confessional writings with Germans of all ages and education levels that enabled the Reformation movement to be so fruitful. We might ask ourselves, "How would Martin Luther use social media technology today for the sake of the gospel? How would he use the ability to provide virtual worship and learning opportunities to create an even larger and wider congregation than one could previously conceive of with only in-person participation?"

I'm now at the age Pastor Engelhardt was when he made his reticent comment about texting. Unlike now Pastor Josh Pontious, I'm not a digital native and learning this new "language" will be as challenging as learning French for me. But how can I or anyone else deny the value of using social media and virtual technology for the sake of the gospel when the generations born after 1980 are so connected to it? They are more likely to check their social media feed than sifting through a cluttered email account for a church email. They are more likely to attend a virtual worship service or education event by Zoom if attending in person is not a possibility without first getting childcare or if there is a conflict in their schedule.

So here is my New Year resolution. I will work on becoming more "fluent" in the language of social media and virtual technology for the sake of the gospel. In order for me to do that well I invite members to share their insights and tips on how I can improve and what they believe works well in sharing information that engages others. I want to learn how we might have a more engaged online worship community. I want to know how virtual technology might best be used to provide Bible discussions, book studies, or even education classes for those who might be unable to attend in person, but could attend by Zoom. If anyone knows of a class I can attend (I know a lot of learning this is basically hands on but I really could use a Social Media 101 class) please let me know. I don't want me or the church I serve to be the one that refuses to embrace technology for the sake of the gospel simply because "it's not the way we're used to." I pray the Holy Spirit bless our efforts together in this new year of ministry together. Happy New Year.

NJ Segregation Case Takes Next Steps

In what is a surprise to many, New Jersey's schools, viewed statewide, are among the most racially segregated in America. The causes are housing patterns, school district boundaries mirroring those of municipalities, and a state law mandating that students attend the schools where they reside.

New Jersey's situation—by contrast to the better-known intentional, legal segregation formerly enforced in the South—is referred to as de facto segregation, meaning that segregation is not intentional or legally required. Although there is evidence that NJ housing patterns result partially from intentional exclusionary zoning, that distinction does not matter (as it does in federal litigation) because the NJ courts have already ruled that de facto segregation violates the state constitution.

In May 2018 a lawsuit was filed in NJ state court, on behalf of Black, Latino and other minority students alleging that the schools were unconstitutionally segregated in violation of three provisions of the NJ Constitution: 1) Article I, para.1, adopted in 1844 guarantees equal treatment; 2) Article VIII, sec. IV, para. 1, adopted in 1875 requiring the State to provide "a through and efficient system of free public schools"; and 3) Article I, para. 5, adopted in 1947 provides that "No person shall be . . . segregated in the . . . public schools, because of . . . race."

The suit also contended that the court should read the three clauses together, each enhancing the other over time, to conclude that the NJ schools were unconstitutionally segregated.

After years of legal maneuvering, as well as expert testimony, in spring 2022 both sides filed pre-trial motions for summary judgment. Plaintiffs asked for a partial victory—a ruling that the NJ schools are unconstitutionally segregated and for remedies to be crafted at a later stage of the trial. Defendants asked for a complete victory—a ruling that the lawsuit be dismissed with no remedy.

On October 6 of this year the trial judge entered a 93-page order as the first step in what promises to be lengthy litigation. Surprisingly, he denied both motions, but gave both sides plenty of room to negotiate. On December 2 the NY Times announced that both sides have agreed to take the next steps in the case by entering mediation. The Justice and Peace Committee will be following this case closely, as its outcome will have a big impact on schools and municipalities in New Jersey. (Thanks to Justice & Peace member Bob Williams for writing this article and sharing his lawyer's expertise.)

Once again, the people of Our Savior have put their faith into action with their generosity. A huge thank you and well done from the Social Ministry Committee to everyone who took Advent Giving Tree tags in-person at church or thru the online registry, and bought the gifts or gift cards or donated money to purchase gifts or gift cards. We started with 175 tags and ended with 140 tags taken and 35 tags left. 
•Greeters:

10 Stewardship Principles Principle #1: Respond Gratefully

In the new year at Our Savior our Stewardship efforts are focusing on 10 Stewardship principles that help us to live in God's amazing grace. The first principle—respond gratefully—certainly describes how the LCOS congregation has responded to the Stewardship campaign for 2024.

As of last month (mid-December 2023) there were 69 givers pledging \$235,106, a strong response, but lagging slightly behind where we were in December 2022, as you can see from the numbers below.

Dec. 2019 for 2020 91 pledges total pledged: \$253,550 (pre-pandemic)

Dec. 2020 for 2021 84 pledges total pledged: \$214,206 Dec. 2021 for 2022 80 pledges total pledged: \$239,106 Dec. 2022 for 2023 77 pledges total pledged: \$244,110

The final totals for 2023 eventually increased from the 77 shown above to 93 giving units pledging


\$304,602. Hopefully the pledge totals for this year also will increase by the first quarter of 2024, and we will reach—or even exceed—last year's 93 pledges. To do that, the church needs just 20 more individuals and families to step forward and pledge the blessings they have already received from God.

We recognize that the effects of inflation and market volatility have impacted some households' ability to give as generously as in previous years. Others are in a stable financial position, or even looking forward to a more prosperous year. Whatever your situation, we hope you consider pledging as a symbol of gratefulness for God's gifts and a recognition of our being together as the body of Christ. Whatever you pledge will be an important contribution to the ministry goals of LCOS in 2024 as we continue to be God's agents of grace in our community and beyond for decades to come.

November Envelope and Congregational Challenge offerings of \$32,530 were below expectations of \$38,188. We are estimating Year End Envelope and Congregational challenge offerings to be below Plan by \$10,000. Other Income is estimated to be below Plan by \$2,000 as a result of Matching Funds not being received as expected. Expenses are estimated to be above Plan by \$3,000 as a result of Salary and Benefits below Plan by \$11,228 as a result of the Director of Youth and Family Ministry change, Property Expense estimate to be above Plan by \$11,675 as a result of the General Budget support of the exterior church painting and an unexpected large estimated lawn maintenance bill of over \$5,000 in December, and Administrative expenses above expectations. We are estimating a large \$15,000 Net Loss by Year End with December Envelope offerings being critical.

LCOS Youth Ministry

In January LCOS is asking for donations of bread, meats, cheese, peanut butter, and jelly for the LCOS Youth Ministry day of service on MLKJ day. Students and any LCOS members who would like to volunteer will be assembling 50-250 sandwiches to donate to **Cathedral Kitchen** in Camden, NJ. We are asking that donations be dropped off Jan 13-Jan 14. Please leave your donations in the kitchen marked MLKJ Day.

For those that do not know about Cathedral Kitchen, their mission is to help people out of food insecurity and champion their pursuit of stability and prosperity. Each year hundreds of people, from different faiths and backgrounds and from across the South Jersey area volunteer their time and talents each year, filling more than 9,000 volunteer slots to serve the daily meal and help keep overhead costs down. They receive donated food from a variety of sources, estimated to be worth over \$805,000 per year! CK's job training programs are supported by corporate and private donations. Area restaurants and chefs are pivotal in the programs' success: local chefs make guest teaching appearances in the culinary and baking arts classes, and restaurants provide internships and employment opportunities for our students and graduates. Approximately 26 percent of Cathedral Kitchen's budget comes from individual donations. The remainder is comprised of government grants (5%), corporate funding (6%), private foundations (16%), social enterprise income (53%), and proceeds from our annual fund-raiser (4%), Harvest for Hunger, a wine tasting and live auction are held in the fall.

In addition, we are asking for donations of items for Personal Care Kits for the **Lutheran World Relief**. Lutheran World Relief provides aid in emergencies and helps families restore their lives. They partner with communities to build and grow rural economies. Their goal is to help people build self-sufficiency and create new community-owned approaches to problem-solving that will last long after their projects end.

Donations can be dropped Jan. 2- Jan. 14 in the bin outside the Parish Hall marked "Personal Care Kits for Lutheran World Relief."
